Armistice Day Program At Dickens

The Armistice Day program at Dickens Tuesday morning was distinguished by the large number of people who attended it. Judge E. H. Boedeker served as master of ceremonies and the routine was followed out on schedule.

The parade around the square was made up of Company H of the Texas Defense Guard, the Boy Scout organizations, the Pep Squad of Spur School, the Choral Club of McAdoo School and Spur School Band. The American Legion joined Paducah Post in a program at Paducah by a standing arrangement and could not be at the program at Dickens.

O. L. Kelley, chairman of the County Draft Board, made a short talk and gave some statistics. He stated the first registration in 1940 showed 943 white boys and 48 Negroes had lined up for service. The next registration gave the county 49 white boys and two Negroes, and there are eight volunteers, making a total of 1,057 registered in the county. The County Board is composed of R. R. Wooten and W. S. Smiley and Mr. Kelley, and they meet every Saturday from 2:30 o'clock until four.

First Lieutenant Jack Christian represented the Texas Defense Guard and made a short outline of the purpose of that organization. He said the purpose of this organization is for local defense in times of emergency, to protect the water systems and other conditions necessary to protection of America in case of an invasion or uprising.

The Flag ceremonies was in charge of the Boy Scouts of Spur. They carried the Flag to the platform and gave it to Mrs. Mary B. Littlefield who in turn presented to Dickens County in memory and honor of her late son, Frank Littlefield, who died while in service a few months ago.

Mrs. Littlefield in a very short but well meaning address made the presentation stating that it was in the spirit of service and love that she made the presentation. The Flag was the one that was the colors at her son's funeral. Commissioner K. W. Street accepted the Flag for the county.

The Boy Scouts attached the Flag to the chain on the flagpole and Mrs. Littlefield then hoisted it to the top of the staff where it remained the remainder of the day.

Judge Boedeker then introduced certain ones present. He first introduced the Commissioners Court, the Mayors of Spur and Dickens, representatives of the business men's clubs of the two towns, and the four superintendents of schools in the county.

Lester Ericson, Post Commander of the Boyd M. Williams Post, introduced the speaker of the occasion. He stated there is always an occasion for everything, and for this occasion we honor those who gave their lives for the cause of liberty. He then presented G. C. Brewer, of Lubbock, who addressed the people.

Mr. Brewer emphasized the facility we should hold for our country. He gave the spirit of strikes a blow, and said that certain interests in our country did not signify good loyal citizenship. He stated that it is time to clean house, and said nothing can take the place of real American citizenship. The program closed at 11:00 o'clock.

Paducah Dragons Victors Over Spur

In a hard fought game the Paducah Dragons were victors over the Spur Bulldogs in their Armistice Day game. The game was close all the way through and it looked like anybody's game at any time. Late in the first quarter Spur punted out over the grandstand at the 40 yard line. The Dragons worked down with a series of line plunges and end runs to the five yard line when they whipped over a short pass for goal. Sandlin to Puckett. Sandlin booted over for the extra point, and the score was 7 to 0 for the Dragons.

Early in the second quarter the Bulldogs worked down 56 yards by a series of end runs and forward passes and were within one foot of making goal when they lost the ball on downs. Wilburn Ball on the last trial had one foot over the goal line, but was tackled while standing and pulled back and the ball went down within one foot of a center.

In the third quarter the Dragons worked down from Spur's 20-yard line and Biddy, Fullbeck for the Dragons, got loose for 32 yards for Paducah's second center. Sandlin kicked the extra point and the score was 14 to 0 for the Dragons.

The Bulldogs took over the ball late in the fourth quarter at the Dragons 38 and worked down to the three yard line when Wilburn Ball plunged over for the center for Spur. A fumble prevented making the extra point. The score was 14 to 6. Paducah received and the gun fired while the ball was their 45 yard line, after they had made one first down.

Each team made 13 first downs and it looked as if the Bulldogs might be in scoring position three different times. One time they were on the one foot line and two other times were within the five yard zone, but could not push over for the centers.

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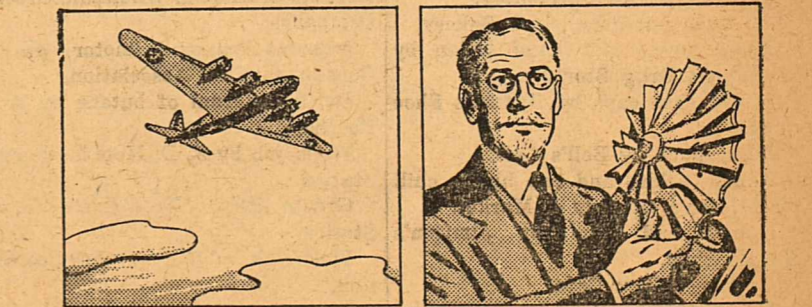

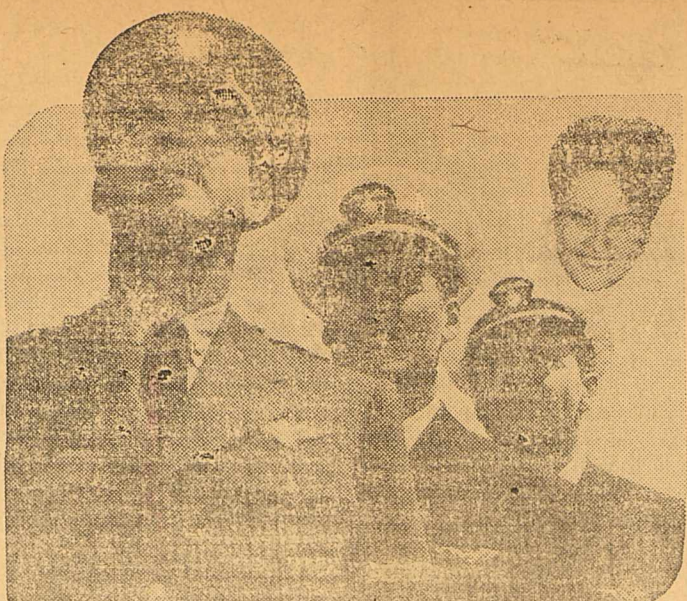

Gins Are Being Kept Busy

Both gins at Girard are kept very busy these days trying to take care of the cotton ginnings of the community. Both gins run 24 hours per day, and stop only long enough to oil the machinery in such places as cannot be oiled while running.

