Traveler's Advisory **Issued Here**

By The Associated Press Texas' pleasant weather exploded Saturday with the fury and sound of thunderstorms in the east and the icy breath of a cold front that brought snow and subfreezing temperatures to the northwestern section of the state.

Late in the afternoon temperatures were below freezing levels across northwest Texas to a line from Lubbock to Childress and light snow and freezing rain occurred intermittently in the Panhandle.

Midland's spring-like weather, too, was reined back into winter Saturday afternoon with temperatures plummeting from a high of 66 to a low near midnight of 33.

Light Mist Falls

A light mist fell Saturday night, and forecasters at the National Weather Service at Midland Regional Air Terminal issued a traveler's advisory for early today due to 20 per cent possibility of light freezing rain or drizzle during the early hours of the morning.

The weatherman said skies should clear somewhat today and the temperature reach the upper 40s, with the skies again overcast on Monday,

WASHINGTON (AP) - Chief Justice Warren E. Burger has rejected an 11th-hour request by an animal-protection group that he block the Army's planned extermination of millions of birds in Kentucky and Tennessee.

Burger turned down without comment Friday a request by the Society for Animals Rights -that he set aside an order by the U.S. Court of Appeals permitting the killings. The society has filed suit in U.S. District Court to halt the operation permanently.

The Army extermination program is to take place at Ft. Campbell, Ky., and at the Milan Army Ammunition Depot in Robertson and Giles counties in Tennessee. A similar program is expected to be carried out by civilian officials in Paducah,

Influenza Deaths **Continue Above Epidemic Level**

ATLANTA (AP) - For the fifth consecutive week, flu-related deaths were above the epidemic level last week, the national Center for Disease Control reports.

The center said Friday most new cases occurred in the mid-Atlantic, south Atlantic and Pacific regions.

Some 816 flu-related deaths were reported by 121 cities last week, 250 more than the expected number, the center said. An epidemic occurs when deaths exceed the number forecast by 50.

Mid-Atlantic deaths increased from 158 to 236 over the previous week; south Atlantic deaths increased from 63 to 80; and Pacific region deaths increased from 67 to 96.

In New York City, flu-related deaths rose to 114 from 76 the week before. However, a spokesman said this may have been because of increased reporting rather than an actual increase in the number.

In other areas, the flu-related death rates varied only slightly. the CDC said in its weekly morbidity and mortality report.

The extra one per cent is supposed to compensate for money lost during the lag between the time living costs increase and the time retirement checks are adjusted to meet those in-But in reality, the extra one

per cent compounds over the years, pushing retirement checks farther and farther ahead of any rise in the cost of

In fact, the faster the cost of living increases, the farther and faster federal pensions move ahead.

Civil servants, congressmen

and retired military personnel all benefit from the extra one per cent formula, which Congress approved in 1969.

Despite its existence for more than five years, the lucrative operation of the retirement pay formula has never drawn significant public attention.

In his budget message to Congress on Feb. 3, however, President Ford called for a comprehensive evaluation of the federal retirement system. He referred briefly to "cost-ofliving adjustments with overcompensate by providing for permanent annuity increases in excess of changes in the Consumer Price Index."

that overpayments occur to some degree whether the cost of living rises slowly or rapidly. Take an employe who retired

in January 1973 at \$400 per month, who was the average civil service retirement age of 57 and who lives the 18 years predicted by insurance industry

If future inflation continues at an average rate of one-half per cent per month, or a bit more than six per cent per year, he'll be over-paid in pension checks by \$27,588.62.

If future inflation is at a low rate of 3-plus per cent a year. he'll be overpaid \$13,688.29. But high rate of 12-plus per cent per year, his overpayment will total \$78,388.59.

When Congress more recently tied Social Security benefits to the cost of living, it did not add in the extra one per cent fac-

Total costs of the federal retiree overpayments in future years depend on so many factors they are difficult to compute. Rates of retirement, age of retirement, federal pay levels and the cost of living all affect calculations.

