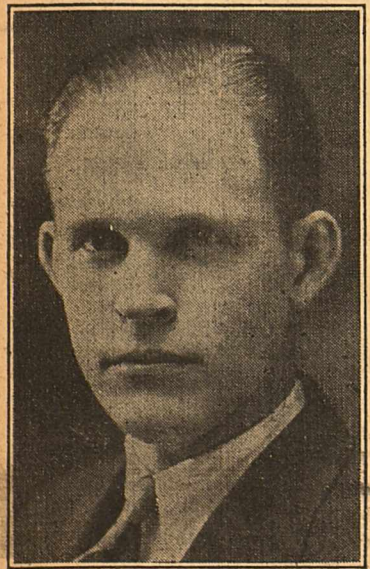

Lubbock To Have Station For NYA Amateur Radio

Plans have been completed and license received for an amateur radio station to be located at the NYA boys resident center on the Texas Tech campus, according to A. V. Bullock, District Director. It is planned to have at least two other such stations in the Lubbock District, one at Snyder and one at Lamesa.

These short wave stations, that offer no interference to radio in any way, will soon be in operation for a point-to-point communication in all National Youth Administration Districts in Texas. By this method, Bullock stated, we plan to train many of our NYA employees to become short wave radio operators as a tie-in with the National Defense program. NYA officials state that the goal in amateur short wave radio stations in Texas was twenty-four by the first of this month with hopes of possibly setting up forty point-to-point stations this year.

Boys on the Resident Center at Texas Tech have formed a Club to be known as El Moson Radio Club. Ralph Frank Lee, NYA District supervisory employee, is Trustee of the local station and the call letters given the station are W5-JBR.

Student Transfers To Be Made In July

Transfers of public school students from one district to another must be made during July, O. L. Kelley, County Superintendent, said this week.

Transfers may be made to other districts when grades of the students being transferred are not taught in their home districts, Kelley said.

Parents residing in districts that are to be transferred to another district by contract need not make application for transfer of their children if they are to attend school in the district which is to be contracted.

Tuition will be charged on any child transferred to another district if the child's grade is taught in his home district, Kelley pointed out.

Each child who needs to transfer must transfer each year. One transfer for all years will not suffice, Kelley added.

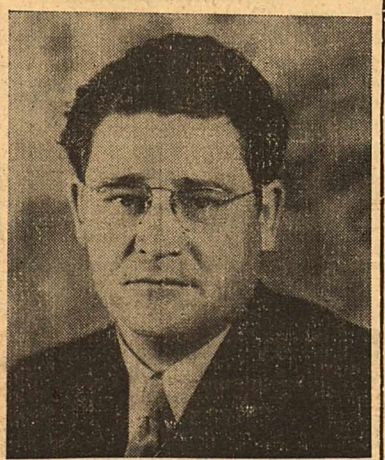
GIRARD-DICKENS COUNTY SING-SONG TO MEET JULY 14

475 Dickens County Farms Have Loans

Farmers in Dickens County will save about \$20,700 a year as a result of legislation just enacted by Congress affecting interest rates on Federal Land Bank and Land Bank Commissioner loans.

The temporary rate of 3 1/2% on first mortgage Land Bank loans will be continued for two years ending June 30, 1942. During this period the interest rate on the 1st and 2nd mortgage Land Bank Commissioner loans will be reduced from 4 to 3 1/2%. Land Bank and Commissioner loans were originally written at contract rates averaging about 5 per cent.

At present about 475 Dickens County farmers have Land Bank and Commissioner loans outstanding aggregating \$1,884,084. The difference between the contract rate and the temporary thus affects a substantial saving for the farmers.

In a statement from Washington, A. G. Black, Governor of the Farm Credit Administration, said that the saving to farmers through the reduced interest rate will have the same effect as an addition to the farmer's net income.

"The ultimate purpose of the reduced interest rate on Land Bank and Commissioner loans is to help farmers keep down their fixed charges and thus have more income for the retirement of debt principal, or to meet necessary operating and living expenses," Governor Black said.

