



Steel County, Minnesota, a county two-thirds the size of this county has 24,000 dairy cows on 1800 farms, producing 5,800,000 pounds of butter fat per annum, valued at \$2,500,000.00. Saying nothing nothing of the food value of the skimmed milk for poultry and hogs -has 23 co-operative creameries and one privately owned creamery. Also four large poultry packing plants, handling almost a million dol-lars worth of poultry products annually. What they have accomplished under adverse climate conditions surely we can accomplish here, at least in a limited way, in this splendid climate of ours, so well adapted to dairy cattle and poultry.

The little interest manifested has caused Swift & Company to have their eyes on Dickens County. Right now they are contemplating putting in a creamery and poultry plant in Spur. With sufficient interest in dairying there is no reason why we should not have an up-to-date creamery in Spur within twelve months to amply take care of Dickens County products.

If by intensified farming, fertilizing and terracing, we can grow two or three bales of cotton where one grew before, that alone will mean the difference between success and failure, for it will give us more acreage to grow more feed, which after all, as we all know, is the very foundation of successful diversified farming and diversified stock raising.

We have an abiding faith in Dickens County and Dickens County Folks, and there is yet ample time to lay plans for the most successful year ever, so let's begin, right now, to think and talk more dairy cows, more poultry, more terracing, more octton on fewer acres and by all means MORE FEED ON MORE ACRES.

Progress In Oil Development Growing By Leaps and Bounds Near Spur

This week the work is resumed again on the Mikels well on the Pitch Fork Ranch, and it is the intention of those concerned to push the work rapidly until this well/is completed or reaches the contract depth. Mr. Mikels is taking charge of the field work, and says he expects to stay with it until the well is finished. He is asking the people to standby him a little longer with their encouragement and support, and that he is going to show them that the well is going to be completed. In conversation this week Mr. Mikels said: "I feel very sure of a producer at 1600 feet. Mr. Mikels left Tuesday for the camp to assume supervison of the work. The contractor and drillers had preceeded him to make all arrangements to start work, and they will start the drill the first suitable day.

A few acres of small grain would probably enable a great number of farmers to get by the summer without burdening themselves with heavy endebtness and would place some money in circulation that would be of great value to the country. It would enable these farmers to hedge against the close times which will no doubt visit this country during July and August. It would give a great number of people employment during the harves time.

The business men of Spur have offered to guarantee a seperator if 50 farmers in communities of ten will average 25 acres of small grain each. There iwll be no lack of a sperator if the farmers will plant the stuff and get the proper amount.

A few farmers have planted some wheat and it is looking fine. Man of the mfeel fine over the new project, but want to get more farmers to join them in the industry.

The following formula has been found to give good results in making the poison

bait. Sweet potatoes or carrots__4 quarts Flour paste_____1-4 quart Strychnine alkaloid, powered 1-8 oz. Saccharin or heavy corn syrup */ _____1-32 ounce

The strychnine and syrup should be stirred into the cooked flour paste and then poured over the vegetable cubes which should be stirred until each piece is thinly coated. The bates are now ready for use and should be kept covered in bucket marked poison and dropped into the burrows without touching with the hands. Several hundred burrows a day may be treated in this way and as you go around the field kick or rake the mounds down so that the animals which escape the poison maybe located the next day. Where only a few bates are to be placed strychnine sulphate crystals may be inserted in a cube with the aid of a point of a knife. Trusting this is the information you desire, I am,




