WASHINGTON (AP) -The nation's unemployment rate in February remained unchanged at 8.2 per cent, even though another 540,000 workers - most of them in manufacturing industries lost their jobs during the month, the government reported today.

The Labor Department said the loss in jobs was more than offset by 580,000 dropouts from the labor force, mostly adult women and teen-agers who stopped looking for jobs altogether during the nation's current recession.

When a person stops looking for a job, he or she is no longer counted in the labor force and is no longer considered an unemployed person for statistical purposes

While over-all unemployment remained unchanged from January, the jobless rate for manufacturing workers rose in February for the ninth consecutive month to 11 per cent, the Labor Department said.

It said there were 425,000 fewer manufacturing jobs in February, with all 21 industries accounted in the index showing decreases

GOP entails was demonstrated in a 34-page collection of statistics prepared for the leadership conference as a result of polling conducted late last year for the Republican National Committée by Market Opinion

Research, a private firm. The poll showed that 18 per cent of Americans consider themselves Republicans, while 42 per cent consider themselves Democrats and 40 per cent independents. The figures repre sent a steady decline in GOP strength over the past two decades while Democratic strength declined a small amount and

independent support rose. Republican support was highest among rural residents (21 per cent), housewives (25 per cent), persons 65-years-old and over (31 per cent), those with

incomes of more than \$35,000 (30 per cent) and in the border states (25 per cent) and Mountain states (27 per cent).

The poll showed that 22 per cent believed the GOP favored big business and the wealthy, while a like amount thought the Democrats favored workers, the common man and the "little guy."

Mrs. Smith's keynote speech to the conference was blunt in declaring that Republicans face a difficult task in rebuilding their party, though she said, "We may look back and see this day as the beginning of a Republican reawakening across

Glasgow said the two men were not tried for capital murder because the minimum cost for an individual trial would be \$35,000.

A Parliamentary System In U.S. (?)

WASHINGTON (KFS) - Jeb Stuart Magruder, in England recently to promote his Watergate book, peniten observed that the parliamentary system might be an answer to Watergate-variety governmental evils. So it might, and others have produced some compelling analyses of the positive benefits that we might realize from instituting a

Being a parliament fan myself, thought I'd update with a short list of urrent post-Watergate problems that would be avoided or greatly circumscribed if we had such a system.

 Never-ending Presidential cam-paigns: In most parliamentary countries, political campaigns only last a month or two. Then it's all over. Finished.

At this date most Americans are robably (and wisely) ignoring the group of Democrats already officially or unofficially running for president in an election that does not take place for a

2. Divided government: Except in the United States, where we suffer from the curious doctrine of separation of powers, there are few governments where the Executive Branch is controlled by one party while the opposition dominates the legislature. It just doesn't happen that way, although there are occasions where the prime minister and lower legislative house are of one party, and the upper house is narrowly in the hands of the opposition. The White House and Congress spend most of their time on political strategy instead of producing the flow of serious, agreed-upon policies one would see in a parliamentary

3. Separately institutionalized Executive and Legislative branches: Over the last decade, the White House and Congress have been increasing their is staffs, especially since the Republicans captured the White House in 1968. President Assad Of Syria Warns U.S.

By ROWLAND EVANS And ROBERT EVANS

DAMASCUS - Using diplomatic language, President Hafez Assad of Syria is warning the U.S. to drop pursuing what he calls "its main line" of diplomacy in the Middle East - "to split Arab ranks."

Underlying this warning are two political facts: unstated nervousness and frustration here at the prospect of Israel dealing with Egypt but not with Syria and the Palestinians; and hard determination to stymie any such American move.

When someone seeks to split the Arabs by separate moves, the result will be to block all roads to peace," Assad told us in an exclusive interview in the modest presidential palace here. He spoke calmly, with no trace of flamboyance or truculence.

As a leader of pan-Arabism, Assad carefully avoided any hints that Egypt or any Arab state should reject the return of its territory by Israel in the interest of Arab unity, or until Israel also agrees to settle the matter of the Syrian Golan Heights and the Israeli-occupied Palestinian West Bank.

But the prospect of a second-stage Israeli withdrawal from the Sinai with no assurance of similar withdrawals from Golan or the West Bank of the Jordan River is deeply disturbing to Assad. He told us no Arab leader feels less

"Arab movements to peace can't be individual, separate or splitting," he said, a point he has tried to hammer home to Secretary of State Henry Kissinger in at least two private talks. When we asked what, then, would happen if a major Israeli withdrawal is arranged from Sinai without guarantees for Syria and the Palestinian West Bank, Assad hedged. That would depend on "the merits of the case," he said, but added somewhat ominously: if the U.S. seemed determined at that point to be pushing a separate Egyptian-Israeli deal, "the road to peace will be blocked and Geneva (the forthcoming Geneva conference) will not lead to any results." No private assurances have been

asked or given between Assad and Presi-

dent Sadat of Egypt on this crucial point. But Assad claimed Sadat's total agreement on what he called "this basic principle." The matter is so "fundamental and mutual," he told us, no discussion is necessary.

