## Ministers Alliance Meeting On Liquor Question

The Ministers' Alliance met in the Pastor's Study at the First Baptist Church at 10 a. m., Tuesday. Several questions of importance were considered.

Geo. W. Link, Sr., an important member of the Executive Committee of the Dickens County Chapter of the American Red Cross, appeared before the Alliance to urge that all leaders of our churches stress the humanitarian appeal of the Red Cross and that especially the pastors exert effort to maintain, as they can so well do and as they did during the World War Number One, the spiritual leadership in their respective churches. Since next Sunday is the Sunday particularly named by Norman H. Davis, National Chairman, as Red Cross War Fund Sunday, Mr. Link's appearance was in deed timely. Special letters signed by Norman Davis, Washington, D. C., have been mailed this week by Jack Christian, War Fund Chairman, Dickens County, to each pastor who is a member of the Alliance. Their cooperative sympathy for Red Cross is what each pastor is asked. The Alliance voted unanimously to aid in every way possible our Red Cross Chapter.

A member of the Alliance, Rev. C. R. Joyner, stressed the effort at present being made by Senator W. Lee O'Daniel to abolish the production of alcoholic beverages for the duration of the war. A round table discussion ensued. The President of the Alliance was unanimously instructed to draft a telegram expressing the attitude of the Alliance supporting Mr. O'Daniel. As a result the following telegram was sent Senator O'Daniel in Washington:

"Ministers' Alliance unanimously endorse your farseeing measure to abolish production alcoholic beverages for duration of the war. We are confident that at least 80 per cent Dickens County is behind this endorsement. Keeping step with scientific enactments of other belligerent nations and with the great late Morris Sheppard is genuine statesmanship."

The new pastors of Assembly of God and the First Christian churches were introduced and warmly welcomed to the Alliance. The following ministers were present C. R. Joyner, R. E. Jamison, P. J. Burns, C. H. Browning and John C. Ramsay. Geo. W. Link was a welcome guest.

## Don't Waste The Cotton, Get All of It

To we farmers has been assigned the responsibility of producing food not only for our own needs but great quantities for our allies. Possibly many of us do not realize the food values in the remnants of cotton left in our cotton fields. Here are a few interesting figures taken from authentic reports.

A ton of cottonseed, when processed, will produce on an average 915 pounds of cottonseed meal, 579 pounds of cotton seed hulls, 299 pounds of cottonseed oil and 69 pounds of lint.

There are approximately 800 pounds of seed with each bale of cotton and the oil in these seed have the productive energy value of 119 pounds of butter or 15 gallons of lard for human consumption, and the meal and hulls produced from the 800 pounds of seed have a value as livestock feed equivalent to that of 8 bushels of corn.

With the prevailing price of cotton and cottonseed, it is profitable for us to scrap our cotton fields much closer than we usually do; it is certainly our patriotic duty.

## Classification Deferment Cancelled

Pursant to a directive received from National Headquarters General J. Watt Page, State Selective Service Director, today cautioned all Texas local boards against anticipating changes in the classification policy in dependency deferments and occupational deferments.

In his memorandum addressed to all local boards, General Page quoted a telegram just received from General Lewis B. Hershey, National Selective Service Director:

"Production of War Materials is vital to a successful prosecution of the war. Many complaints are being received that local boards have taken it upon themselves to reclassify many necessary workers. Local boards should be cautioned at once against anticipating changes in classification policy in dependency deferments and occupational deferments and that the vital necessity of continuing the uninterrupted flow of the materials of war cannot be overemphasized."

## Working Closely With Red Cross

Outlining the immediate steps being taken in emergency health measures for national defense, Doctor George W. Cox, State Health Officer, who is acting as Chairman of Defense Health and Emergency Medical Care, has announced that the Offices of Civilian Defense are working in close collaboration with the American Red Cross and have, now available, seven types of defense work training courses.

In those lines of work closely allied with emergency medical care, those considered most important and which have therefore been given precedence in organization, are first aid training, nurses' aides training, canteen service, motor corps, home nursing, disaster relief, and home service to assist with the problems of families of the men in uniform.