By the time this gets out to the people there will be close to 2,400 bales that have been ginned this season. There were about sixty bales on the yards yesterday afternoon, but one gin had hard luck Tuesday night and did not gin much cotton. They are gradually catching up as the cotton gets dryer. The gins are doing fine work.

Your Spanish Lesson Lesson Four—How to Make Sentences in Spanish

"Buenos Dias, amigos" In our previous lessons we have studied Spanish pronunciation. We have seen how it depends on the vowels a, e, i, o, u. We have learned the words "el" and "la" mean "the". We made note of the fact that, with the exception of letters "c" and "g", all the rest of the letters in English are the same as in Spanish. You must have learned the pronunciation and meaning of the words "casa", "cosa", "cumbo", "cena", "cinco", "gato", "gota", "gusto", "gente", and "gitano". With the words "es", meaning "is", you should be able to form simple sentences like "El gato es muy bonito", "La casa es muy bonita", and "El gato de mi casa es muy bonito". We are not ready to form many sentences. We have tried mainly to learn the Spanish pronunciation and to start building a small vocabulary for our later study.

If you will remember when we used the word "amigo", we said that we added an "s" to say "many friends". We say "amigos". In the same way we change all the words just as we do in English "casa" and "casas"; "mesa" — "mesas"; "libro" (book) — "libros"; and "sombrero" (hat) — "sombros". With all words we must use the plural of the words "el" and "la". For example, "la casa" and "las casas", "el amigo" — "los amigos", "la mesa" — "las mesas", "el libro" — "los libros" — "el gato" — "los gatos". Sometimes instead of adding only the "s" to speak of many objects we use "es", just as we do in English with the word "box". We say "boxes"; so in Spanish with the words "conductor"; we say "conductores", adding "es", and "doctor", plural, "doctores". This is usually the case with words that do not end in a vowel. We have many words like these, but some examples are "ciudad", city, "mejor" better, and "nación", nation.

Now to conclude our fourth lesson we are just going to add three new words to our vocabulary. "Grande", big is familiar to you in the well known phrases "Rio Grande" and "Rancho Grande"; "bueno" es "good" and the word "blanco" means "white".

With the vocabulary we have to date you should be able to understand and perhaps write down from dictation these simple phrases with which we are going to close our lesson.

La casa es muy bonita. Las casas son (are) grandes. La casa blanca es muy grande. El gato de los niños es muy bonito. La casa blanca de mi papá es muy bonita y muy grande. If you have some time and you want to, you can now try to form some original sentences with words like "casa", "esposo", "esposa", "bueno", "bonito", "gente", "ciudad", "sombrero", "conductor", "mejor", "blanco", and perhaps others that you may have learned incidentally outside of the class.

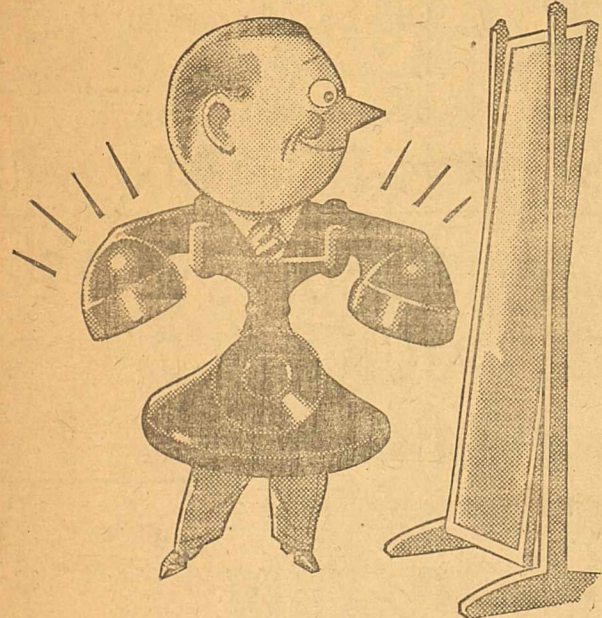

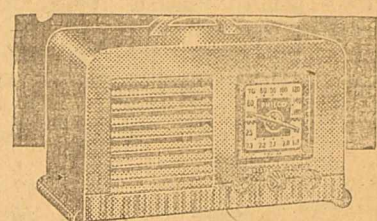

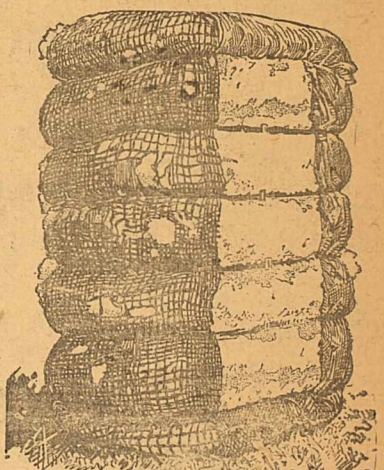
