If Spur will make the needed preparations for schools, the transfers from the other districts will soon pay for a good building. Again, there are near one hundred children in the district that should be in school that are forced to stay out on account of there not being room enough for them.

With a little encouragement our school board would make provision for a bond issue for a building. But that would require time. If the people will get behind this and give assurance that the bond issue would carry, then the business men of the town could afford to underwrite the amount needed for a building. This can be done and the business men no doubt will do it if the people will assure them that the issue will carry. Then a building can be ready within a few weeks at the most, whereas, if we have to wait for the bonds to be voted, approved and sold, it would be three months before the building would be started. The building is needed now.

County Agent Fred S. Reynolds has organized a number of the Boys Clubs in the county, and has secured some very fine work among the boys. The little infant child of Mr. and Mrs. U. C. McClain died Saturday night.

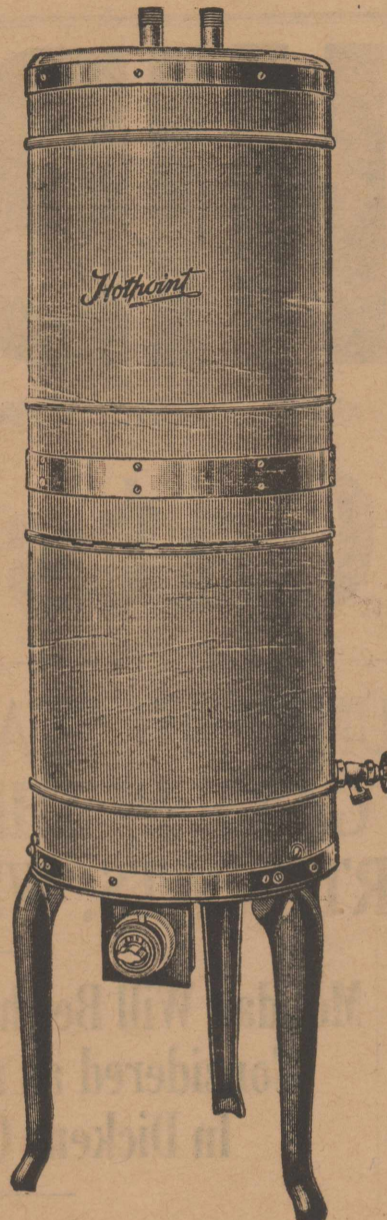

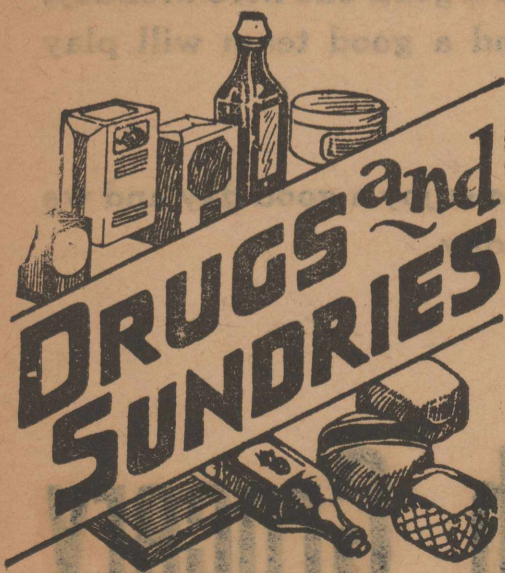

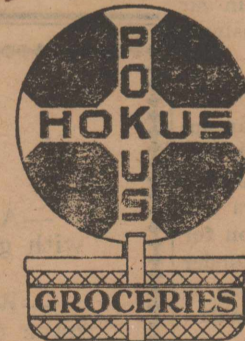
