



CITY ORDINANCE NO. 11

An ordinance regulating Gas Piping, Appliances, Fixtures and Apparatus in all buildings and structures of Gas Consumers...

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MULESHOE:

Section 1: That the City Plumbing Inspector and his assistants be and they are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to supervise all gas piping, appliances, fixtures and apparatus...

And it is further ordained that no gas appliance, fixture or apparatus shall be installed until type of said gas appliance, apparatus or fixture has been approved by the City Plumbing Inspector or his assistant.

Section 2: That the said City Plumbing Inspector and his assistants be and they are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to enter any building or other places, either public or private...

Section 3: No person, firm or corporation shall enter upon the installation, reconstruction, repair of such gas piping, appliances, fixtures or apparatus or any change thereof...

Sureties shall be a surety company duly authorized to do business in the State of Texas, conditioned for the faithful performance of all such work entered upon or contracted for in strict accordance and compliance with the terms, requirements and provisions of this ordinance...

Section 4: The size of the pipe shall not be less and the length of the pipe and the number of burners shall not exceed figures set in the following schedule: (Continued on next page.)

hot air furnaces, boilers, etc., must have two or three air mixers.
1 1/2-inch pipe.
The same with four or five mixers.
1 3/4-inch pipe; for larger installations, approval of size shall be secured from City Plumbing Inspector.

mixers must not be placed in air tight ash boxes, but where a free flow of air can reach them at all times.
No house riser shall be less than 3/4-inch pipe.

branching for cooking stoves shall be less than 3/4-inch pipe.
Use as few elbows as possible; elbows not absolutely necessary will be condemned. When impossible to get through an obstruction such as a beam, offset the pipe rather than use elbows.
For all large buildings the plans for piping should be taken up directly with the City Plumbing Inspector before any pipe is installed. All piping for fixtures with a great number of burners on them will have to be made larger accordingly.

Gas is never to be supplied from a smaller pipe to a larger pipe.
White lead or other joining material should be used sparingly so as not to clog the pipe.
The riser must be extended to a point within 18 inches of the location of the meter, and to right of same at least 20 inches above floor.
Meter should not be located near furnaces or ovens, locked in compartments or placed in any other position where they will be inaccessible to fire or injury. Under no condition will a fitter or plumber or other person disconnect any meter, connect or disturb piping between main and meter.

When to accommodate different tenants, one or more meters are desired in a given building, the gas supplying company will set as many meters as there are separate consumers connecting the meters to one service pipe, provided that the risers or pipes leading to these different tenants be extended to within 18 inches of the proposed location of the meters, which are to be set in the same location.
Risers should not be scattered, but should drop together in alignment to the room where meters are to be set. They should be kept at least three inches apart, and should not extend less than 20 inches from the floor.
Union and valves must not be used in concealed work, but long threads, if necessary, should be used.

Long runs of horizontal pipe should be firmly supported at short intervals by metal fasteners to prevent sagging.
All branch outlet pipes should be taken from the sides or tops of running lines, never from below.
Bracket pipes should be run from below when practicable. Drop extensions must be supported with at least three supports, one under pipe at drop, one across drop between cap or ell or bend and one half-way between drop and main pipe. All supports are to be 3 x 1 inch or larger lumber. Two supports must be used for all bracket extensions, one directly under riser ell and one half way between ell and main supply pipe.
House pipes should be so run and covered as to be readily accessible. No cast iron fittings smaller than 3 inches are to be used.

No individual, firm or corporation shall enter upon any excavation, construction or reconstruction of any work provided for herein until a permit has been issued by the City Plumbing Inspector, covering each installation or addition to be made, and when required by the said City Plumbing Inspector, plans and specifications for the proposed work must be filed with him before the permit is granted or during the progress of said work; provided, however, the City Plumbing Inspector may issue a general permit to any individual, firm or corporation owning or controlling any building for a term not exceeding three (3) months from the date thereof, authorizing minor alterations or changes, but such permit shall be revocable. No permits will be required for the repair or adjustment of gas piping, appliances, fixtures and apparatus.

Section 5: When the plumber or fitter has completed the system of piping and has all full drop and bracket extensions and heater openings firmly and permanently fastened, he shall test the piping and if found tight file a written application for tests with the City Plumbing Inspector and the City Plumbing Inspector or such assistants will call and inspect the piping and witness the test, and if the City Plumbing Inspector or such assistant finds the piping tight and the size and work in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance, then the City Plumbing Inspector or such assistants will issue and deliver proper certificate to such effect.