Since there has been some confusion concerning the proper procedure for enrolling in civilian defense work, Doctor Cox emphasized the fact that County Judges and Mayors throughout the state are acting as defense coordinators and advised all who wish to enroll to communicate with these officials for full information.

Training will be available to all who wish to register, Doctor Cox stated, and workers will be assigned to those duties which they prefer, and for which they are best fitted.

## May Draw Money On Terracing

The Dickens County AAA announces that a new phase has been added to the program of farming. This plan permits farmers to contract county equipment, neighboring farmers with equipment, or other contractors interested in doing terracing construction to build terraces for them and receive pay up to 70 per cent of their soil conservation when the terraces are completed. Terraces are to be constructed to a specific agreement by the county committee, the farmer interested and the contractor who does the work.

The county committee will be glad to have bids from all parties interested in doing terracing construction. These bids are to be made on the basis of the cost of terracing on the easiest farms in the county. An increase in price will be permitted for the more difficult farms.

The above plan will enable many farmers to get their terracing done now and pay for it, giving them the advantages of the terraces when most needed.

## School Taxes About Paid

## Federal Income Tax

Who must file a return? Every single person having a gross income of \$750 or more; every married person, not living with husband or wife, and having a gross income of \$750 or more; and married persons living with husband or wife, who have an aggregate gross income of \$1,500 or more.

When must returns be filed? For the calendar year 1941, on or before March 16, 1942. For the fiscal year, on or before the 15th day of the third month following the close of the fiscal year.

Where and with whom must income tax returns be filed? In the internal revenue district in which the person lives or has his chief place of business, and with the collector of internal revenue.

How does one make out his income tax return? By following the detailed instructions given on the income tax blanks, Form 1040 and Form 1040A (optional simplified form.)

What is the tax rate? A normal tax of 4 percent on the amount of the net income in excess of the allowable credits against net income (personal exemption, credits for dependents, interest on obligations of the United States and its instrumentalities and earned income credit) in the computation of the normal tax net income; and a graduated surtax on the amount of net income in excess of the allowable credits (personal exemption and credit for dependents) against net income in the computation of the surtax net income.

## Norman H. Davis Wires Local Red Cross Chapter

Just after we had gone to press last week the following telegram was received from Norman H. Davis, National Chairman, American Red Cross, Washington, D. C., by John C. Ramsay general county chairman, which was at once turned over to Jack Christian, war fund chairman:

"The bombing of Pearl Harbor, Honolulu, Manila; the invasion of the Philippines; the submarine attacks in the Atlantic and Pacific; have dramatically brought home to us the cruelties of this war. Whenever our heroic soldiers, sailors and airmen are so valiantly defending our soil, there also you will find the flag of the Red Cross unfurled alongside the Stars and Stripes. Red Cross men are on every front. Funds are urgently needed to keep in tact these front lines of mercy. The enemy respects neither holidays nor week ends; the Red Cross war fund should be pushed to rapid subscription. Partnership in this time of need gives all the people an opportunity to participate. The Red Cross is a people's partnership in a time of need. It is patriotism in action to give to the Red Cross. Miseries of war cannot be measured by quotas and mathematical yardsticks nor personal conveniences. The President, the American people, and our fighting men expect much of us. Although your chapter has reached suggested minimum quota you are urged to continue campaign until everyone has had an opportunity to contribute. An avalanche of giving now will help the Red Cross to deliver the goods."

## Emergency Crop Loans Now Available

Loans for the production of 1942 crops are now available to farmers in Dickens County and applications for these loans are now being received at Spur according to D. H. Sandidge Field Supervisor for the Emergency Crop Loan Section of the Farm Credit Administration.

A recent announcement by W. E. Farwell, Regional Manager of the Dallas Emergency Crop Loan Office, which administers these loans, states that the loans are being made available somewhat earlier this season to meet the emergency caused by short crops in certain areas and to permit early preparation of the land.

These loans will be made, as in the past, only to farmers whose cash requirements are small and who cannot obtain loans from other sources. As in former years, the money loaned will be limited to the applicant's necessary cash needs in preparing the land, planting and cultivating his 1942 crops. Borrowers are required to give as security a first lien on the crops financed.

