mateoes, 1 cup each chopped ripe to sweet pepper and green pepper, 3-4 cup chopped onion, 1-2 cup sugar, 1 1-2 cups vinegar, and 1-2 teaspoon each ground cloves, allspice, and cin namon. The chopped vegetables are combined with the salt and sugar and allowed to simmer until the mixture begins to thicken. The vinegar and spices are then added and it is cook-ed until it becomes a thick sauce. The sauce is poured into sterilized jars and sealed. This amount makes about 3 pints.