The piping must be tight under a pressure of ten inches of mercury column. This test will be made before the fixtures are hung and appliances connected and before the piping closed in. The use of gas fitter's cement, or any other sealer, is strictly prohibited. Any additional piping or outlets installed after a certificate is granted must be reported for inspection and test.

No gas fitter, plumber or other person doing work in any house or structure shall conceal any of said gas piping until certificate of inspection is issued and inspection card attached to said piping.
Section 6: If any person, firm or corporation shall fail or refuse to remedy any defects found by the City Plumbing Inspector or his assistants in any work, provided for herein, within seventy-two hours after notice to do so, the City Plumbing Inspector shall not issue any further permits to such person, firm or corporation until such defects are remedied; or if it is shown that said person, firm or corporation is incompetent to do such work, then the license of such person, firm or corporation shall be subject to forfeiture by the City Council. The City Council may forfeit the license of any person, firm or corporation for violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance or such future ordinance of the City of Muleshoe as may hereafter be passed; provided, that the forfeiture of any such license shall not in any manner affect the liability of the principal or sureties on the bond of any person, firm or corporation for any work here-in provided for previously done by such person, firm or corporation; also, provided that in the event that the license of any person, firm or corporation issued under the terms of this ordinance is not renewed within the term of this ordinance, and the license of the City of Muleshoe, pertaining thereto, said person, firm or corporation shall not be granted another license for a period of one year after the date of the cancellation of previous license.

hereby authorized to disconnect such gas piping, appliances, fixtures and apparatus, or to cause the service of gas to such consumers to be discontinued until the person or persons owning or using such gas piping, appliances, fixtures, apparatus or material shall cause the same to be put in safe condition and tested and approved by the City Plumbing Inspector.
When any gas piping, appliances, fixtures, apparatus or material of any nature whatsoever has been in any manner disconnected and rendered inoperative by the City Plumbing Inspector or the service discontinued as set forth in the foregoing provisions, it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to in any manner reconnect the same or cause the same to be re-connected to any supply of gas or to use the same as a part of any gas piping system until they have been put in safe condition and a certificate of acceptance has been issued by the City Plumbing Inspector.
Section 8: In every gas installation all piping and attachments must be of at least such capacity as will supply gas up to the full maximum requirements of all appliances contemplated to be connected thereon according to the requirements of this ordinance.
No gas piping, appliances, fixtures or apparatus, or the installation, construction, reconstruction or repair thereof, for which a permit is issued shall be used or connected to any supply of gas until inspected and accepted by the City Plumbing Inspector.
No gas piping, appliances, fixtures or apparatus, or the installation, construction, reconstruction or repair thereof, for which a permit is issued shall be used or connected to any supply of gas until inspected and accepted by the City Plumbing Inspector.

Section 9: Any gas piping, appliances, fixtures and apparatus, or the installation, construction, reconstruction or repair thereof, for which a permit is issued shall be held at least twenty-four hours after the same are filed. It is required that said individual, firm or corporation or his or its representatives shall personally inspect every installation before a card for inspection is filed and that all work for which the inspection is asked shall be complete.
Application for re-inspection must be made out on new cards the same as of the original application, stating whether the first, second or third inspection

telephone or verbal requests will not be considered.
When any gas piping, appliance, fixture or apparatus is found to have been installed without proper permit or not in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance, the City Plumbing Inspector, or his assistants, is hereby authorized and empowered to prevent any supply of gas thereto or to the consumer until such permit has been secured from the said City Plumbing Inspector and such work inspected or re-inspected, and approved.
Applications for inspection shall be filed with the said City Plumbing Inspector and accompanied by a fee of One (\$1.00) Dollar for the first two gasings and 25 cents for each opening thereafter. A fee of One (\$1.00) Dollar shall be charged for each inspection after the second inspection made on condemned installations for each opening.

Before any such gas piping, appliances, fixtures, or apparatus constructed or furnished under permit hereafter granted, shall be approved, or any certificate of acceptance of the same shall be granted, the said work must be complete, and in compliance with the provisions of this ordinance.
Plumbers or gas fitters shall consult Gas Company for the location of meters before starting job. The plumber or gas fitter shall be held responsible for any changes in meter risers installed in locations not authorized by gas company.
Section 9: Any gas installation not specifically covered by this ordinance must be approved by the City Plumbing Inspector.

