Sad Tragedy Occurs in Our **City Sunday**

One of the saddest affairs in the history of this country occurred in our city about 11:45 a. m. Sunday when Edgar Brawley, 19 received his death wound from a pistol fired by Frank Denson. The cause of the trouble seems to have arisen a few days ago when one of the smaller boys of the Brawley family struck a sister of the Denson boy in retaliation for a kick which the young lady gave him.

Carl Denson met A. A. Brawley, father of Edgar, at the Spur National Bank Saturday afternoon and the two men passed several blows. Edgar interfered during the fight and using a knife, inflicted a number of painful cuts about the arm and back of Denson. Eventually the fight ceased, and Denson seeing that he was badly gashed, went to the Nichols Sanitariremained a patient in the Sanitarium during the night.



There was a great deal of interest manifested for introducing this new industry into the country.

The great difficulty in growing wheat in this section has been to secure enough acreage in plots to justify getting a separator to do the threshing. Again, it would be a bad idea for farmers to go heavily into this project to the exclusion of the cotton crop which is our chief money crop at this time.

Don't give up the cotton. That is our money crop. But wheat will often help to make a living on the farm and save the money derived from the sale of cotton.

The introduction of wheat even on a small scale will mean elevators built in our country. These will be a means of taking care of the grain sorghum crops that have been going to waste in this country. It will mean in the long run of a better marketing system and a more evenly distributed income to the country.