Speaking slowly, with careful choice of words and slashes of humor, Syria's strong-man president flatly refused to make any direct criticism of Kissinger himself, with whom he has established a close rapport. Instead, he repeatedly referred to "American diplomacy" as plotting a policy of splitting Israel's main antagonists.

He was also careful to say nothing critical about the Palestine Liberation Organization (PLO) but he defended with seemingly faint praise PLO chief Yasir Arafat's United Nations speech calling for a unified Palestine composed of Arabs, Jews and Christians-meaning the end of Israel as a separate state.

The contradiction between Arafat and Assad on Israel's future is vivid. Assad has already stated that once Israel withdraws from Arab lands seized in 1967 and agrees to an independent West Bank state, belligerency will automatically end ("Isn't that a state of peace?" he asked)-which means Arab acceptance of Israel as a sovereign

But Assad refused to concede that Arafat's UN dream of a secular Jewish-Arab-Christian Palestinian state was a major political blunder which played into Israel's hands. The real problem is not Arafat's refusal to recognize Israel as a permanent state, he said, but Israel's refusal to vacate the West Bank and give the Palestinians a chance to form their own state. Since Israel displaced tens of

thousands of Palestinians from their homes, he said, "shouldn't Israel say this first, before the Palestinians?"

Creation of a Palestinian state is "the crux" of any political settlement, he said. If the U.S. really wants an overall settlement, the Ford administration must change its position and start "political and public" contacts with the PLO. "I cannot believe that American diplomacy is not aware of this," Assad told us, "if they really want to make progress."

Only Predictable Item Is Uncertainty

GOVERNMENT SPENDING-

WASHINGTON - The economic plicated by the nation's entanglement health and welfare of every American simultaneously in three interwoven but citizen will be massively affected in contradictory crises - severe recession, 1975 by a governmental process whose severe inflation and severe shortage of outer limits and internal boundaries remain clothed in uncertainty.

That process is the spending of whatever federal revenues are collected. plus additional funds borrowed, during the remainder of the current fiscal year 1975 and in fiscal 1976.

Normally it is assumed, somewhat incorrectly, that the amounts involved are pretty well indicated by the totals proposed in the president's budget for the applicable bookkeeping year. . That has never been entirely correct.

Congress always makes changes,

although in past years these often have been within a fairly narrow range. This time, however, the process has been thrown wildly askew by a collision in political philosophies and beliefs between the Republican President, Gerald Ford, and the Democratic-

dominated Congress - on the virtual

eve of the 1976 presidential election year. The situation has been further com-

domestically produced energy.

The best-known remedies for fighting any one of these are not necessarily the best remedies for the other two. In fact, they can be the worst.

For example, the most accepted corrective measure for recession is to increase government spending, which in turn, if carried too far, causes more severe inflation. The present situation is perhaps even

more unique in its uncertainty because it has developed only a comparatively few months before fiscal 1977, when Congress will have to begin operating under drastically reformed budget procedures. Those procedures require that the House and Senate set an over-all spending limit early in the budget year and then attempt to keep appropriations within those limits.

In other words, the uncertainties of

spending in past years often moved within a fairly narrow range, and the will largely disappear when Congress is compelled to establish spending limits.

Not so this time. The uncertainties are immense and growing. To stimulate the economy, now in

its steepest decline since World War II, President Ford has proposed a \$16 billion tax cut falling partly in the remaining months of fiscal 1975, ending June 30, and partly in fiscal 1976, begin-

Because of this he has projected deficits of \$34.7 billion and \$51.9 billion - meaning spending of those amounts beyond available revenues.

He has proposed \$17 billion in budget cuts, also straddling both years. They are largely aimed at social programs to keep the combined \$86.6 billion shortfall from going even higher.

He has called for increasing defense spending by \$8.7 billion to a peacetime high of \$94 billion to reverse a growing decline in U.S. military power, And he has interwoven an energy

program centered on the concept of com-

pelling consumers to use less by forcing the cost up through a proposed new uncertainties of future years presumably \$2 per barrel federal charge on both foreign and domestically produced oil.

To counter these main thrusts of the Ford program congressional Democrats have mustered only bits and pieces of what may one day in the months ahead become an over-all program. But for now only a few judgments can be made about the eventual outcome.

Provide for the revision and consolidation of provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and to prothat all general laws that have established retirement systems and optional public employees and offisees in effect at the time of the adoption of this constitutional amendment will

remain in effect, subject to the general powers of the Legislature. Provide that the amount a participating officer or employee contributes to the employee retirement system or the teacher retirement system shall be established by the Legislature but may not be less than 6% of current compensation and providing further that the amount contributed by the state may not be less than 6 nor more than 10%

of the aggregate compensation paid to participating persons, except that in an emergency, as determined by the Governor, the Legislature may contribute more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to persons participating in state

retirement systems. WASHINGTON (AP) — The Agriculture Department's new grading system will result in consumer organization says.

The department decided Thursday to go ahead with its Sept. 11 proposal to change its beef-grading system, which industry groups helped write. The proposal drew comment from almost 5,000 individuals, firms and organizations.

The new system also improves the eating quality standards of the Good grade and, in a move opposed by most of the meat industry, requires that all beef graded for quality also be "yield-graded" for the percentage of retail-trimmed meat in them.


