FARMERS MUST PAY PROCESS-TAX ON HOGS WHERE SELLING

Commissioner of internal revenue Guy T. Helvering stated today that it has been brought to the attention of the Bureau of Internal Revenue that in many instances farmers and others are slaughtering hogs and selling the products to consumers without payment of the processing tax. This is a violation of the Agricultural Adjustment Act and regulations promulgated thereunder, which provide that any person who slaughters hogs for market must file appropriate returns and pay the processing tax thereon.

The tax applies even in the class of the producer who slaughters his hogs and sells or otherwise disposes of all or any part of the products.

Heavy penalties are provided for violation of this law or evasion of the tax and any person who slaughters hogs and sells all or any part thereof should confer with the collector of internal revenue for his district who will assist him in preparing and filing the required returns.

1934 Model New Fords On Display

The new 1934 Model Ford V-8 can be seen on the salesroom floor at Godfrey & Smart, local Ford dealers. Three types of the new car were received Saturday consisting of the Coupe, the Coach and the four door Sedan.

The new model has many new features over the 1933 model. It has baked enamel similar to that of the high priced types of cars. The new V-shaped sloping radiator gives it a very fine appearance. It has an 85-horse power engine and at the same time gets 2 1-2 miles more per gallon of gas than the old V-8, and has much more pickup.

The dual intake, downdraft Stromberg carburetor and manifold on the new car is quite an improvement over the old car. Then it has a thermostat, water control and oil economy. The easy steering and clear vision ventilating system means much to the driver.

It is said this new car is capable of developing a speed of 80 miles. That should be fast enough for any one.

This County Alloted Sixty Cutter Cows To Be Sold At Once

Dickens County has been alloted sixty cutter cows in the Relief Canning program. These cows are to be sold and paid for at Lubbock at the rate of not less than \$1.75 per cwt. No cows will be bought under this program except on permits. No permits will be issued except by the County Agent, and by them only, to producers of cows; and it is my information that these permits will be issued for designated dates of delivery.

These cows must meet the demand of the market and every precaution must be used in selection of these cows to see that they meet the market demand, which is that they shall carry sufficient flesh, and be healthy.

The limited number of cows alloted to the county necessitates the choosing of a few cows from a number of farms in order to divide the benefits with as large a number as possible. Those having cows which will meet the requirements are requested to list them with the County Agent at once. County Agent.

Peaceful Hill Wins Beautification Of Grounds Contest

Peaceful Hill school won first place in the school ground beautification contest conducted this year with all the schools in the county. Mrs. Madge D. Twaddell, county school superintendent will make the awards. Wilson Draw won second place and Dickens third. Wilson Draw and Dickens tied on the score card but Wilson Draw was given second place because their improvement was made with much less expense than Dickens.

Mr. Charles Whitener outlined the plan of the contest and worked out a score card in January when it was presented to the schools. The score card is as follows: tree planting, 20 points; grading and shaping the grounds, 15 points; shrubbery planting, 20 points; parking and flower planting, 20 points; building walks, 15 points; total 100 points.

All the schools did quite a bit of work on their buildings and grounds this past winter and spring but several made no permanent improvements and therefore did not score very high. Red Mud made a wonderful improvement by rebuilding and painting their building but did not finish in time to do any work with plantings.

Mrs. Twaddell and Mr. Whitener are starting a follow-up contest for next year with foundation plantings of native and flowering shrubbery. Planting plans are being drawn and work will begin on the second contest right away. Miss Clara Pratt, County demonstration agent, is assisting the schools in laying out foundation plans.

