Some of the projects the girls in the clothing class have chosen are as follows: Making Christmas Gifts; Planning and making own underclothes for one school term, making linens for mother, chool dress for twelve year old sis ter, re-enamel and add color to bedroom, complete care and planning of my wardrobe, making bedroom set, in-cluding scarf, table cover, sheet, etc. foods classes are as follows: preparation of evening meals, canning, marketing, preparation and serving Sunday dinner, t omprove health of tien year old brother, learning to make cake, cleaning closets on Saturdays, etc.

Home projects are required so that our homes may serve as a laboratory for working toward desired goals. We gain knowledge through our own experiences, we develop skill in managing household duties. Our home needs are met, and our abilities are strength ened and thereby become habits thru our home project work.
