Spur Bulldogs Easy Winners Over Slaton

Last Friday the Football team of the High School journeyed to Snyder for a football game there Friday afternoon. Quite a number of Spur fans accompanied the boys to see the 39 to 0 victory. The Snyder boys won the toss and elected to defend the east goal. Spur kicked off. The game was on. From the very first the Bulldogs began to fight. Within a very few minutes Spur had crossed the line for a touch down. No extra No extra point. Spur 6, Snyder 0.

Snyder elected to receive, Snyder was held for downs. Down the field came the Bulldogs. Line-pluggers, end-runs, again the Bulldogs scored. Spur 12 Snyder 0. Rosy kicked goal for the extra point Spur 13; Snyder 0. Snyder received again.

Report of the Cotton Market

It was reported that some houses were recalling their spot buyers but some other houses claimed their buyers were still in the market for cotton.

Daily sales of spot cotton at the 10 reporting southern spot markets denoted the continuance of a good demand for white cotton, sales remaining larger than at this time one year ago.

The status of the cotton market is such that while there remains a good demand for the better grades, low grades are neglected and consequently accumulating, while the prospective crop, as a whole promises more than an ample supply of the season, perhaps at lower prices, which would likely cause the demand to increase all the more. While market may continue experience temporary rallies from time to time the present outlook is for lower prices ultimately.

The lowest market was witnessed this week since 1921. The lowest point reached in the market for December specials was 19.62. The highest point reached for yesterday was 20.02. The closed settled at 19.72-4. The government report for Monday was 15,226,000 bale production, and ginnings reported 9,519,784 bales ginned.

Raw sugar, after having made the lowest level within ten years except 1921 which was a panic year, reached from the recent low price of 15c per hundred. The highest point reached in the market was 2.51. The market closed at 2.50.

Turkeys For Thanksgiving—Pooling Service Offered for Turkey Raisers Again This Year

Turkey raisers may pool their turkeys for the Thanksgiving market again this year. Several have expressed their satisfaction of this method of selling. The County agent, Fred S. Reynolds, has prepared blanks to be filled out and mailed to him. These blanks are being left at the banks in Spur and at one store each in Afton, McAdoo, Elton, and Dickens.

Those wanting to pool should mail these blanks into the county agent's

office not later than November 5th. If enough turkeys are listed, the owners will be notified to bring them in at a convenient date before Thanksgiving. Buyers will be notified to be here to bid on the entire lot.

One advantage of pooling is to attract buyers and force competition and secure full market price.

The agreement to deliver is as follows:

Thursday night comes the "Heart of a Siren," starring Barbara LaMart and Conway Tearle.

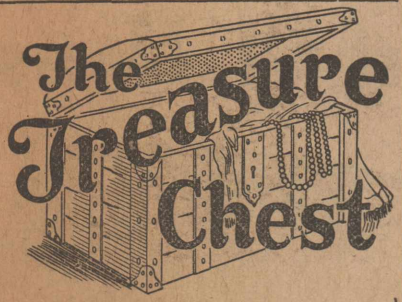

GET HIGH PRICE FOR FALL AND WINTER EGGS

Many people might wonder why eggs are high priced in the late fall and early winter. The answer is simply because eggs are scarce. Getting eggs in the winter is a job requiring attention to 101 details. But you can do it if you are interested.

The reason eggs are cheap during the spring is because eggs are plentiful. This is the time of year when the hens are comfortable, have access to hundreds of different kinds of insects and tender nutritious plants forming a laying ration. The old hens have had a winter rest and the pullets are now mature. Therefore eggs are plentiful everywhere. The neglected chickens lay at this time in spite of neglect and abuse. But then eggs are cheap.

The GOLDEN eggs are the ones laid from now to the first of February. This is the time the real poultry man will get maximum egg production.

The winter egg ring has five essentials:

1. Early hatched pullets
2. Breed to lay
3. Feed laying rations
4. Free of Vermin
5. Proper housing.

If you neglect any one of these five essentials, you will not attain maximum production. Your early pullets and not your hens lay the bulk of winter eggs. If you think too much of your old hens to get rid of them to make room for your young stuff, you will have to keep them, they

won't keep you. I have never known a home for the old folks to pay expenses, much less make a profit. The same is true of poultry. Pullets with average care will lay at about 8 months of age. They may be brought into production much sooner with intelligent care. The majority of your hens loaf during the winter after moulting.

A book could be written on each of the points mentioned above but only those especially interested in poultry will get eggs in quantity during the winter, so it is not worth while to go into details here.