VARIETY

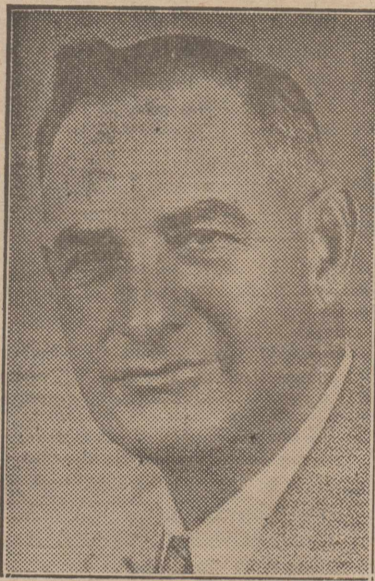

State Teachers Association

The State Teachers Association met at Austin this year from November 30 to December 2, inclusive. Attendance was the largest in several years. Many Dickens County teachers were present. Those who attended were: Proton School: H. L. Groner, Mrs. Mabel Groner, Miss Amelia Hargis, Mrs. Jo Koonsman, H. P. Hargis. Prairie Chapel: Miss Jewel Morris. Afton: C. W. Giesecke, Tom Porter, Miss Ruth Cammack, Miss Nora Baxter, Miss Sally Rattan, Mrs. Jennie Jackson. Wichita: Miss Leonora Lisenby. Espuela: S. L. Bennefield, Mrs. S. L. Bennefield. Spur: Sam Z. Hall, R. B. Neilson, David Sisto and others. McAdoo: W. O. Cherry, Miss Mabel King, Miss Lois Beckett and Mrs. M. D. Twaddell, County School Superintendent. Prominent out of state educators were there. The central theme of discussion was school finance. The State Teachers Association has done much for education in Texas and patrons should be proud of the fact that their teachers have enough interest in their work and the cause of education to support their professional organization. Most of the teachers of the county are members of the T. S. T. A.

in all the schools of the county Every effort is being made to secure federal aid for school improvement through the CWA. The CWA is designed to aid unemployed persons of adult age regardless of their financial condition through work of a public nature which will be of lasting benefit to the people of the country. With the valuable assistance of the County Home Demonstration Agent, Miss Clara Pratt, all the schools of the county have been visited and projects planned which if approved will mean several thousand dollars to the county and much needed repair and improvement for the school. Wages will be paid by the CWA at the rate of forty cents an hour for unskilled labor, and up to a dollar an hour for skilled labor. Projects that have been planned include a variety of things, such as: Clearing and leveling grounds; repairing buildings; water systems, stovds, playground equipment; making reading tables, bookcases, shelves, lockers, etc.; laying out school gardens, sub-irrigating gardens, flowers, shrubbery, and trees; cleaning and painting of buildings; repair roofs; building coal bins; constructing athletic grounds for track and field events and other contests. Efforts are being made to get teachers for crowded schools unable to employ extra teachers, librarians for schools that need them and for the County School Circulating Library. We think that a county nurse and possibly a a sanitarian will be obtained.

