





> However, with war at our doorstep the Emergency Service Corps becomes an important unit in home defense. While membership in the corps itself is restricted to boys 15 years of age and over, all the skills they learn can be learned, and often are learned, within the patrol of the regular Scout Troop, by boys under 15.

> While no one wishes to see the war come to our own cities and towns, the Emergency Service Corps is ready to render extensive assistance in the event of any disaster such as flood, tornado or fire, in first aid, fire fight ing, mass feeding and housing, communications, messenger service, water rescue and many other services. Older boys receive training in the handling of charged electric wires, management of mechanical equipment, etc.

"Production goals on these farms were set higher than general goals for the county because they have farther to go toward relatively efficient production."
