What the Club Work has done for Dallas. our community can not be told in word, but any one can see by the re sults and visiting the members' homes, and seeing the nice canned fruits, vegetables and meat they have canned for winter and the seasons we can't get vegetables and fruits.

Before we organized our Home Demonstration work here, there wasn't a pressure canner in the community. Now there are six individual canners 60c. and all of them belong to Club members. 



## FELLOW—A REGULAR FELLOW

Detroit Dog in Psychology Tests at Columbia University Startles College Professors

By Robert Fuller (Special to the Times) This is the story of a dog.

A dog five years old which understands innumerable orders without the aid of vision cues and executes them with the apparent intelligence of a child of eight years and the poise, grace and willingness a little too perfect to be human.

"Fellow" is his name, a German shepherd dog owned by Jacob Herbert of Detroit, who brought him to New York this week, to be submitted to a test of intelligence before Professor C. J. Warden's psychology class at Columbia University.

Fellow is five years old. True, he has been a show dog and has appeared in the movies, but, the tests to which he was put at the great university completely eliminated every possibility of a stunt performance— or in other words, a regular routine bag o' tricks done over and over until second nature.

It is estimated that fellow under stands between 300 and 400 words, according to his owner, who also contends that all well-bred animals are a great deal more intelligent than their owners suppose and they will respond as Fellow does if treated in an understanding manner.
