





'They assure me that they are working around the clock; that their lid and ring machinery is going 24 hours a day. "But we get only a fraction of what we order and we must supply 450 member outlets, including drugstores as well as markets.

"Every six weeks or so we'll get 100 cases. The regular caps come 24 dozen to a case; the wide-mouth caps are 12 dozen to a case. Wide-mouth lids are 36 dozen to a case and regular lids are 36 or 60 dozen to a case.

He said that a friend, who has seven children, drove 50 miles one night to collect a total of three dozen lids and caps.

'Now, he needs them. He has a 10,000-square-foot garden that's producing and all those mouths to feed. And he tells me that his neighbor brags that she has half a case of lids and rims stored away and she doesn't even can.

William A, Kerr, head of the Kerr Glass Manufacturing Corp., blames the shortage of canning lids on a shortage of tin plate that started in 1973 and didn't end until Jan. 31 of this year.

He said he protested exports of tin plate to no avail and it wasn't until "the bottom dropped out of the automobile market" that tin plate became available.

The home canning supply business booms in times of food shortages or economic depression. Kerr said.

"Barring any curtailment of tin plate, we should be in excellent shape next year."



INSIDE REPORT U.S. Keeping Low **Profile In Portugal**

By ROWLAND EVANS

LISBON - The hidden danger to U.S. policy in the Portuguese revolution is that suspicious military officers, radical and strongly inclined to the Third World and away from the democratic West, will seize on any sign of pressure as a signal that Washington is trying to subvert the revolution.

That is precisely what the highly organized, deeply hated Communist party (PCP) is plotting. With the numerically dominant Socialists and Popular Democrats pressing for a Western-style, pluralistic government, the ruling military radicals would turn even more sharply toward the PCP to "rescue" the revolution from Western intrigue if Washington played a public hand.

Thus "Chile" has become the repeated refrain here of untutored military radicals whose political perception came from years of fighting Portugal's colonial wars in black Africa: "Be on guard or America and the CIA will steal your revolution as they did in Chile."

Such rancid suspicions at a time when the Central Intelligence Agency has been virtually destroyed in trial-byheadline may seem ridiculous, but in fact they have flattened opportunities for normal American diplomacy. Indeed, the shrewd U.S. ambassador here, Frank Carlucci, is well aware that the Communist-leaning prime minister, Vasco Goncalves, and his political confidant, PCP boss Alvaro Cunhal, would resort to anything to uncover an American "plot" aimed at the revolution.

One such "plot" - declaration of independence by the Azores - is no plot at all. At this writing, the Azores could break away from Lisbon at any hour and Washington could do nothing to prevent it. 

There will be no surprise here if the PCP manufactures a right-wing coup d'etat against Goncalves. What the Communists badly need is another March 11, when a pathetically weak coup against Goncalves instantly failed. But it had this traumatic effect: it gave Goncalves and the PCP a powerful argument with untutored military radicals that rightwing fascists, backed by Washington, were plotting their overthrow.

Accordingly, American policy here has been and will continue to be played in the lowest key to avoid entanglement ventona (an invented coup). Some non-U.S. Western diplomats talk seriously about the European "inoculation theory" of letting Portugal go Communist. With no Soviet troops to enforce Communist rule, Communist Portugal would be such a brutal, murderous disaster in the long run that it would "inoculate" Spain - and all Western Europe - against flirting with any possibility of future Communist rule. Such a policy would hand Moscow this dilemma: throw all its resources into saving Communist rule here, making a mockery of the lofty sentiments of Helsinki and terminating detente, or let Communism's first Western European takeover die an ignominioms death. The "inoculation" theory has no American support. Yet the ablest U.S. experts are categorically certain that one part of it is correct: even if the PCP is able to penetrate all major control points of the government. military, labor and the media and seize total control, civil war, not Communism, would be the inevitable result.

The enormity of the errors and omissions in the Hall transcripts - combined with similar mistakes we discovered in an unrelated Washington criminal case - casts doubt on the convictions of hundreds of suspects around the country.

For it has been common practice to tap telephones, bug rooms and rig informers with body recorders to gather evidence. The transcripts of these tapes have been used in countless proceedings, ranging from narcotics trials to Richard Nixon's impeachment hearings.

