According to a well-known scientist, the male spider, a diminutive creature compared with the female, attracts the attention of his mate by vibrating one of the fibers of her web, thus transmitting a message of love along the "wires."

The chirp of the cricket, caused by the male rubbing leg and wing together, appeals to his mate's esnse of hearing, and was the first known example of instrumental music being

applied to courtship. The frog also exploits the sense of hearing, the male emitting that very resonant sound so often apt to interfere with one's sleep.

The croak of the frog was the first known instance of vocal music being applied to courtship.

The bachelor state is quite common in bird life. A keen observer of a bird sanctuary off the coast of Norfork noticed that the male vostercatchers which did not pair off during the mating season had their own particular part of the island, where no females were allowed and where the males met in daily conlave.

Whether in their long conversations they mentioned the weaker sex it is imposible to say, but from the fact that the talks frequently ended in a free fight, this would appear to have been extremely probable.





The water, removed by evaporation, may be replaced very easily and the milk returned to its original volume. Evaporated milk may be obtained in small cans, containing six ounces or in larger ones containing sixteen and can be taken to the cam in quantities sufficient for the needs of the entire period, thus assuring a con stant supply of pure, fresh milk without the worry or the danger attached to the use of the market product.

Following are recipes for a few dishes that are best adapted for camp onsumption because of ease of prepa ration, purity and food value.

Tomato Soup.

pint tomato pulp or canned to-mato soup 1½ cups water Salt and pepper to taste 1/8 tsp. soda

Bring tomato pulp or soup to the boil, add the seasonings and soda. Heat the milk and water and combine slowly with the tomato mixture.

BAD CHECK HABIT

Texas has a new penal law that is designed to deter people from issuing checks on banks where they do not have funds to pay them. The law is presumably designed to dis1

courage fradulent practices. But it sometimes happens that checks are honestly drawn on banks where there is not money enough to the credit of the maker of the checks to pay them. This may be through errors in figures or due to failure of some third person to make a deposit in time. It may be through the belief that funds can be secured and deposited before the checks are presented for payment, says the Texas Public Service Information Bureau.

When bill payment periods arrive every so often in business houses there are generally a number of these non-prductive checks to be dealt with. In the case of the public utilities where there is sometimes a discount for prompt payment and always the danger of suspension of service for non-payment, the proportion of these bad checks is rather heavy. 