But for just the 133,318 civil servants who retired in the year ended June 30, 1974, the cost of extra payments in their lifetimes could exceed \$5 billion if the cost of living rose steadily at one-half per cent per month-a rate well below cur-

For several years leading up to the 1969 change, federal retirees' pensions followed the cost of living this way: When the cost of living increased three per cent from the most recent base month and stayed at that level or higher for three consecutive months, pension checks would be increased by the percentage rise in cost of living from the base month to the highest month during the three-month period.

The increase would take effect two months later. The high month during the three-month period would then become the new base for any subsequent increase.

By 1969, however, employe organizations were arguing that retirees were losing money because of the time lag between increases in the cost of living and the effective date of pension increases.

Rogers C. B. Morton, secretary because "we can't afford to have of the Interior and chairman of the Energy Resources Council, is a forceful speaker, but more than this he is a speaker who lays it on the line as it is . . . take it or leave it.

Serving as the President's chief energy adviser, it is well that the secretary understands the problem in order that he will be able to come up with some possible solu-

Certainly, the secretary speaks the administration line. One hardly could expect otherwise . . . but had you considered that this well might be the secretary's line which the administration has adopted.

"We're going to have to restructure our energy pattern to hold the free world and our economy together," Morton told his chamber of commerce banquet listeners. "Our job is to get everybody working together to formulate a new energy ethic and a new sense of independence.

"We must come up with a new and again be a great force in the ethic that doesn't waste resources. This will give us time in this century to develop new technologies which eventually will allow the complete replacement of fossil

Complete replacement of fossil fuels, of course, is something of something to think about in the onwhich most persons in this vast region of oil and gas production hadn't previously given much thought. But deep down, many persons know that this is the case. We're going to have to start burning some coal in Texas, as Morton said. BASRA, Iraq - The fact that Saddam Hussein, the leader of Iraq's revolutionary Ba'ath government, personally lifted the secrecy veil so that we could visit the "Soviet naval base" at Um Qasr on the Persian Gulf tells much about the subtleties of Iraq's nationalistic foreign policy.

Despite the Iraqi-Soviet treaty of 1972, the force of Arab nationalism which gave the Ba'ath party dictatorial power in the 1968 revolution acts as a brake on Soviet or any other foreign influence. That helps explain Saddam Hussein's response when we asked about alleged

Soviet base rights to Um Qasr. Um Qasr is, indeed, a mini-naval base. However, the Iraqi patrol and torpedo boat navy base we saw, along with fishing and small cargo ships, seemed far removed from the "Soviet naval base" the Pentagon listed last year as one of three major Soviet bases in the Persian Gulf-Indian Ocean regions, chips in super-power rivalry for control of

strategic oil lanes.

Um Qasr lies on a shallow, narrow estuary at the northwest edge of the Persian Gulf. It consists of half a dozen jetties or piers built out into the estuary from naked sand, three of which are incomplete, plus housing for 1,200 officers and men of the miniscule Iraqi navy.

Before embarking on our tour, the Iraqi naval commander, Adm. Abdu al-Dairy, told us in Basra with heavy sarcasm that it was "important to know the truth about our Soviet naval base at Um Qasr."

"Warships have to be on water," he said. "They cannot hide. If the Soviet navy is bringing its warships to Um Qasr, they must go through the Strait River accident. He called our account of Hormuz (at the entrance to the Persian Gulf). The Iranians see every ship that goes through the strait."

Then came provincialism under centuries of the Ottoman Empire and, after World War I, British rule. Against that background, the "revolutionary transformation" of Iraq under the iron rule of Ba'athist socialism does in fact scorn any semblance of foreign control. Iraq makes Washington the devil in its noisy propaganda, but it is quietly hunting commercial contracts with the U.S. worth hundreds of millions of dollars, a subject for another column.

The determining factor has been whether the chairman has been running the committee in a dictatorial fashion or a democratic fashion; whether the chairman defers to special interests or to public interest; whether the chairman holds closed hearings or open hearings.

