### Wheat Growers Heard Details of State **Crop Insurance Plan In Meeting At Dickens Last Friday Afternoon**

E. R. Duke, state supervisor of crop insurance, talked to a number GOOD ATTENDANCE of Dickens County farmers at the MARKS SERVICES AT court house Friday afternoon **RED MUD REVIVAL** 

about crop insurance. He stated that since crop insurance is in its experimental stage, that the department selected just one cropthe one most likely to suffer greatest-wheat-and is trying out th xperiment on that crop.

All farmers growing wheat for commercial purposes in order to avail themselves of crop insurance n their wheat, must sign applicatons on or before August 31 of this year. The insurance covers losses caused from drought, hail, in sects, fire, flood, windstorm, plant diseases, and other means of crop destruction. The insurance covers 75 per cent of the production over a certain period. This time can be discussed with the department of crop insurance at the County Agent's office.

Crop insurance can be had either by paying cash or by allocating a certain portion of the wheat produced that year. But, applications must be made on or before August 31 of this year in order to secure the insurance was the statement made by Mr. Duke.




At a home county rally held last week McLennan County went on record for its native son, Judge James P. Alexander, can-didate for the office of Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Texas. The farmers, labor, the professional and business men were all represented on the pro-gram. gram.

A past president of the Waco Trades Council told of Judge Alexander's unending fairness to-ward the laboring classes and their problems

Alexander's intending farmess to-ward the laboring classes and their problems. A former district judge, H. M. Rick'ry, reviewed Judge Alexan-det a career as a judge, stressing his service of four years as county judge, four years as dis-trict judge, 14 years in the pri-vate practice of law, and 10 years as an Associate Justice of the Court of Civil Appeals. "In those ten years, Judge Alexander has made a record that should be the envy of every man on an appellate court", said Judge Richey. Dr. J. T. Harrington, for many years a member of the board of Trustees of Baylor University, where for twenty years Judge Alexander has taught a class in law at off hours, declared that for years he was a close and warm friend of the late O. S. Lattimore, Justice of the Court

Lattimore, Justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals, now deceas-ed, but that in this race he rec-ognized Alexander was the best qualified man for the Supreme Court.

"Judicial greatness is not inherited. It is only achieved through laborious work, and James P. Alexander has attained, his outstanding place in judicial circles through long years of diligent effort. The people diligent effort. The people should not confuse Judge Alexanshould not confuse Judge Alexan-der's opponent with Justice O. S. Lattimore," he declared. "That great man has long since passed to his just reward." In McLennan County in the first primary Alexander received nearly 15,000 votes while his opponent received only 2200.
