### Farmers Standards To Improve In New Cotton Stamp Prog.

of cotton this year, the farmer not only will keep down the cotton surplus but will provide himself with more cotton goods," the committeeman said.

Under the provisions of the Supplementary Cotton Program, payments of cotton stamps will be made to farms on which the acreage planted to cotton in 1941 is reduced below the 1941 allotment of the 1940 planted to cotton in 1941 is reduced below the 1941 allotment of the 1940 planted acreage, whichever is smaller. The stamp payment will be at the rate of 10 cents per pound on the normal cotton yield for the reduced acreage.