Section 10: All powers conferred by this ordinance upon the City Plumbing Inspector are hereby likewise conferred upon his assistants and such assistants and each of them may likewise exercise all such powers.
Section 11: That any person, firm or corporation who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance, or who shall fail to comply with the require-

ments of this ordinance, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not exceeding Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars, and each and every day's continuance of any violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall constitute and be deemed a separate offense. That in case of any such violation of any of the terms or provisions of this ordinance by any corporation, the officers and agents actually in charge of the business of such corporation or the person or persons actually performing the work for such corporation, shall be subject to the penalties herein provided.
Section 12: The fact that from improper and unsuitable gas work, already constructed and being constructed and maintained daily, danger constantly arises both to persons and property, creates an emergency on account of the immediate preservation of the public safety requiring that this ordinance take effect at once and it is accordingly ordained that this ordinance shall take effect immediately after its passage and approval.

Section 13: All connections to stoves or any fixtures must be made with wrought iron union joints.

Passed, adopted and approved this 21st day of March, 1930.

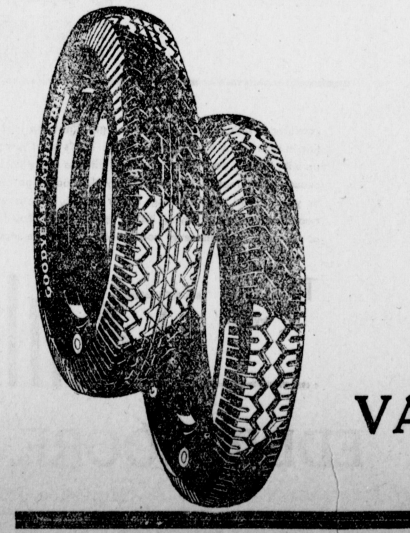

**CITY ORDINANCE NO. 13, CON.**  
 Newly installed in buildings of any structure four or more stories in height as herein provided for.

(a) Cast iron soil pipe and waste pipe fittings must be cast iron and must extend from three feet outside of building wall up to the first vent, except in yard cleanouts.

(b) All branches must be standard C. I. All branches must be made with Ys and one-eighth bends and cleanouts provided and made accessible when practicable. Branch to sink waste must be connected into soil pipe between closet and sewer, and sink wastes from hotels and boarding houses must be run to grease trap as hereinafter provided for.

Number of water closets, 1 to 5—4 inches; No. of water closets, 6 to 15—3 inches; No. of water closets, 16 to 40—2 inches; No. of slop sinks, 1 to 2—2 inches; No. of slop sinks, 3 to 3—2 inches; No. of kitchen sinks, 1—1½ inches; No. of kitchen sinks, 2 to 3—2 inches; No. of kitchen sinks, 4 to 5—2 inches; No. of kitchen sinks, 6 to 8—2 inches; No. of urinals, 1—1½ inches; No. of urinals, 2 to 3—2 inches; No. of urinals, 4 to 6—3 inches; No. of urinals, 7 to 10—3 inches; No. of wash trays, 1 to 3—3 inches; No. of wash trays, 4 to 10—4 inches; No. of both tubs or showers, 2 to 10—2 inches; No. of lavatories, 1—1½ inches; No. of lavatories, 2 to 4—1½ inches; No. of lavatories, 5 to 20, 2 inches; No. of lavatories, 21 to 40—2 inches.

Section 7: Soil or waste pipes placed in any building for future use shall be vented, tested and subjected to the same rules in every respect as if intended for immediate use, and all openings closed by screwplugs or caulked or soldered.

Old house plumbing can be connected with the sewer only when it is found on examination by the plumbing inspector to conform in all respects to the regulations governing plumbing.

Section 8: No soil, drain or vent pipe shall be covered from view or concealed until after work has been tested, or examined and approved by Plumbing Inspector, and the Plumbing Inspector shall be notified when the work is ready for inspection and shall be made or shall prepare the whole system of plumbing for the Plumbing Inspector to make proper test same by filling the pipes with water or an air pressure of five pounds in the square inch.