Earlier, we reviewed 150,000 words stamped as "Evidence" and had been circulated to prosecutors and courts. We found more than 30,000 errors, some serious enough to jeopardize the rights of the accused.

Wherever such transcripts have been used, the danger exists that the suspects have been improperly jailed unless their lawyers took the unusual pains of going over the government's transcripts word

on such fraudulent evidence. Yet the department has been satisfied to let its tainted convictions stand.

In the Oklahoma case, Hall was indicted shortly after he stepped down as governor last January. He and Dallas financier W. W. "Doc" Taylor were charged with attempted bribery and related felonies.

Taylor allegedly offered \$50,000 for Hall's help in securing a contract. The evidence against them was obtained largely from Oklahoma's Secretary of State John Rogers, who allowed his telephone to be tapped and permitted FBI agents to rig him with a body recorder and miniature transmitter.

In return for his cooperation, Rogers was granted immunity from prosecution on tax and securities charges.

The Rogers tapes were transcribed by the FBI, the U.S. Attorney's office and Oklahoma state personnel. The transcripts were used, mistakes and all, to get the two defendants indicted. Then the same transcripts were given to the defense attorneys who thus relied on tainted evidence to prepare their cases.

Hall and Taylor were prosecuted by U.S. Attorney William Burkett, a Nixon

We have listened carefully to the tapes and have compared them to the transcripts. We found error after error, as many as 100 per page. Unaccountable gaps, a la Rose Mary Woods, occur at strategic moments.

Although we found some omissions and distortions which, if corrected, would strengthen Burkett's case, we found more instances that would help Hall and Taylor. In any event, the jury clearly did not get the "best evidence."

Only hours before he was accused, for instance. Hall still was insisting to his secretary of state that he knew nothing about a bribe. Rogers, with his secret recorder going, worked artfully to trap the governor into an admission.

Footnote: U.S. Attorney Burkett agreed the first transcripts had "lots of errors (and) the second ones weren't a helluva lot better." But he insisted "that was the best we could do. They were a workable tool." He contended that the errors did not affect the trial's outcome because, he said, "I just used them to refresh their (the witnesses') memories." He conceded he also used the faulty transcripts in preparing the indictments but said he did not read them to the grand jury. He let the grand jurors listen to the tapes themselves, he said.

WASHINGTON - "The mood of the Senate in the light of Watergate was to write tough restrictions," asserted Sen, Howard Cannon, D-Nev., of reformist measures over political campaign contributions. "Because of that, mood some real practical considerations were overlooked.

One such consideration overlooked was the conflict of interest issue. Democrats like Cannon have made many a moralizing sermon over the "very bad, very dishonorable situation on spending that existed in the 1972 campaign."

Those are Cannon's own words when, as chairman of the Senate Rules Committee, he castigated then-Asst. Atty. Gen. Roger G. Dixon on Sept. 21, 1973, when Dixon urged caution on reforming the practice of political campaign contributions.

In general, the Democrats, with the help of the press and liberal activist groups like Common Cause, have focused their fire on Republicans and businessmen while members of their own party and organized labor have been free to collect questionable, if not illegal, contributions for the 1976 campaign.

Cannon, for example, raised between March 1 and June 10 of this year the staggering sum of \$261,734.45, according

this amount 17 months before his 1976 reelection bid, but his list of contributors include two of President Ford's closest advisers: David Packard who gave \$500 and Clark MacGregor, \$100.

Besides heading the Senate committee that spearheaded reform of campaign contributions in the wake of Watergate, Cannon is also chairman of the Aviation subcommittee of Senate Commerce and chairman of the subcommittee on Aviation of the full Senate Armed Services.

Both bodies have powerful influence over this nation's commercial aviation and defense contracts. David Packard was formerly with the Defense Department

Cannon's own financial statements, moreover, show that he received individual campaign contributions ranging from \$1,000 to \$200 from the top executives of commercial airlines like Eastern and National and defense contractors Martin-Marietta and Aerojet General. We offer eight names and amounts from a list of 35:

Edward J. Daly, president, World Airways, \$1,000; Robert F. Six, president, Continental Airlines, \$1,000; Charles Tillinghart, chairman, TWA, \$300; James

Western Airlines, \$500; Edward G. Uhl, president, Fairchild Industries, \$1,000: George Bunker, chairman, Martin-Marietta, \$1,000; and Joseph Lupper, vice president, Aerojet, \$200.
