### Alvin R. Allison For State Senator

Drawing praise from the Governor and thousands of old people in his district for a courageous fight in behalf of social security legislation, Alvin R. Allison, candidate for State Senator of this district, is pledging his continued vote and work for the immediate action in a vigorous campaign that has taken him to every sector of the 30th Senatorial District.

Speaking in Spur recently, Allison said he would also continue to vote and work for increasing the truck load limit in Texas, as he did on every occasion as State Representative. Mr. Allison, a member of the Motor Traffic and Highways Committee of the last Legislature, strongly supported both in committee room and the floor of the House of Representatives for increasing the present

7000 pound load limit, branding it "class legislation" and prohibitive to the best interest of farmers and ranchers.

 Allison is remembered for his outstanding record as county judge of Hockley County for two terms; president of the West Texas County Judge's and Commissioners' Association; charter president of the Eastern New Mexico-West Texas Peace Officers Association; president of the Hockley County Young Democrats Club; member of the State Child Welfare Committee; special ambassador of Good Will to the Republic of Mexico in 1939 and commissioned by Governor O'Daniel and the only member of the entire Legislature to be so honored.

Business men and citizens of all Texas have indicated thanks to Allison for his "new hot check law"; written, sponsored, and passed in the 46th Legislature of this State.

Only last week in his several

speeches, Allison re-opened discussion of immediate refund to farmers and ranchers the State's gasoline tax refund, which is now requiring many weeks for the farmers to get their just refund. Allison proposes re-introduction of his House Bill 203 that will make it law to immediately pay the tax refund at time of purchase for non-road purposes. He fought for this bill last year, but it was killed. Allison says he is not yet ready to stop fighting for the ranchers and farmers, and will stage a battle for passage as State Senator, as he introduces it again.

Tax paying citizens of this district have welcomed Allison's proposed publication law, which he will introduce when State Senator from this district. This law will answer exactly where our tax dollars are going by requiring publication in local newspapers of every penny of public fund disbursements of city, school, county, and State offices.

Backed by an Allison-for-Senator Club that embraces members from all over West Texas, the race for State Senator being waged by Allison has seen him carry the open record books of the House of Representatives throughout the campaign as basis for a logical and natural promotion.



**PROBATION AND PAROLE:** Proposes enforcement of Constitutional Amendments providing for Adult Probation and

Suitable Parole Laws which would relieve the crowded condition of the Texas penal system (built for 4,000 and now housing 7,000).

**AGRICULTURE:** Proposes adequate finances for State Soil Conservation Department to protect Texas lands from all forms of erosion.

**PUBLIC HEALTH:** Proposes the establishment of a State Hospital of Cancer Treatment and Research. Proposes restoration of all Health Units and improvements in the State Health Department which would rank it with progress made in other American states.

**PUBLIC SCHOOL LANDS:** Proposes laws which would protect what is left of our heritage of public lands, namely a council consisting of a school man, an engineer and a practical oil man to advise as to the disposition of valuable oil lands now owned by the schools of Texas.

**YOUNG PEOPLE:** Proposes enlargement of vocational training and establishment of a system of job placement which would offer aid and assistance to the quarter million young people in Texas between the ages of 16 and 25 years who are out of school and out of work.

### To The Voters Of Dickens County:

This is the time of all times when Dickens County should have an economical government. If we are to have an economical government, we must have officials that are economical minded. Tax dollars are more difficult to raise now than ever before, because of the drouth and because of the need of our National Government for funds to prepare for defense of our Nation.

I believe that Dickens County should have as its County Judge a man that is a tax payer. I have been paying taxes in Dickens for the past twenty years and have realized from experience how hard it is at times to earn tax dollars. But I am proud that I am a financial supporter of our government. Then if I were elected your County Judge, I would be economical and considerate of your wishes, because of the fact that I would be a payer as well as a spender in the exercise of our government.

I believe the County Judge should have some evidence of his business success. After having completed my college education, I came to this county, and many of you have known me as a school teacher. ### Pat Bullock Has 7-Point Platform

Pat Bullock, candidate for representative of the 118th District, lists herewith his official platform.

The following is my seven-point platform which I will endeavor to carry out if elected to the Legislature of Texas from the 118th District:

- 1—Reduction of cost of State Government by eliminating needless employees and boards,
- 2—Opposition to tax remission in local cities and districts that does not apply to the state as a whole,
- 3—Full payment of Old Age Pensions, Teacher Retirement Obligations, and Aid to Indigent Blind and Crippled Children,
- 4—Prohibit any state official from running for any office other than the one to which he has been elected while serving as a state official,
- 5—Tax on natural resources first choice to pay social security obligations. Will support any reasonable tax measures necessary to meet this obligation, sales tax included. It must be paid,
- 6—Close co-operation with other members of the Legislature

and the Governor of Texas in order that something may be accomplished in the next Legislature.

7—Favor reasonable raise in truck load limit.

Having worked in Austin for some four years I know from actual experience that from 10 to 25 per cent of the employees in practically all departments are not needed. In my opinion there are too many over-lapping boards which we do not need. The taxpayers are overburdened with needless employees.

