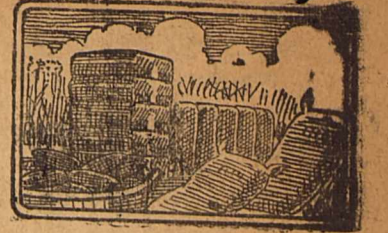

Spur Scouts to Attend Annual Summer Camp Which Will Open July 1st at Post Memorial Camp

The summer camp of the Boy Scouts of the South Plains Era will open at the Post Memorial Camp grounds July 1st. There will be two sessions of the camp this summer in order to accommodate all the Scouts and give them the best advantage of instructions.

Spur Scouts are scheduled to be in camp from July 10 to July 20. All Scouts in the South Plains Era will have an opportunity to spend ten days in camp this summer. There have been seventeen Scouts of Spur troop that have signed up for the summer camp.

H. B. Yates, who is general director for the South Plains Era, will have charge of the camp this summer. Mr. Yates is one of the best Scout workers in America and has been in charge of the camp the past two years. He was in Spur at the Scout meeting last Friday evening and spoke to the Scouts about the summer camp.

This camp grounds is owned by the South Plains Era and every Boy Scout in this Era has an interest in these grounds. It should be understood that Scouts who go to the summer camp are not trespassing on some one's property, for they own an interest in more than four hundred acres for a camp.

The Scouts get an opportunity to get scout instructions at these camps that they can not get in an ordinary way. They come in contact with other scouts and have an opportunity to measure ability with them in contests and otherwise. Also, they get ten days of regular training in which they get regularity, moral attitude, perseverance, and how to treat a fellow Scout. Every boy should be a Scout to learn of the clean life that it instills and fosters. If possible, send the Scouts to Post Memorial Camp July 10th.

Bankers Stress Farm Program

The Texas farmers are reaching a position in the financial world that would be a compliment to any class of business. In former years it has been said that any old Southern "darkey" that could guide a mule down a cotton row farm, but this idea has long since been capable of taking care of a become obsolete in the minds of the business world.

So important has the farming industry of Texas become that the Texas Bankers Association is deeply interested in the farmers success. At their last meeting the Bankers of Texas appointed a committee consisting of a chairman and nine members whose duties will be to study the farming conditions of the state. The state has been divided into nine districts which correlate with the work of the Extension Department of the A. & M. College, and these committees are to cooperate with the District Agricultural Agents in assisting with the farm program of these districts. The farmers of Texas should take a more definite pride in their work, and it is thought they will institute greater and more intense farm programs in their future work. The only purpose of the interests extended by the Texas Bankers is to assist and encourage the farmers of the state to a greater appreciation of the position they hold in the progressive and financial world.

W. B. Lee, Active Vice President of the Spur National Bank, has been asked to serve on the committees and to oversee the work in a West Texas District. Mr. Lee has had much interest in the farming industry of Dickens County, and no doubt this has been brought to the attention of the President of the Texas Bankers Association who appointed the committee.

Hung Jury In Cold Check Case

Mrs. Evah Brown, of Dickens, was arraigned before the local Justice of the Peace Court last Friday charged with swindling. It appeared from evidence in the Court that Mrs. Brown had acquired permission to check on her father's account and had used this privilege a little freely. In course of time her father's account became extinct, but the young lady did not realize this condition and continued writing checks. It appeared there were some fourteen checks marked "insufficient funds".

Complaint was filed and Mrs. Brown hailed before Judge Roddy's Court to give reason why she continued to write checks. Her father R. W. Gray, stated before the court that he had given his daughter permission to write checks, but had told her the funds were gone and she could not get any more checks cashed. It appears this date was after the checks had been issued and all of the jury were not convinced that the actions of the young lady had a tendency toward fraud.

That bran is safe as a cure for diarrhea and yet is unsafe to use as a preventative for diarrhea has been ably demonstrated by one of the ten poultry demonstrators in the county. This poultry demonstrator is very successful with her poultry because she makes special efforts to fix her houses brooders, etc., just as she is instructed. When Mr. Holmgren gave bran as a cure for diarrhea, this woman felt that since it was

a cure why should it not also be used for a preventative. Thus reasoning she began feeding bran to her baby chicks to prevent them taking diarrhea. Last year out of three hundred chicks she did not lose a one. When her chicks began to die off this year, about one every day, she asked the Home Demonstration Agent what was wrong. Upon examination it was found that rickets had developed due to the chickens not getting

enough minerals. The bran had been so filling that it was impossible for the chick to get all the calcium and vitamins that it needed to build the bones correctly. This calcium and vitamins could have been obtained from the sour milk at the same time the sour milk would have been a preventative for diarrhea.

Dorothy Rhodes, a 4-H Club girl member out at Red Mud, at the expense of 40c has new paper for her bedroom. By using several layers of newspapers with two coats of alabastine she has her a colorful room of soft dull pink. IT APPEARING that further delay in repairing said roads is inadvisable and that it is to the best interest of Dickens County to make said emergency contract with said West Texas Tractor and Machinery Company for the purchase of said One Caterpillar 60 Tractor and one Russell Super Model Grader at a price of six thousand nine hundred and fifty-nine (\$6,959.00) dollars payable as hereinafter provided.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED, ADJUDGED AND DECREED, that said contract for the purchase of said tractor and road grader be and the same is hereby in all things adopted, ratified and approved.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED, THAT in accordance with said agreement wherein the West Texas Tractor and Machinery Company agreed to accept Dickens County Road Warrants hereinafter described in payment for said tractor and grader, there shall be issued to the West Texas Tractor & Machinery Company said warrants in the amount of \$6,500.00 to evidence the debt of Dickens County to said company, a cash payment of four hundred fifty-nine (\$459.00) Dollars being paid covering price purchase, there

of said warrants shall be numbered from One (1) to Seven (7) inclusive and shall be in the denomination of One thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars each except warrant Number 1 shall be for five hundred (\$500.00) Dollars, aggregating the sum of \$6,500.00.