"Money saved on interest charges will thus be reflected in increased purchasing power, benefiting both industry and agriculture, and also will help in a measure to raise farm living standards and safeguard farm ownership."

Bob Farrell will receive his Lone Star Farmer degree. Bob and Kenneth will be delegates from Spur, and Kenneth has also been elected as an official delegate from area one.

Cecil Ayers, Vocational Agriculture teacher of Spur, is chairman of Area One Lone Star Chapter Committee and will play a big part in setting up the program for next years work.

New FFA Chapter Added To Area 1

A new FFA chapter has been added to the Area one, the new chapter added is Jayton which has not had any vocational agriculture work taught in the schools until now.

Prentice Allen is the teacher in the Jayton school. He is a graduate of Texas Tech and took up the work July 1st.

Insurance For 1941 Crops Underway

The 1941 all-risk wheat crop insurance program is underway over most of the Texas wheat section with only a few county AAA offices not yet accepting applications.

More than 100 county offices have received their wheat acreage allotments for 1941 and are accepting crop insurance applications with prospects bright for greatly increased participation during the program's third year of operation, according to E. R. Duke, state crop insurance supervisor.

"Better understanding of the program on the part of the producers and proof of the soundness of wheat crop insurance assure us of a substantial increase in participation this year," the supervisor observed.

On the 1939 crop 3,700 Texas producers insured their wheat production of 2,516,168 bushels and collected indemnities totaling 1,020,788 bushels. Approximately 11,000 producers insured their crop of 5,227,699 bushels with indemnity payments to date amounting to more than 500,000 bushels under the 1940 program.

Federal Crop Insurance Corporation reserves in Texas are stored in Gainesville, Wichita Falls, Fort Worth, and Amarillo, but these stocks are being distributed to other points for the sake of convenience.

Crop insurance rates are calculated on an actuarial basis with the rates varying for different farms and different counties according to crop loss experience and yields in those localities, explained Mr. Duke.

Dr. Cox's Weekly Health Letter

"America has with good reason to become preparedness-conscious. World events have emphasized the individual's welfare and the nation's fighting power to a point where it can meet any exigencies which the future may present. While in the present preparedness program the greater emphasis is being placed upon the production of mechanized equipment, the armed forces continue to be aware of the need of physical fitness in their personnel," declares Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

good sense and patriotism demand it. "Whether in peace or in war, a country is only as strong as its people. But it is equally true that real and happy living to the greatest possible extent can only be enjoyed by those who, by a rational observance of nature's basic laws, are giving their bodies a square deal.

"In this connection, the logic of surrounding the young with preventives available through science is obvious. Immunization against diphtheria, smallpox vaccination, proper food in proper amounts, sufficient sleep and rest, and the removal of remedial physical defects merely represent sound judgement and an essential parental duty," Dr. Cox pointed out.

"But to stop at this point is to fall short of the individual's and the nation's need. All adults profitably could take stock of their habits, eliminate those which they know are detrimental, obtain medical advice on others concerning which they have reasonable doubts, and strive in a sensible, rational manner to develop and keep maximum health and vitality.

"In short, the physical examination to discover possible physical defects, and a non-fanatical adherence to fundamental requirements in food, rest, exercise, and other essentials are points that should not be overlooked by an adult who has at heart not only his personal happiness and health, but the interest of the beneficent nation in which he lives."

What Becomes Of The Farmers

"If we're going to further mechanize our work in agriculture in West Texas, how is a young man going to get started in farming?"

That was the question asked by A. H. Leidigh, dean of agriculture at Texas Technological college, Monday afternoon in a speech before representatives of co-operative here for a school in co-operative information.

Dean Leidigh also asked where the families are to go from the farms while the number of farms in Texas is being reduced. He did not present his opinions in answer to those questions, but presented data from recent publications, as follows:

"There was a 34 per cent increase in the number of tractors and a 57 per cent increase in re-

bates on gasoline from 1936 to 1938. The number of tractors in Texas is estimated from 99,000 to 116,000. Each tractor displaces 9 1/2 head of work stock.

"If tractors displace 846,000 work stock in three years, that number of tractors will result in displacement of 3,000,000 acres of feed which previously would have been grown for work stock.