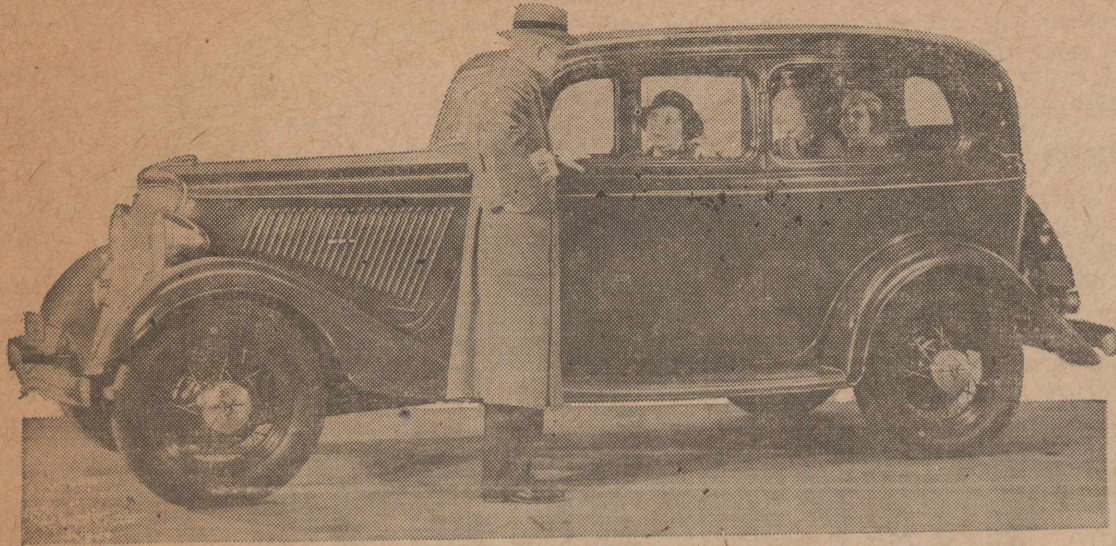

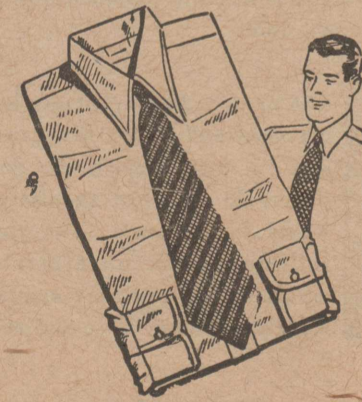

WHAT ABOUT THE HOME REMEDIES

Who wants to buy their home remedies from a medicine bootlegger or a racketeer? That's just where we will have to get them if the Tugwell Food and Drug Act (T. F. D. A.) becomes a law. The proponents of the bill

say no. But analyze the facts. The requirements of this bill make it unattractive to advertise. You have to place your formula on the label and who wants to advertise a formula that becomes common property. Then your statements have to be approved by 51 per cent of the medical profession. You have a number of home remedies

that are reliable in your medicine chest; ointments, liniments, laxatives and others. How did they originally get there? You learned about them thru advertising or thru a friend who recommended them. Can't you see? No advertising, no home remedies. Unless you patronize a bootlegger or medicine peddler who can secretly put any thing on his label or circulars. His product does not enter into interstate commerce.

The present food and Drug law which is adequate has practically banished the street faker. Why? Because people have learned to buy reliable remedies from their druggists. Who wants to bring back the fakers and racketeers? The new bill will eventually abolish reliable home remedies and thereby open a big field for the bootleggers who are now going out of business.

We are just getting rid of an unpopular law that was impossible to enforce. Why go thru with another sorry experience.

TEN GIRLS CLUBS ORGANIZED

Ten 4-H clubs have been organized and reorganized within the last week with an enrollment of 112 girls. The clubs organized are in Dry Lake, Espuela, Duncan Flat, Afton, Prairie Chapel, Croton, Dickens, McAdoo, and Duck Creek. Officers were elected and demonstrators enrolled in each club. The officers are president, vice president, secretary, reporter and song leader. Each club is to have a sponsor who may be one of the teachers or a mother of one of the girls or some woman in the community who will meet with the girls and help them to reach their goals.

Demonstrations to be carried with the girls in 1934 are bedroom improvement and gardening. Each club must have one demonstrator in each demonstration; the demonstrator is a girl who follows the plans outlined by the extension Service at A & M College. She must have the cooperation of her parents and with them and the assistance of the home demonstration agent plan the work she will do. The other girls are called cooperators and may do all or part of the work as the demonstrators but they are expected to achieve the goal set for the cooperator in the county. In bedroom work the goals for the cooperators are to make her bed correctly 25 times, make a pair of pillow slips, and have a clothes closet, a shoe rack and a shelf that stands for hats. In the garden work each girl is ex-

pected to grow 100 feet of spinach, learn to use it and can at least ten containers; grow 50 feet of carrots, learn to use them and can at least ten containers; can 25 containers of tomatoes. To each girl achieving all six goals will be given a 4-H club pin at the close of the year's club work.

NINETY PER CENT FARM FAMILIES ARE REACHED

A final check of the expansion work of the home demonstration work reveal that 1,109 families were reached and definitely reported in the expansion work sponsored by the county home demonstration council this

year. The goal set at the beginning of the year by the councils was to reach 100 per cent of the farm families in the county. Since there are 1228 farm families in the county the 1,109 families is 90 per cent of the total.

