RUSK.—As a result of one sweet clover demonstration last year, W. L. Knapp, county agent, has been able to place 1500 pounds of yellow blooming sweet clover seed with Cherokee coun-ty farmers recently. Some hairy vetch and biennial sweet clover has also been placed. Last year Mr. Thurmond grazed two acres of yetch through December and

Last year Mr. Thurmond grazed two acres of vetch through December and January and then removed the stock until March 24 when he turned them in again until early yune. During the latter period a four-acre sweet clover patch was available and fourteen head of cattle and three horse grazed the two fields until the plants seeded. He then cut the grain ration for dairy cows in half during this time and says milk production doubled.