The Congress is safe from any takeover by ultra-liberals. The American people have demonstrated they do not like either the extreme right (Goldwater, '64) or the extreme left (McGovern, '72). The composition of the present Congress reflects the American people's preference to remain near the center.

Bentsen Faces Long Road In Quest

AUSTIN - Monday, another Texan will set out on that long, long trail which he hopes will lead him from

Houston to the White House. He starts out from further back than the previous Texan who became president, because Sen. Lloyd Bentsen has not had the national exposure which Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson had had as majority leader of the Senate when he set out in 1960 to try to win the Democratic presidential nomination.

Bentsen is a junior senator with just four years in the Senate and six years in the House, and has not been out in front as Johnson was, being a major policymaker for the nation while the presidency was quiet during the Eisenhower years.

While Bentsen does not have the competition Johnson had in John F. Kennedy, he might be willing to settle for the vice presidency as Johnson did in

A series of interviews with leading Democrats in Washington gave convincing proof that this year and next will see campaigns for the Democratic nomination which are truly wide open.

Sen. Mike Mansfield, the Senate majority leader, sat in the part of his office he calls the "Kennedy Room" and listed Bentsen as one of four Democrats he thought might wind up with the nomination.

Sen. Hubert Humphrey and Sen. George McGovern, the last two titular heads of the Democratic party, both

said that they are out of consideration. Humphrey felt that the party might well leave the Potomac for its presidential candidate, taking a governor or mayor who had not been in Washington for the taint of Watergate to stain. McGovern saw no real need for a "new face," considering the fact that both President Ford and Vice President Nelson Rockefeller are certainly "old

Sen. Edward Kennedy made it clear that he will not run, but he felt that some strong Democrat would emerge to win the nomination. Sen. Henry Jackson of Washington, who is Bentsen's strongest competitor for the more moderate wing of the party, felt that he could win the nomination on the economic issues.

Rep. Morris Udall of Arizona, since an avowed candidate, analyzed the convention wisely when he said that no one would reach the convention with enough delegates to win, and the candidates finally chosen will be a pair able to put together a majority because they are acceptable enough to all sorts

Bentsen's chances were assayed by a Texas member of Congress the other day as "slim" because of "the anti-Texas mood" among Democrats. That mood is due, he said, to oil and gas problems "which they blame partly on Texas," and to the defection from the Democratic party of former Gov. John Connally, who helped Bentsen wrest the Senate seat away from Sen. Ralph Yarborough.

"Congressmen Bob Poage and Wright

Patman would not have been ousted as committee chairmen if they had been from Arkansas," he said. "The fact that they were from Texas was the difference, not their age."

As Bentsen is making his round of announcements Monday in Washington and Houston, a committee in Austin will be having hearings on two bills which would make it possible for Bentsen to make a good, early showing to boost his presidential chances. The bills by Rep. Tom Schieffer of Fort Worth and Dan Kubiak of Rockdale call for the holding of presidential primaries in Texas for the first time, along with the regular May primary election.

But Bentsen has a long, long way to go, in addition to the 200,000 miles he has already traveled getting acquainted with Democrats all over the country. So far he has been in 34 states, talking to all kinds of gatherings, and raising money to finance the campaign he is now about to start, lasting 17 months if he loses, and 21 if he wins the nomination. It's a tough, tough row

Bentsen has been pushing that idea.

Last week, he was given a big reception in Austin by the State Building and Construction Trades Council, AFL-CIO, and by a group of supporters he had put together from his previous campaigns. The turnouts were good, indicating that Bentsen will be able to make a mighty strong run for the





As a result of the President's new proposed taxes, it would appear that the value of crude oil to the producer before deducting his costs and federal and state income taxes would be in the range of \$7 per barrel. Does the administration

believe that his value is adequate to achieve independence in crude oil production?

I think we're flexible on that. There is an argument within the administration as to how the taxing should really proceed. The main mission. of course, is to deregulate oil, and then the question is as to how politically you can do this. If you just deregulated old oil and let all oil go to the world market I think you'd be up against a political stone wall and you wouldn't get the job done.