Commonly known as "seed loans," these loans have been made in this County for the past ten years and the Emergency Crop Loan Office at Dallas thoroughly appreciates the fine attitude of the farmers here toward their obligations. Mr. Farwell's announcement states:

This Agency is lending full cooperation to the Government's vital Food for Defense Program by financing the planting and production of marketable food crops, including vegetables, peanuts, citrus fruits and melons.

The Dallas agency has also cooperated during the fall in a campaign fostered by the Extension Service to cut cotton stalks early in an effort to control boll weevils. All borrowers have been urged to cooperate in this for their own benefit and the welfare of their communities. According to the statement announcing the opening of the loan program, farmers who apply for a 1942 crop loan will be asked about their progress in cleaning up their fields.

Mr. Sandidge, whose headquarters is Spur, has supervised these loans for the past ten years. Miss Gillie Slaton is his office Assistant and she will assist applicants in the preparation of loan papers.





## Lesson Eleven—IRREGULAR VERBS

Buenos Días, Señoritas, niños, y niñas.

Our last lesson was a general review lesson. Now we take up something new. At this time I would like to remind you that the first part of this short course was designed especially for you to be able to read Spanish and to begin to write it also. This you should be able to do by now. Understanding and speaking the language are different things from reading and writing it. In order to learn to speak the language, it is first necessary for you to learn to understand it.

In the succeeding lessons we are going to touch upon a few more points of the language and then we will end our course with as much practice as possible; so that you may be able to understand Spanish better than you do now and then speak it as well.

We have gotten to the point in our course where we can make changes in verbs like hablar, comer, y vivir. I gave


you these three words because they are easy. They do not have many changes. We call them regular on this account; but there are some verbs that are not so regular. They have the same changes as hablar, comer, y vivir, but they also have others. Then, also, the change in a different way. Of course, the only way to learn these verbs is to learn the first form where we use the word "you" and proceed from there. The dictionary will usually give these irregular forms. Constant repetition is, naturally, necessary, and a study of similar words. The advantage that we have here also, as I mentioned previously, is that these words are classified in groups just like hablar, comer, y vivir and when you learn one word, you are also learning many others; hence your effort will be less and less as you proceed. The verbs I would like you to learn are "jugar," to play, "poder," to be able, y "venir," to come.

The forms for the three verbs which represent the three conjugations in Spanish just like the regular ones we have had before are as follows:  
**JUGAR**  
Yo juego  
Usted juega  
Nosotros jugamos  
Ustedes juegan  
**PODER**  
Yo puedo  
Usted puede  
Nosotros podemos  
Ustedes pueden  
**VENIR**  
Yo vengo  
Usted viene  
Nosotros venimos  
Ustedes vienen

You notice that the change is radical and that in order to learn all the changes it is necessary to learn the first person where we say "yo," like "Yo juego," I play, "Yo puedo," I can or I am able, and "Yo vengo," I come. Any good dictionary will give the irregular forms, beginning with the first person. You may notice also that when we use the plural form, we merely add an "n" to the word, that is, we say "Usted come," just one person, and "Ustedes comen" when we speak of more than one. This is the case with all the verbs with these two forms; also with the form for "they" which in Spanish is "ellos".

Just as we say "Ustedes comen" or "Ustedes pueden", we can say "Ellos comen" (They eat) or "Ellos pueden" (They can).  
Study these representative words until you are sure that you understand the changes in form from one person to another, and from singular to plural.



Men Asked to Re-Enlist

Adjutant General J. Watt Page has announced that recall to active duty of enlisted men of the National Guard as individuals, except those released because of dependency, has been authorized by the Secretary of War.

The War Department directive, General Page, included recall of enlisted men of all components, including the Enlisted Reserve Corps, the Regular Army Reserve, and the National Guard. He said:

"Each enlisted man, on volunteering for recall to active duty, will be required to sign a certificate that he is voluntarily consenting to his call or order to active Federal service, and married men will be required further to certify that their families will be able to support themselves during their period of active service.

"Where practicable men will be assigned to their former units or installed in grade, if the units or installations are still in the continental United States, or in the same arm of the service in grade in which they were serving when last released from active duty, and will be absorbed as vacancies occur or by increased allotments."