"The farmer buys from 1,000 to 1,200 gallons a year per tractor.

"Under mechanized conditions, the number of farms will decrease constantly."

"This kind of movement will take 10,000 families off the farm a year," said the dean. "If farms are bigger, what will become of the people?"

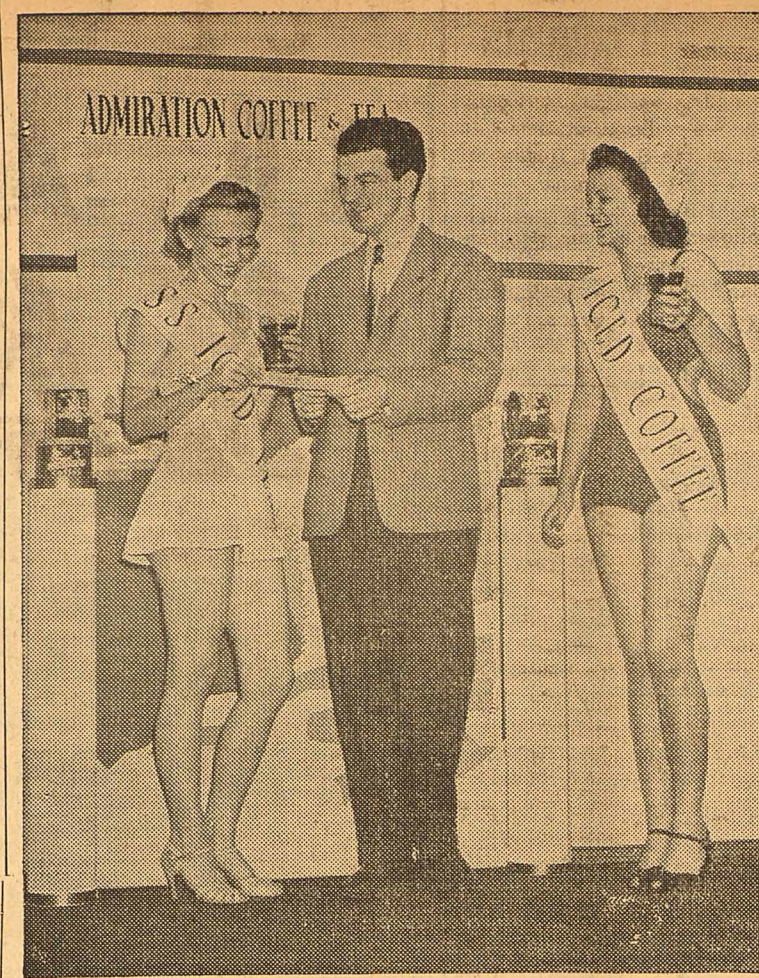

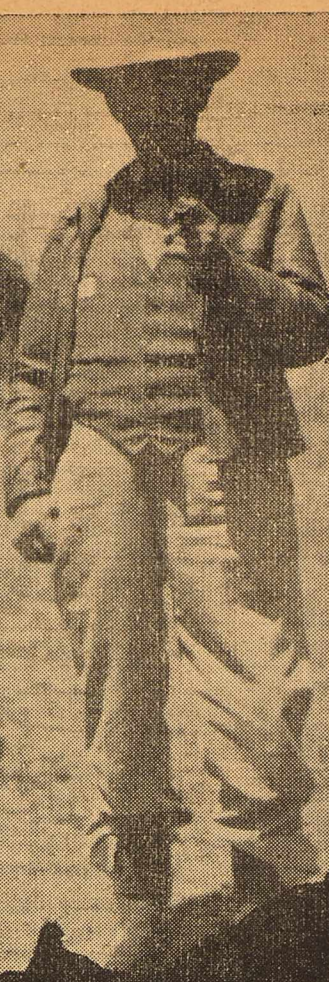

Norris' Home Town Rejects Municipal Light Plant Bonds

Sentiment against municipal ownership of electric plants last week was manifested by voters in Wellington, Texas, and McCook, Nebraska-home town of U. S. Senator Norris who allegedly has used his franking privileges to promote political control of utilities.

