County Library Receives Books

A new shipment of modern and up-to-the-minute books of fiction were received by the Dickens County Library this week. Among the number are four of the most popular books at this time: namely, The Nazarine, novel based on the life of Christ, by Sholem Asch; Kitty Foyle, novel by Christopher Morley; Moment in Peking, a Chinese novel by Lin Yutang; and Grapes of Wrath by

The Nazarene presents a sweepng, glowing pancrama of Jerusalem and the provinces nearly two thousand years ago, during the most dramatic period of human history. It recreates the splendors of the wealthy and despair of the seething ocpulace crushed under the iron hand of Rome. The dry dust of history is moulded again into life, and as we read we are ourselves living in the time, sensing every moment the colors, the sounds, and even the smells of reality as we move through each successive scene. By an extraordinarily successful device Asch so tells his story that we see it from three different angles, of the Roman, of a disciple of the Nazarene, of a young man of the people of Jerusalem. This book was the most widely read book in the United States during the month of December according to the New York Herald Tribune's weekly book review.

Kitty Foyle is the natural history of a woman. It is a nevel which never seems to be written; it is a woman thinking. In the oncoming crisis of her life, one that every civilized woman faces though often unconsciously, it is necessary for her to think over what has happened up to her present age of 28. One must suppose that someone just happened to be around and overheard her. any rate the story of Kitty Foyle, thought by herself to herself, would never intentionally be put on paper. The story is deep with humor and courage and pathos, and the candor every woman recognizes and knows it best to conceal.