"Enlisted men volunteering for recall to active duty must present themselves to an Army Recruiting Officer in the same manner as an applicant for enlistment."

General Page stated that approximately 1,500 men who have heretofore been released from the Texas National Guard and assigned to the State Detachment under State control are included among those eligible to volunteer for recall to active federal service.

Marine Corps Recruiting

Young men you now have an opportunity to enlist in the United States Marine Corps at the newly opened recruiting office in room No. 19, Post Office building, Lubbock, for either a full four year term, or for "the duration of the emergency."

You need not be a physical giant or a mental genius to become a leatherneck, but you must be between the ages of 17 and 30, between the heights of 64 and 74 inches, white, single without dependents, and fair physical condition. Minor defects such as bad teeth, bad tonsils, or other defects that can be corrected within one month will be taken care after enlistment at the expense of the Corps. No birth certificates or high school required.

Men accepted for enlistment at Lubbock will be sent at the expense of the Marine Corps to Oklahoma City, Oklahoma for final examination and enlistment, and will then be transferred to the Marine Corps Base, San Diego, California for training. After training all branches of the Corps are open including duty aboard ship, Marine Air Corps, Paratroops, Artillery, Infantry, Engineers, and others.

Mid-term examinations will start in the Dickens schools next Tuesday. Pupils are quite busy this week getting ready for this ordeal.

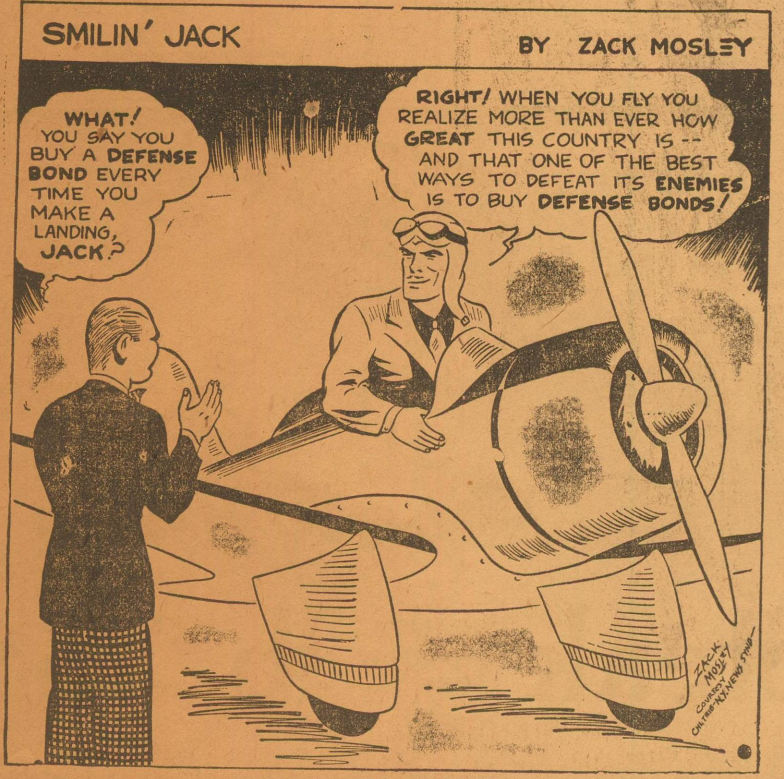
Financial condition of the Dickens schools is reported much improved. Supt. Lawrence stated this week they would meet all expenses for this term and pay off some old accounts.

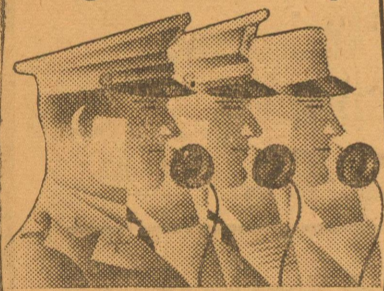

### Men Asked to Re-Enlist

Adjutant General J. Watt Page has announced that recall to active duty of enlisted men of the National Guard as individuals, except those released because of dependency, has been authorized by the Secretary of War.