People who are attempting to feed a laying ration will do well to do their own mixing. The A. & M. College has carried on extensive experiments feeding cottonseed meal instead of the meat scraps and tankage so common in many poultry feeds, with gratifying results. You can mix the following for about \$2.00 per hundred:

- 200 lbs. wheat bran
- 100 lbs. wheat shorts
- 100 lbs. ground yellow milo or fine ground yellow cornmeal
- 175 lbs. cottonseed meal
- 4 lbs. salt.

Dust with sodium flouride to rid fowls of lice. You may rest assured that you have lice, mites and blue bugs galore unless you have taken special precaution to control them. Carbolineum thoroughly sprayed into every nook and crevice should get rid of blue bugs and mites. Dip legs into any kind of oil to cure scaly legs, caused by the scaly leg mite.

When Christmas comes around this year kids will no longer find "Made in Germany" on the bottoms of many of the toys Santa Claus leaves. Most likely they will find "Made in America," for the United States, which formerly imported most of its toys, now exports to the tune of something more than a million dollars' worth a year.

A whole lot depends upon the geography. A snowfall with serene leaves yet on the trees is a novelty in New England.

WIFE WAGES

Lubbock Avalanche: Wages of \$15 a week, which a Texan suggests as the just reward due the average house wife, may express a measure of earnings, but it by no means follows that it would be possible for the average wife and mother to place her services on such a commercial basis. Neither might it be desirable were it a possibility.

If every wife in America were granted a wage of \$15 a week it would bankrupt the husband class in about the third week. Forty million wives at fifteen dollars a week would be due six hundred million dollars weekly. Where would the money come from? It couldn't be had in cash, and the account would have to be squared with bread and cheese and kisses. Naturally, the financiers would soon take hold of the problem, and introduce installment wives, as in the case of automobiles, carpet sweepers, sewing machines and phonographs. A wife could be taken on the installment plan, payable a dollar down and two dollars a day, with immediate possession. By paying his wife with small daily portions, instead of a big lump sum on Saturday evening, many a man could afford to marry who would have to remain a bachelor otherwise. But the law ought to be drawn so as to make forty years, say, the wage limit. After a man has paid fifteen dollars a week for forty years he ought to own his wife unincumbered. This would encourage husbands to look forward to the time when they could keep some of their own money without losing their wives. Furthermore, the law should protect the husband by guaranteeing him a wife free from mechanical defects, inferior material and durable. No man would want to finance a wife whose chassis developed rattles or whose paint began to check off before she had run a thousand miles.—Dallas News.

COWARDICE OF THE OPEN MIND

A misused virtue quickly degenerates into a vice.

The various uses to which open-mindedness may be put admirably illustrate this often overlooked law of morals.

Open-mindedness may flower into the virtue of courage.

Open-mindedness may fall into the vice of cowardice.

A man may be open-minded because he wants to act wisely.

A man may be open-minded because he is afraid to act at all.

Courageous open-mindedness is the spirit of the scientist.

Cowardly open-mindedness is the spirit of the slacker.

Maudie Royden, an English feminist minister with a setter's nose for reality, in a biting satiric address on easy ways of being good, has painted a suggestive picture of the man who uses open-mindedness as an excuse for inaction, as an excuse for not playing his part in the affairs of his time. With brilliant irony she advises us how to maintain a spurious self-respect by avoiding mistakes through the simple policy of never making up our minds.

"Go after every new religion, read every new book, discuss every new question and every old one, and all the time suspend your judgment and keep an open mind.

"It is a highly respectable attitude and saves you an infinity of troubles, because, you see, you need never act. Your mind is still open, your judgment is still suspended, and while you compliment yourself on the intel-

lectual integrity which forbids you to come to a hasty conclusion, you need indeed you must—do nothing.

"You take no risks; you make no mistakes; you fall into none of those ridiculous misadventures which befall people who make up their minds.

"Neither are you forced to reflect that perhaps you would not act even if you made up your mind. You can cherish throughout life the pleasant delusion that you would have acted like a hero if only you had not been able to decide what to do.

"The truth is that it is difficult to act. It is hard to act. It is much easier to preserve your self-respect.

"If we make up our minds on what has to be done, we may make a mistake; or we may find ourselves unwilling to act at all. And that would be extraordinarily unpleasant! We may be faced with the fact that we are really stupid, or cowardly, or slothful."

I think it was Gilbert K. Chesterton who suggested that thinking is very much like eating. We have to be open-mouthed in order to receive

food, but we have to close our jaws periodically for purposes of mastication and swallowing. We have to be open-minded in order to receive facts, but we have to close our minds periodically on judgments that lead to action.

SUGGESTIONS FOR THE SCHOOL LUNCH BASKETS

Chicken Sandwiches.
Chop cold boiled chicken and moisten with mayonnaise or cream salad dressing. Spread between thin slices of buttered bread. Wrap in waxed paper.

