Dickens Co. Gets \$5338 From State

Dickens County will receive \$5,338.10 from the state as a result of the State Bond Assumption act which was passed in 1939, according to information received here this week. The county has already received \$323 from the state through the act.

The money will be used to retire county bonds which were voted for road-building purposes. The fund was given by the state in payment for county right-of-way on roads that have been taken over by the state.

Judge Marshall Formby and the county commissioners have been largely responsible for obtaining this money for the county.

Unit Of Army To Be In Spur Friday

Word was received the first of the week from George T. Coleman, 2nd Lieutenant, 25th Inf. that a Demonstration Unit of the regular army would be in Spur about two o'clock Friday, July 26. The unit will consist of three officers and about 50 enlisted men including the fifth Cavalry Band. Two light armored cars, fully equipped with weapons and radio, and the new Garand Rifle will be displayed.

The unit will parade through Spur, give a band concert and display the equipment for the inspection of everyone. The local American Legion Post will have charge of the program, making arrangements for the parade and the display of the equipment. Speeches concerning the Rearmament program will be made by local citizens.

Location Of Spur Voting Boxes Is Announced

Returns Will Be Given Location of the polling places for the July Primary election in Spur was revealed this week. The voting box for East Spur will be located in the City Hall, while residents of West Spur will vote in the Director's room of the Spur Security Bank.

Bulletin boards giving the results of the votes in State, District, County, and Precinct nominations will be located near Red Front Drug Store and Sanders-Chastain Pharmacy.

Dickens-Kent Co. Club Project Show Planned

Plans are underway for a Dickens-Kent County FFA and 4H Club Project Show, to be held in Spur some time in March. If the plan goes through the show will be backed by the Spur Civic Club and by business and professional men of other towns and communities. Last Thursday night County Agents Kimbrough and Duke of Kent County and Mack Woodrum of Dickens County and Vocational Agriculture Teachers Cecil Ayers, Spur; Richardson, Patton Springs, and Allen from Jayton, met in the Agriculture room at Spur to formulate plans for the show. McAdoo agriculture agent will also assist in the work as soon as one is elected.

The County Agents and Vocational Agriculturists will meet again in the near future to further plans for the show and will later meet with a committee of business men consisting of R. E. Dickson, E. D. Engleman, and M. C. Golding, appointed by T. E. Milan to represent the Spur Civic Club and one committeeman from each town and community taking part who will be appointed later. Cecil Ayers stated that this is the first time that a co-operative show for 4H and FFA boys has been in this part of the country and would possibly reach boys from 10 to 21 years of age in both Dickens and Kent Counties.

FSA Farm Purchase Loans For Tenants Open In This Co.

The Farm Security Administration is bringing its farm purchase program to Dickens County for the first time this year and tenant farmers who aspire to own land may make application from now to August 31, 1940, it was announced today by FSA supervisor J. O. Winslar.

Application blanks for these loans, made under provisions of the Bankhead-Jones Farm Tenant Act, may be obtained at the FSA office located in the Spur Security Bank bldg., in Spur, Texas.

The loans are repayable over a 40-year period at three per cent interest. A variable payment plan, whereby the payments are smaller in poor years and larger in good years, is provided. "This method of financing farm ownership is successful," the supervisor said, "as is being demonstrated by some 1,000 farmers in Texas who have received these loans and as a group have repaid more on them than has come due." No down payment is required, Mr. Winslar said.

"The program started small," he stated, "with a national appropriation in 1937 of only \$10,000,000 to cover the entire United States. As its success has been demonstrated this fund has been increased. The current session of Congress authorized \$50,000,000." Farmers to whom loans are made are chosen by a committee of county farmers.

George H. Mahon Has Place On Powerful House Committee

In every crisis younger men, little noticed before, rise to positions of responsibility and leadership.

Keep an eye on George H. Mahon, 39-year-old Texas congressman from Colorado City.

Six years ago Mahon was elected to the House of Representatives from the newly created Nineteenth district, which produces more cotton than any other congressional district in the United States.

Like most beginners in Congress, young Mahon accepted the minor committee appointments assigned to him without complaint and made no special attempt to push himself forward beyond his experience. But he had ability, a pleasing personality, a thirst for knowledge of public affairs, and the faculty of making friends and tackling every problem, irrespective of importance, with vigor and thoroughness.

After James B. Buchanan was removed from the House Appropriations Committee by death and William D. McFarlane by defeat, George Mahon was the unanimous choice of the Texas delegation for the vacancy on that powerful committee to which the Lone Star State was entitled. Of course, there was a reason. Mahon had proved himself in small things and was now asked by his elders to undertake bigger ones. That committee passes on billions of dollars of appropriations every session. It controls the purse strings of the nation. Without fanfare George Mahon set to work to do his new job.

How well he has succeeded may be gathered by the fact that the other day Edward T. Taylor, the 82-year-old chairman of the Appropriations Committee, asked the young Texan, less than half his age, to serve on the War Department subcommittee, which is handling the enormous defense program. Mahon was not asked to perform this job because he is primarily interested in military affairs. From the first day he entered Congress he has been a strong advocate of adequate national defense as a means of keeping this country out of war, but primarily he was interested in the problems facing the farmers in his district and throughout the country.

He was asked to serve on the military subcommittee because the job requires good judgment, tremendous industry and a broad understanding of national problems.