The War Department directive, General Page, included recall of enlisted men of all components, including the Enlisted Reserve Corps, the Regular Army Reserve, and the National Guard. He said:

"Each enlisted man, on volunteering for recall to active duty, will be required to sign a certificate that he is voluntarily consenting to his call or order to active Federal service, and married men will be required further to certify that their families will be able to support themselves during their period of active service.

"Where practicable men will be assigned to their former units or installed in grade, if the units or installations are still in the continental United States, or in the same arm of the service in grade in which they were serving when last released from active duty, and will be absorbed as vacancies occur or by increased allotments."

"Enlisted men volunteering for recall to active duty must present themselves to an Army Recruiting Officer in the same manner as an applicant for enlistment."

General Page stated that approximately 1,500 men who have heretofore been released from The Texas National Guard and assigned to the State Detachment under State control are included among those eligible to volunteer for recall to active federal service.

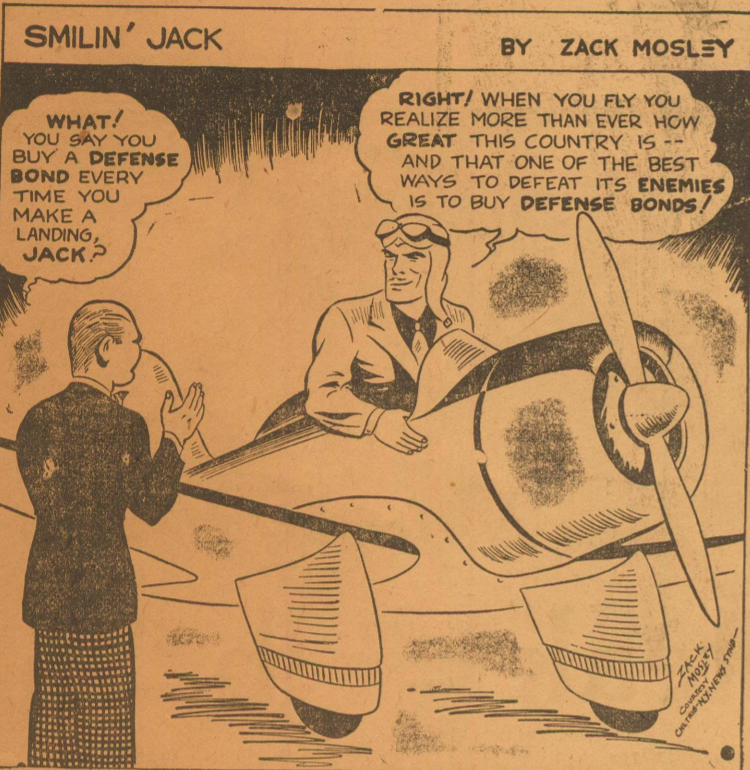

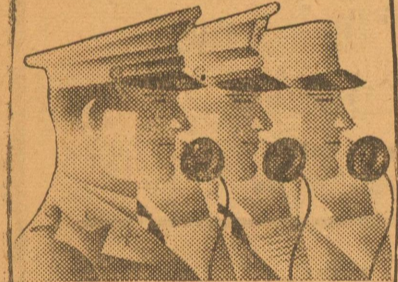

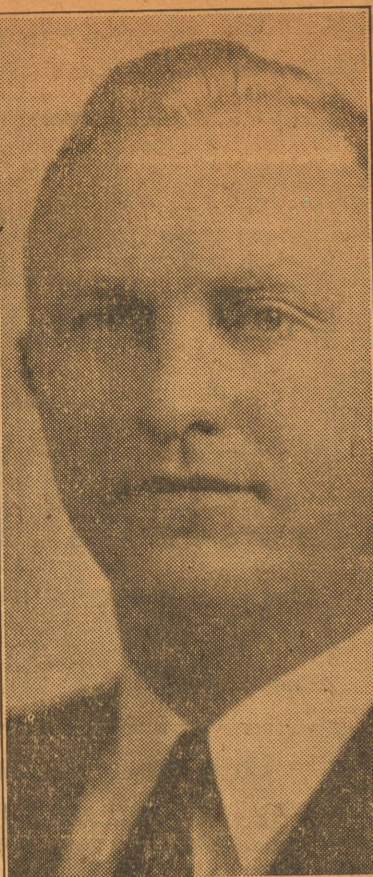