Viewed as a personal defeat for Norris was the overwhelming vote at McCook where, in a special election, citizens turned down by more than 8 to 1 a proposal to issue \$425,000 in revenue bonds for the purchase of the local light plant system. The ballot was 1,110 against and 136 for the proposal.

Voters at Wellington turned down assimilar proposal calling for \$175,000 in revenue bonds by a 26 per cent majority.

Scion of Aristocracy 400's Camera Ace

MODERN living has created many strange occupations. Economic, political, and social factors have all combined in giving rise to professions which even a decade ago would hardly have been conceived by the most fitful of imaginations. Just such a career is that of society's candid cameramen.

Take Jerome Zerbe, for instance. New York's ace photo chronicler of Smart Set happenings whose memoirs appear in the August issue of Cosmopolitan Magazine. Born of well-to-do parents, and with nothing more serious to worry about than spending an enormous yearly allowance, Zerbe was faced with unpleasant odds when dark depression clouds loomed ominously into view. He was, however, ingenious enough to realize that his wealthy friends enjoyed being snapped unawares as they played at parties and in night clubs, and before long the young aristocrat discovered that he had indeed a job for himself. In his field he was a pioneer, but instead of going about his work in buckskin as had his forbears, he appeared immaculately clad in tails.

Zerbe has continued his work with increasing success during the past years, and his experience as resident photographer and press agent for New York's night club, El Morocco, has brought him in contact with New York fashionables such as the William K. Vanderbilt and Brenda Frazier; with visiting Hollywood celebrities such as Clark Gable and Marlene Dietrich; and with royalty such as the Maharajah of Kapurthala and his daughter Princess Brinda. Strange indeed is the job which pays, and pays well, to join in the festivities of fashionables and occasionally record the fact for a public anxious to get a look-in on the fun of the Upper Crust.

Strikes Cut Deeply Into Nation's Purse

WHEN Myron C. Taylor, former chairman of the board of the United States Steel Corporation, signed up with the new steel workers' union in 1937, he remarked, "The cost of a strike-to the corporation, to the public, and to the men-would have been incalculable." Mr. Taylor could not have summed up the whole question of strikes more briefly or intelligently.

Because we live in such an interlocked, interdependent world, the effects of a strike in a major industry are felt in every state in the union, damaging many innocent bystanders. As an example, the noted economist, Stuart Chase brings to light in the August Cosmopolitan Magazine the figures on the fifty-four day strike in the Chrysler Corporation in 1939. Fifty-thousand men lost their work directly; 70,000 other employees of the company in accessory plants were thrown out of jobs or had working time reduced; 57,000 employees in companies furnishing materials to Chrysler had work curtailed or stopped. The total,

177,000 men, was more than three times the number of strikers. One hundred and sixty-eight thousand cars would have been the normal output in the time elapsed. Three million dollars a day was the estimate of purchasing power lost to the nation as a whole, and this, at the rate of more than \$1,000,000,000 a year.

Any strike, Mr. Chase emphasizes, is a source of great expense to workers, employers, and taxpayers. Through loss of wages, workers and their families are forced to suffer hardships. The possibility of physical injury is created, morale is weakened, and community ill-will stirred up. Besides loss of profits, employers encounter setbacks on business lost to competitors; on damaged property, and on the break-up of routine. To the general public, a strike is serious because of loss in buying power; because relief roles swell while revenue to pay for it decreases; and because the total effect is to generate intolerance and hate.

Despite recent walk-outs, Mr. Chase concludes his article on a note of hope. Though 1,800,000 workers were involved in strikes in 1937, the number had been cut in half by 1938, he says, and there is a chance that 1937 may have marked the crest of the labor struggle. The curve is away from battle and toward negotiation.