Thousands upon thousands of dollars have been remitted in taxes to wealthy cities like Houston, etc., thus causing the burden to be heavier on the people on the farm. No tax has ever been remitted for West Texas. I shall oppose any effort to remit taxes in local areas at the expense of the rest of the state.

I shall cast every vote and lend every effort to the immediate passage of legislation that will pay to the Old People, the Crippled Children, the Indigent Blind and the Teacher that which the people of Texas said should be paid and should have been paid more than two years ago. The legislation in the past has been able to find money to appropriate for the eradication of ticks in East Texas and for the control of this and that, but have utterly failed to see the human side and human need and have utterly failed to heed the demands of the people concerning social security.

It is my intention to introduce a bill to prohibit State officials from wasting the taxpayers money and neglecting their own jobs which they were elected to perform by making it mandatory upon any state official to resign at the time such officials announce for any office other than the one to which he has been elected.

My first choice for raising funds for the payment of social security obligations is tax on natural resources. However, I shall support any reasonable tax measure, be it a sales tax or some other kind that will meet this obligation. If I cannot have my choice I shall go with the majority and work for the tax that will raise the money. The social security obligation must be paid.

It shall be my purpose to work with, not against, the other mem-

bers of the legislature and the Governor of Texas in order that constructive legislation may be passed and our obligation to the old folks and other be paid in full. It is not the purpose of the legislature to squabble and array one group or individual against another. As I see it, it is the duty of each member to work in harmony in order that the job may be done in the shortest time and at the least expense possible to the taxpayers of Texas.

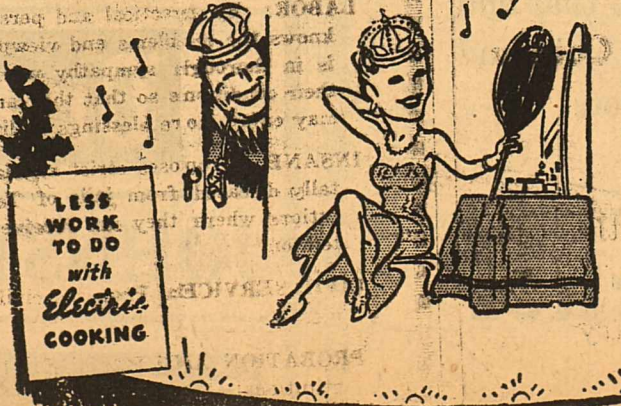

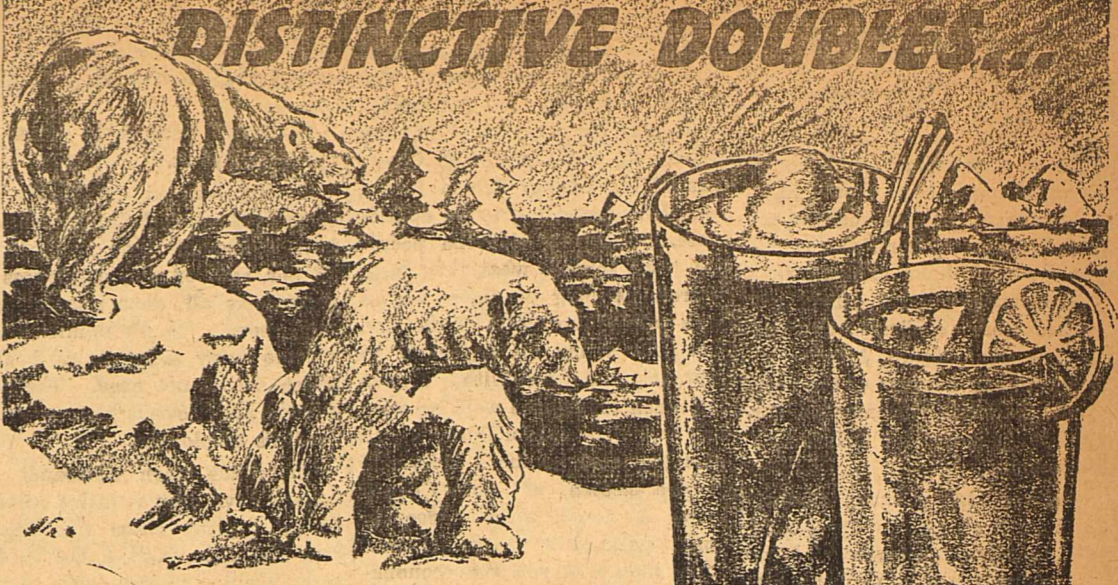

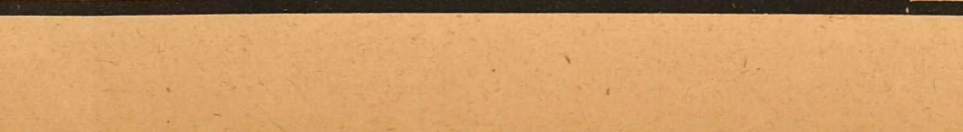