Luncheon Sandwiches.
Cream 1-3 cup butter, add 1-2 cup each finely chopped cold boiled ham and cold boiled chicken. Season with salt and paprika. Spread between thin slices of bread. Wrap in waxed paper.

Egg Sandwiches
Press the yolks and whites of hard cooked eggs through a ricer or sieve. Season to taste with salt and pepper and moisten with mayonnaise or cream salad dressing. Spread mixture between thin slices of lightly buttered white or graham bread. The butter should be well creamed.

Cheese and Salted Almond Sandwich.
Mix 1-4 cup creamed butter, 1-2 cup grated cheese, a few grains paprika and 1-2 cup finely chopped salted almonds. Spread on thin slices of graham bread, cut in desired shapes and press together in pairs. Wrap in waxed paper.

Jelly Roll—
Beat 4 egg yolks until light, add 1-4 cup sugar, 1-2 teaspoon vanilla and 5 tablespoons milk. Add 2 cups flour sifted with 4 teaspoons baking powder and 1-4 teaspoon salt. Mix thoroughly. Spread on piece of wrapping paper on a sheet and bake in a hot oven. (Do not oil or butter the wrapping paper.) Bake about 5 minutes in hot oven. Remove from oven and turn upside down on a cloth with powdered sugar. Remove the paper and spread with jelly, marshmallow or chocolate filling. Roll carefully, wrapping in a towel for a few minutes. Wrap in waxed paper when preparing for lunch box.

Favorite Sandwiches
(Cut stale nut bread into very thin slices. Spread with cream cheese and butter creamed or beaten together and put together with orange marmalade. Cut in desired shapes and wrap securely in waxed paper.)

Letting Sandwiches.
Pick over and wash fresh, crisp lettuce leaves. Dry carefully on a clean linen towel. Put between thin slices of buttered bread, having a teaspoon of mayonnaise on each leaf. Wrap in waxed paper.

FINANCIAL WORKER FOR CHILDREN'S HOME HERE

Mrs. Belva Luitwieler, financial agent for the Texas Children's Home and Society founded 30 years ago by Rev. L. Z. T. Morris, generally known as the Morris Home, with Ft. Worth as headquarters, arrived in Spur on Monday.

This work is a state wide denominational agency for the orphan, neglected and dependent children from infancy to 15 years and is supported in Ft. Worth district by the Community Chest, by the Wichita Falls Chest while the remaining funds for children out of these places come by individual donations of which there are annual subscribers in Spur. There were 500 children handed by this organization last year and over 100 sent into private homes in Texas, others to the State institutions, while many were aided in their own homes or were given temporary care and others given back to parents or relatives, this being a work of standards.

Cripple children were aided by local surgeons. The Texas children's Hospital and Dr. Goslines Child Guidance Clinic of Dallas give special treatment to aid wards of the Society. Around 4000 children are now sheltered in parental line and receiving individual care is the stimulant to all of the workers. Some will be found in our own city. Children coming from one part of the state for placement with a foster home will be placed in another portion of the state, giving advantage, both to the child and parent, therefore a state wide field is preferable.

Applications for children and for children needing care may be reported to Mrs. Roy Stockwell, 318 Cotton Exchange Building, Fort Worth. And your contribution is needed now. "He who helps a child helps humanity with a distinctiveness, with an immediateness, which no other help given in any other stage of human life can possibly give again," Phillips Brooks.—Reported by Mrs. Belva Luitwieler.