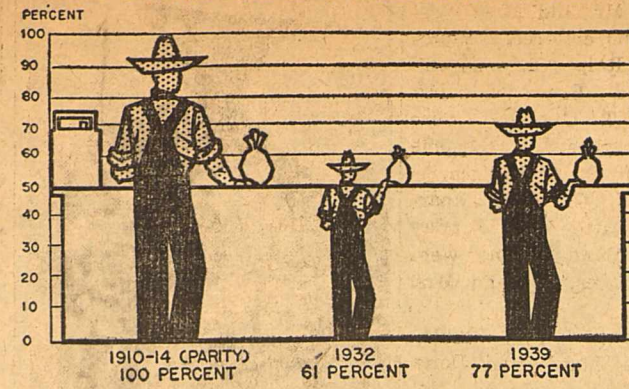

Do You Know Texas?

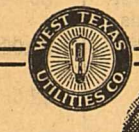

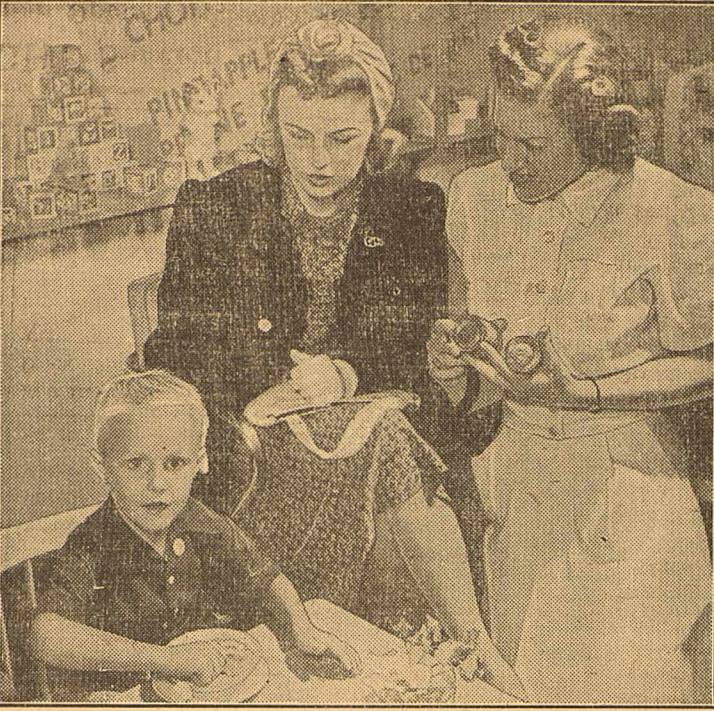

Modern Texas Mother Learns About Scientific Baby Feeding At Fair

TAKING in a big World's Fair might be overwhelming for most four year olds, but little Bobby Roberts takes it in his stride as he pines for a dessert of pineapple and rice pudding while his mother checks with a dietician on the scientific feeding of children in the Heinz Dome at the New York Fair. The dietician is also a Texan, Miss Lois Heuse, of Dallas.

Bobby's parents are Mr. and Mrs. R. J. Roberts of Houston, Texas, who were selected as a typical American family from that state and awarded a week's sojourn at the Fair where they occupied one of the Federal Housing Administration model homes. A younger child, Sharon Allen, four months old, also accompanied them. Inasmuch as this modern young mother must consider different diets for her small fry she was especially interested.

Strained and junior foods for babies and children up through preschool age are featured in the consultation booth, where a large variety of these fresh foods properly prepared in tins are on display.

The age for beginning strained foods depends upon the doctor in charge of the baby. Babies vary in their ability to tolerate new foods without upsets. Many babies can take small amounts of any of the strained foods at four months or even younger. Other babies are more sensitive and must be introduced to new foods gradually.

"As soon as sufficient teeth have developed," said the dietician, "it is desirable that the baby learn to chew as early as possible. The larger particles of junior foods are of such size as to stimulate a chewing action. Most babies graduate from strained to junior foods between 12 and 15 months of age."

Following are strained and junior food combinations suggested in the consultation booth at the World's Tomorrow.

If your baby is on the strained food diet try a menu consisting of strained beef and liver soup, strained spinach and a dessert of strained apricot and apple. Another nourishing combination is strained tomato soup and strained prunes.

For the older child who has graduated to junior foods try lamb and liver stew, chopped mixed vegetables and prune farina pudding for dessert. Chicken farina vegetable porridge, creamed green vegetables and fig and date pudding makes another appetizing combination.
