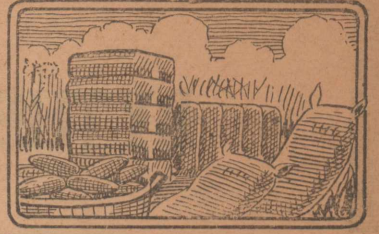

A very sad accident occurred about 1:30 this morning, one mile south of Dickens. D. R. Harkey and a chum were enroute home from Spur, and while making the turn at the Y south of Dickens ran into W. B. Arthur's car with considerable speed. Mr. Arthur saw the boys approaching and stopped to give them all the opportunity possible to get by, but the speed they had prevented them from making the turn. The car which the boys were driving was turned over a number of times.

D. R. received injuries about the head which caused his death within about an hour. Dr. Morris went to give first aid and started to the Nichols Sanitarium with the boy, but he died about two miles north of Spur.

The other occupants received injuries but it is not thought there is anything serious.

Young Harkey was in his seventeenth year, and was the youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Harkey at Dickens. He had spent his life in that community and had a great host of friends.

Probably funeral services will be held at Dickens this afternoon and interment made in Dickens cemetery.

Indications are that Attorney Dan Moody Will lead in the Democratic Primary by a big plurality over Mrs. Ferguson and Lynch Davidson. Reports received at 1:30 this morning showed Moody was still leading the State by 732 votes over all gubernatorial candidates.

The votes stood: Moody 129,418; Mrs. Ferguson 86,197; Lynch Davidson 40,197; Mrs. Johnson 538; Mrs. Wilmans 572; Dr. Zimmerman 792. Votes approximately half in.

Allred is leading for Attorney General by a small margin. The count stood at 1:30 a. m.: Allred 33,085; Brachfield 32,316; Christopher 10,919; Hornsby 20,985; Irwin 24,633; Pollard 31,385.

W. Gregory Hatcher was leading in the State Treasurer's race by a good majority. The vote stood: Ball 31,380; Christian 12,246; Garnett 8,531; Garrett 18,789; Harris 11,570; Hatcher 49,435; Johnson 14,878.

Superintendent, Marrs was leading in the race for State Superintendent of Public Instruction. Count: Bennett 37,127; Humphries 33,164; Marrs 81,468.

Commissioner of Agriculture: Bolin 35,199; Terrell 109,301.

Land Commissioner: Robinson 74,829; Terrell 68,760.

Railroad Commissioner: Baughman 28,827; Speer 39,476; Terrell 72,640

Judge Court of Criminal Appeals: Hawkins 82,924; Pierce 61,033.

Incomplete returns from nine counties of the 10th Congressional District shows Buchanan leading by a small majority. Buchanan 6,669; Hamilton 5,712.

The report came from 196 counties with only 6 complete.

Miss Gordon gave a very interesting demonstration with lurchroom salads and salad dressings. The next meeting will be at the home of Mrs. A. B.

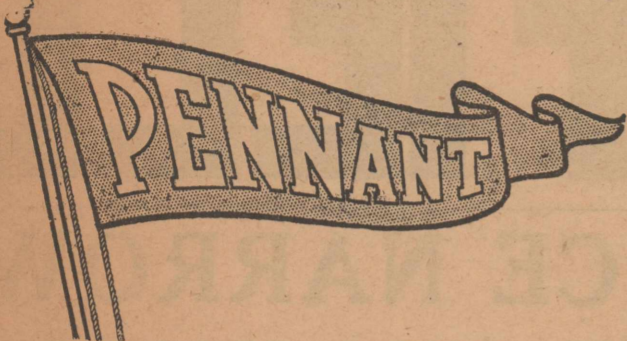

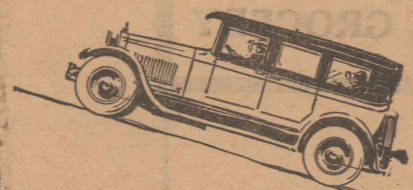
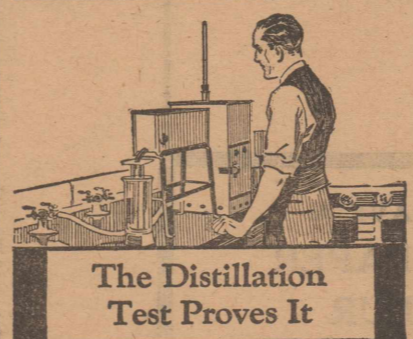
