





Short of Sugar?

Switching to honey and corn syrup as substitutes for sugar in cooking was no trick at all, thanks to some hints I picked up. They all "work" beautifully.



Honey must be used with judgment, of course, but you can't go wrong if you remember these essential facts: (a) 1 cup of honey weighs 12 ounces of which not quite 1/5 is water; (b) 1 cup

of sugar weighs
7 ounces. In re-Mrs. Kiene placing sugar with honey in a cake or cookie recipe, the amount of liquid should be reduced one-fifth of a cup for each cup of honey used. After measuring the liquid used, remove 3 tablespoons, plus 1 teaspoon, of the liquid for each cup of honey used.

An easy way to measure honey is with a moist or greased cup. With recipes requiring shortening, measure the shortening first, then measure the shortening first, them the honey in the same cup. This is true also of molasses and corn syrup. Keep liquid honey in a warm, dry place where the temperature is 75 degrees or over, or in a cold place where temperature is below 50 degrees. Before using place honey ier in warms not hot place honey jar in warm -- not hot -- water for about 10 minutes and pour it from a sharp-pointed pitcher. Then it will drizzle out

If certain cakes made with honey, when first baked, seem less light and fluffy, and not as sweet as and fluffy, and not as sweet as sugar cakes, just wait until they age. Then they'll become moist, flavorful and better in texture. Generally speaking, honey may be added to any favorite cake recipe in amounts equivalent to 25 to 50 per cent of the total sweetening without altaniant the hasis regime.

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
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