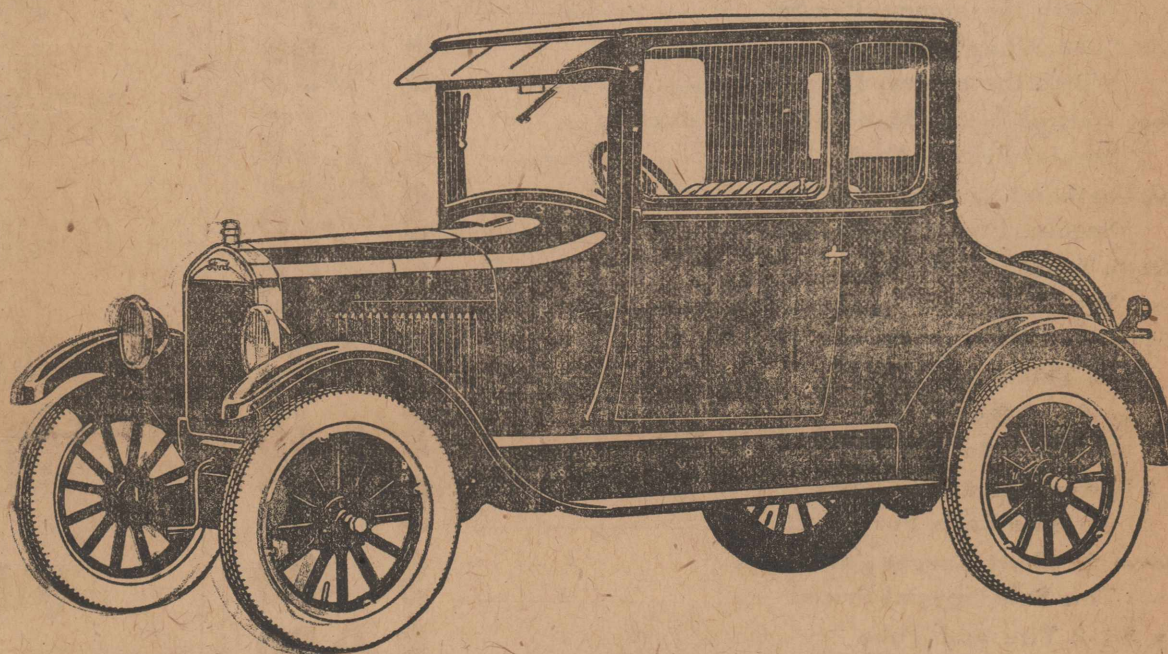

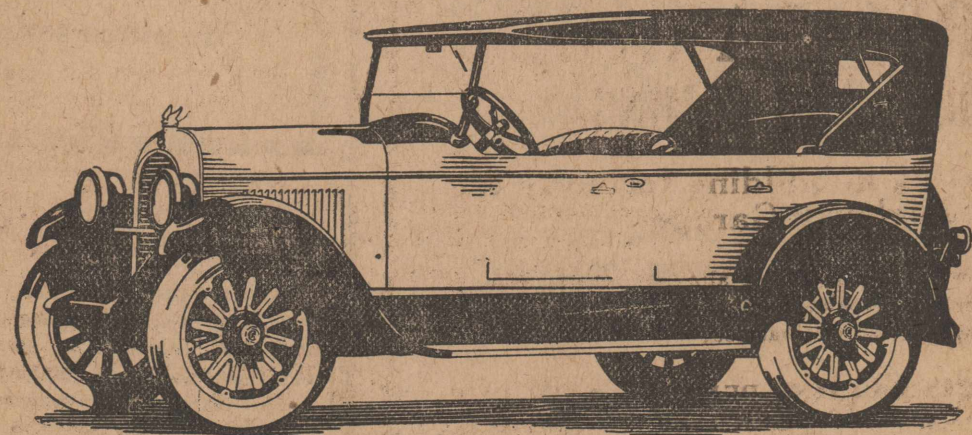

The world's trade is made up of goods and services, and gold is but the language in which they are described.

HUGE MASTODON'S BONES FOUND IN WASHINGTON

Bones of a huge mastodon, with tusks about six feet long and beautifully opalized, were found yesterday in the clay pit of the Granger Clay products Company, about twenty miles from Yakima, Washington.

Parts of another mastodon skeleton were found in the clay pit some years ago, but in the present find the bone structure appears to be wonderfully mineralized.

VANDALS ARE DESTROYING N. Y. WILD FLOWERS

Herbert Durand, botanist and author, in a lecture at the New York Botanical Garden, declared the wild flowers of the country are being destroyed by vandals. Native flora will disappear unless this devastation is promptly checked, he warned. This is particularly true of the countryside in the vicinity of the larger cities, according to his observations.

Mr. Durand asserted that the most destructive foes of flowers were motorists, picnic parties, real estate promoters, wholesale and retail florists and "loving friends." In a single area of Westchester County, comprising Hunt's Woods, thousands of beautiful wild azaleas, dogwoods, sweet pepper bushes, blueberry bushes and many

other ornamental trees, shrubs, flowers and ferns were discovered during the Summer, he said.

CIVILIZATION FOR INDUSTRY

Nothing could be more spectacular than the plan announced by Harvey S. Firestone for the rebuilding of Liberia by the rubber company of which he is head.

The plan has two main phases— industrial and sociological. The rubber company wants rubber. Liberia exports that commodity now, but in far smaller quantities than it might if its resources were developed. The country stretches for 350 miles along the west coast of Africa. Its area of 43,000 miles is more than the area of Ohio, the State in which Mr. Firestone's company has its headquarters. The population numbers more than 1,500,000 negroes, nearly all of them in the interior. Clearly here are immense natural resources and immense labor power awaiting development.

But first there must be a great sociological work. Mr. Firestone has made an agreement with the Liberian government whereby his firm will spend \$100,000,000 to develop the country, build highways, railroads, towns, harbors and hospitals, and employ a huge force of white civilizers to attempt to bring the natives of the interior up to civilization in almost one swift pull.