There are those of us who feel that the windfall profits tax should only apply to old oil that is deregulated which the average price considerably over the \$7. 



Dirt, Squirt & Ouirt FARM, DAIRY AND

RANCH NEWS By CHARLES GREEN

Idland County Agent

Midland area farmers are carrying out land preparation activities under the best soil moisture conditions in years. Land is listing in excellent manner. With the good reserve of subsoil moisture, farmers are starting the season with perhaps the best prospects for production since the 1940s. Of course spring weather conditions during planting will be critical as they always are in getting crops started.

With agricultural producers experiencing an ever tightening cost-price squeeze, the need for cost accounting has never been greater. The commercial agricultural producer today needs a complete and accurate accounting system and physical production records if he is going to succeed, contends Cecil Parker, economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

It is necessary to know the cost of producing a unit of each enterprise to compare profitability and make management decisions. Cost accounting is the basis for allocating resources to improve resource efficiency. Management decisions based on cost accounting are much more fikely to be profitable than decisions based on impulse or hunch. The economist notes that the

extension service provides two types of accounting systems the Farm Record System and the Texas Electronic Farm Accounting System (Tel-Fac). The Farm Record System contains 10 sections which include farm business expense, farm and nonfarm income, payroll record, accounts payable and receivable. continuouse depreciation schedule, farm inventory, financial and profit and loss state. ment, hours and per cent of equipment use, enterprise summary and analysis, and field treatment and performance record. Appropriate sections may be combined to fit each particular farm or ranch situation. The Tel-Fac System has cost accounting as its primary objective. County extension agents can assist producers with either of the two systems

It won't be long until home cessful home garden, a number of important factors enter into the picture.

First of all, select a site with good soil and located away from trees and in areas that receive sunshine for most of the day.

Selecting of the proper vegetable variety is a key item to a successful garden. Many home gardeners start off by planting varieties not adapted to this area. The county extension office has a list of recommended varieties for Midland County.

another important, key for a 16-Oz. Carton . . can be improved by adding two to three inches of organic matter (compost, manure, etc.) Till this into the garden area prior to planting. In the absence of a soil test, apply a complete fertilizer such as 10-10-10 or similar analyses at the rate of 2-3 pounds per hundred square feet of garden area. Work the fertilizer into the soil and then form the beds for planting.

Use transplants (young seedling plants) whenever, possible to get the crop off to a head

Once the crops are up, water sufficiently and regularly so that the water penetrates the soil to a depth of at least six inches. Light, sandy soils may require more frequent watering. A drip irrigation' system is relatively simple and inexpensive to install in a home garden and is easily the most efficient system of

watering. Weeds are a problem in most gardens and a long handled hoe is still the best means of controlling them. However, adding a mulch of straw, leaves, grass, bark, gin trash, sawdust, peat moss or other organic material around the growing plants will 2 to 3-Feet help reduce weeds and will also conserve moisture. Keep a close to approach maturity. Harvest MOHAWK Varieties check on crops once they begin vegetables only at full maturity, because that is when they have their best flavor and nutritional content.

Dodgers' Voice **Branches Out**

HOLLYWOOD - Not long ago, after years of issuing polite refusals, Vin Scully elected to sign on as a network sportscaster. The fortunate network was CBS. Scully is, of course, a nonpareil baseball broadcaster and he will be going into his 26th year as the voice of the Dodgers. Why, it is reasonable to ask, did he decide to add network assignments to his already bulging schedule?

ceilings have succeeded in driving many drilling rigs out of Canada and into the United

However, the new Congress seems bent on passing legislation which could very well cause the drilling companies to move their rigs northward once again.

For example, the current pro-spects are that Congress is going to repeal the percentage epletion provision.

It also seems quite likely that Congress will not permit the Ford Administration to remove the existing price ceiling on "old" crude oil production. Furthermore, the odds continue to be against congressional action to deregulate the wellhead price of natural gas.