There are 301 home demonstration club members in clubs this year; 158 men members in the 4-H clubs. There are 458 different families from these two groups; the club members report having helped 376 non-club families in their expansion program, the home demonstration agent reached 305 other non-club families making a total of 1,109. No doubt many others were helped through the newspapers and personally that were not reported.

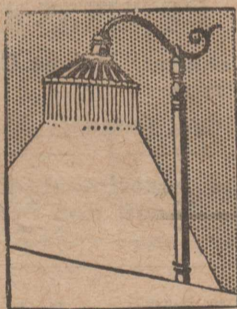

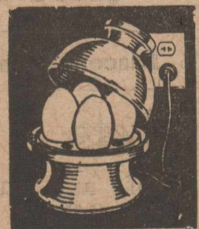

LIEUT. GOV. EDGAR E. WITT ASKS TO BE GOVERNOR

Lieutenant Governor Edgar E. Witt announced from Waco Saturday his candidacy for the Governorship of Texas in the Democratic primaries of next summer. The Lieutenant Governor recalls, in his formal statement, that he was educated in the public schools of Texas, and at the University of Texas, that the voters of the thirteenth senatorial district had elected him to the State Senate in 1918 before he had returned from military service, that they re-elected him for 12 years until 1930 he was elected Lieutenant Governor by all of the people, and in 1932 re-elected by the largest vote ever given a candidate for office in the state

of Texas. He expresses great gratitude for what the State has done for him, and a pledge to serve its best interests devotedly if he is elected Governor.

He comes out for lower taxation on homes and farms, for better schools and improved state departments of government, for prevention of corporate exploitation accompanied by real

encouragement for legitimate business and industry, for a practical subsistence farm plan in aid of needy families, for submission of the prohibition provision in the state constitution to a vote by the people.

He pledges his hearty fealty to the recovery program and the social idealism of President Roosevelt, and ends with the significant statement

that he hopes his candidacy will afford the voters an opportunity to cast their vote for a candidate rather than against one.

That delicious pear, the Bartlett, is still plentiful and inexpensive, though other varieties are beginning to come into market. The only peaches now available are the big Californias which are beautiful to look at but not distinctively flavored.

The cabbage and its higher caste relatives are beginning to dominate the vegetable market. Cauliflower is of high quality and very reasonable. Broccoli and Brussels Sprouts are available but will be more plentiful and cheaper later.

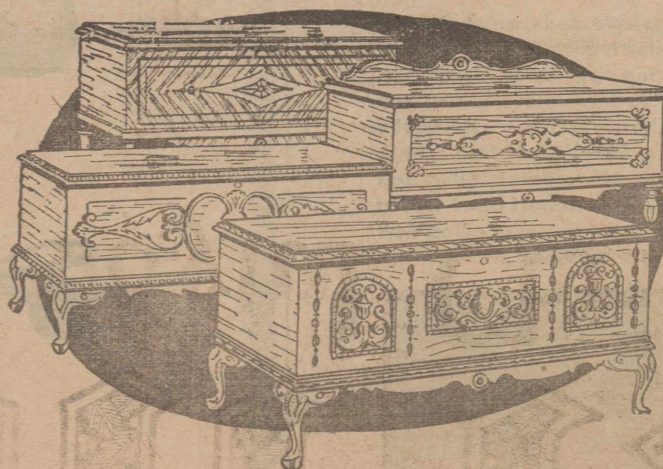

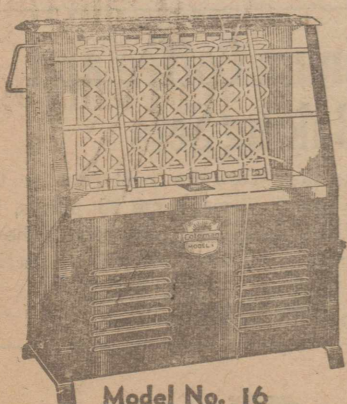