Section 9: (a) Traps to all both tubs, soda fountains, bar fixtures, wash trays and refrigerators, must be drum traps with trap screws at least three inches in diameter and trap must be so constructed as to provide a water seal of at least three inches in depth. The outlet from all lead drum traps must be wiped into the trap at least 1½ inches below the water line and extend upward at an angle of 45 degrees to proper height and continued and graded with uniform fall to soil or waste pipe.

(b) Traps for lavatories must be lead or brass traps with seal of not less than 1½ inches in depth and a discharge capacity to equal 1½ inch pipe, provided with cleanout or trap screw, or so constructed to afford access in case of stoppage.

(c) Traps for urinals must be lead, cast iron or brass traps with seal of not less than 1½ inches and a discharge capacity to equal 1-1/3 inch pipe. It shall be arranged to be either C. I. or brass, or so constructed to afford access in case of stoppage.

(d) Wastes from refrigerators or other receptacles in which provisions are stored shall not be connected directly with the drainage system, but shall be arranged to waste into an open tray in plain sight below, this tray may be connected to drainage system upon being properly trapped and vented, drum traps to be used, or may be connected to catch basins the same as floor drains.

(e) Waste pipe from kitchen sinks in any hotel, restaurant, boarding house or other public cooking place shall be run separate to a grease trap in yard when practicable, and when same is not practicable, it shall be run to a grease trap must be placed below this sink. All grease traps must be built according to plan on file in office of Plumbing Inspector.

(f) Drains from wash racks in brewery stables shall discharge into a catch

basin built of concrete or brick and cemented and made water tight. All such basins to be built according to plans on file in Plumbing Inspector's office. The same rule applies to receptacles in bar.

(g) Floor drains must discharge into a catch basin which must have a water seal of not less than 1½x18x18 inches size, water tight and constructed of brick and concrete and masticed inside at least one inch thick, or of wooden box lined with six pound sheet lead.

All traps and fixtures must be vented, using either extra heavy cast iron vent pipe or extra heavy cast iron pipe. Branch vents to closets may be constructed to drain toward waste pipe, the ends of all galvanized vent pipe or pipes below level of fixtures must be well reamed and all fittings used in construction thereof must be galvanized. Branch vents to closets must be connected to main vent pipe through a trap, and when a branch vent pipe is connected to branch of soil or waste pipe just below use of floor and above any waste connections, wired, or connected to said soil or waste pipe, it must be connected to main vent pipe when there is only one closet on one (1) four-inch stack, when closets are not more than three feet from stack. When a vent pipe from a trap connects into a vent from another, the said connections must be made at least one foot above the highest fixture.

When a stack or vent pipe, extended through a roof is used, it shall be fifteen feet from any opening above said stack or pipe the said stack or pipe must be extended at least two feet above the top of opening.

Flat roof vents must extend at least six inches above the fire wall. No caps, cowls or bends shall be affixed to the top of any stacks or vents, wire

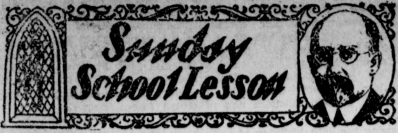

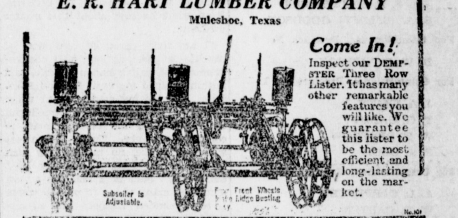

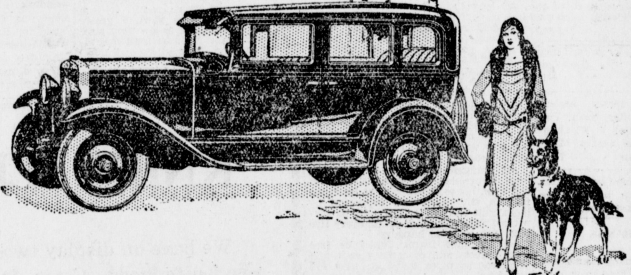

Pleated frills and ruffles are attractive, but they lose their charm once they have been washed. Be sure that the buttons used to fasten the cuffs or to provide ornament to the blouse are of the washable sort.

It is always wiser to select a blouse made of one color than one in which a colored material is used for trimming on a light blouse. If the color "runs" a little in the wash no harm is done in the monotone blouse—whereas if a colored material is used on a light blouse a little "running" will be disastrous.
