# Wallace to retire as police chief in '76

Wallace will retire May 31, 1976, it was revealed today at a special session of the City Council.

Wallace's letter stating his decision to retire was dated Nov. 14, 1975, and addressed to City Manager James Brown. Brown read the letter to council members.

A new police chief has not yet been chosen, but Brown is expected to consult with the council regarding the replacement said Mayor Ernest

Brown said he did not have any immediate comment.

Wallace's retirement will culminate 25 years of service with the city police department and 33 years in law enforcement.

Wallace joined the Midland Police Department in 1951 as a patrolman. Less than one year later, he became

Wallace is a native of Clarksville and graduate of Clarksville High School. He attended a number of law enforcement schools and worked at the Lone Star Ordnance Plant in Texarkana. He also served as deputy sheriff in Red River County before coming to Midland.

He is a member of the FBI Academy Association of Texas, Texas Police Association, Texas Police Chiefs' Association, West Texas Police Chiefs' Association, Texas Safety Association, Midland Commission on Mental Retardation and honorary director of the Midland

Boy's Club. He is also a member of the Masonic Lodge, the American Legion and Westminister Presbyterian Church of Midland. In Wallace's letter he said, "This decision was not taken lightly but culminates several years of planning and prayer, not only by me but on the part of Mrs. Wallace, whose interest in and dedication to the department has been a source of continuing in-

"You can understand, I am sure, the deep pride I have in the ac-complishments of the department and, as my service draws to a close, I hope you will indulge me a few observations, which I feel may be appropriate at this time.

As the record will reflect, I joined the department on May 16, 1951, as a patrolman at the existing salary of \$275 a month. Those were days fraught with the tumult of a booming little community, and a swiftlydeveloping series of events propelled me into the job as chief of police less than a year later, with a force of 23 officers operating from cramped quarters in the old City Hall. Today we have a force of 116 sworn officers, plus 10 civilian employes. The starting patrolman today draws a starting salary of \$667, in addition to fringe benefits as well as training and educational opportunities unexcelled in the State of Texas."

Wallace's letter continued, "It would well serve my ego to claim credit for the impressive strides we have made in the past 25 years in a development of what I consider one of the finest police departments in the country, operating from one of the finest physical facilities the people of Midland have been able to provide in our recently-expanded Public Safety Building. In all candor and honesty, however, I cannot so delude myself.


"My own role has been only that of an instrument through which the dedication, the expertise, the assistance and the advice of so many people have been asserted."

The chief's letter said, "I am compelled to recognize, as I review the progress and accomplishments of the Midland Police Department, the often-unheralded and daily contributions which have been made by the men and women of the department. Since I have been chief of police, I have been saddened by the loss of two of our officers, who have died in the faithful performance of

"And many of our men bear today the physical scars of their own devotion to service to their department and to their fellow citizens. Less dramatic, of course, have been days and nights of routine performance by

men and women who have served with pride and distinction. "In closing, I must express my deep gratitude to the community, not only

# Rumsfeld wins Senate approval

WASHINGTON (AP) - After only brief debate, the Senate today confirmed President Ford's nomination of Donald H. Rumsfeld as secretary of

The vote was 95 to 2.

Sens. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., and Richard Stone, D-Fla., voted against the nomination. Both said they voted in protest of the "scenario" which brought Rumsfeld the nomination.

In two days of hearings on his nomination, Rumsfeld said that President Ford plans a close work-

He assured Congress he is "totally dedicated to a strong defense posture for the United States."

Rumsfeld refused to rule himself out as a possible Republican candidate for vice president next year but said, "I would not be seeking anything else" beyond the Pentagon

Helms cast what he called "a protest vote, not so much against Mr. Rumsfeld himself, but against the scenario which brought him to this nomination.'

The only senator to speak against the nomination in the 30 minutes of debate that preceded the vote, Helms said the substitution of Rumsfeld for Schlesinger "was as unnecessary as it was harmful to our national defense posture.'

Helms called Schlesinger "one of those rare men in public service, a man who combines genuine expertise in the area of policy formulation with the ability to translate those policies into effective action."

He said, without mentioning the secretary of state's name, that Ford should have fired Henry A. Kissinger instead of Schlesinger.

Rumsfeld, 43, who has been White House chief of staff, succeeds James R. Schlesinger, fired by Ford 16 days

Rumsfeld was the only witness at hearings last week by the Senate Armed Services Committee, which then gave the nomination its unanimous approval.

Before becoming Ford's staff chief, the former Illinois congressman served the Richard M. Nixon and Ford administrations as U.S. ambassador to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, director of the Office of Economic Opportunity, White House counselor and head of the now-defunct Cost of Living Council.

## Gen. Franco suffers new hemorrhaging

MADRID, Spain (AP) — Generalissimo Francisco Franco suffered another massive abdominal hemorrhage early today. Ten hours later his doctors said the bleeding was being controlled but had not stopped.

Other medical sources said the doctors were pumping blood into the 82-year-old dictator. They said another operation was under consideration, but the hemorrhage had reduced Franco's blood pressure and temperature, making surgery inadvisable for the moment.

Franco has had three abdominal operations in the past two weeks, but each has checked the hemorrhaging only temporarily.

# Massive spying alleged

WASHINGTON (AP) - Hundreds of thousands of Americans ranging from suspected Communists to women's liberationists have been the targets of FBI investigations which turned up almost no information of any value, top lawyers for the Senate intelligence committee said today.

The techniques and full exent of the FBI's intelligence operations might never be known because "a substantial number of relevant and highly pertinent bureau documents were destroyed" shortly after the 1972 death of Director J. Edgar Hoover, chief counsel F. A. O. Schwarz III

He cited the case of a civil rights leader in New York who was kept under investigation because there was no positive proof of his lack of Communist sympathies. Neither could the FBI find any evidence of Communist influence on the civil rights leader, Schwarz said. He did not identify the civil rights leader.

The committee released documents showing the FBI conducted extensive surveillance of a group called the Women's Liberation Movement in Baltimore, Md., which by the FBI's own assessment was "a group thereapy session with young women who were either lonely or confined to the home with small children, getting together to talk out their problems."

The committee also documented FBI activities at the 1964 Democratic convention in Atlantic City, N.J. in which "at the direction of the President (Lyndon B. Johnson)" FBI agents infiltrated various groups of dissenters and "were able to keep the White House fully apprised of all major developments during the convention's course."

An FBI document made public by the committee also indicated that electronic surveillance of the late civil rights leader Martin Luther King as well as the headquarters of the Congress on Racial Equality and the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee enabled the bureau "to advise the White House in advance of all plans made by these two sources in an effort to disrupt the orderly progress of the convention."

# Cleaver returning home

PARIS (AP) — Finished with his life on the run, Eldridge Cleaver flew back to the United States today, expressing confidence that what he considers a change in the mood of America will assure him a fair trial.

Cleaver's flight from Charles de Gaulle Airport took off three hours and 40 minutes late after an Air France Caravelle slewed across a runway and blocked take offs. Cleaver was due to arrive at Kennedy International Airport in New York at 3:35 p.m. CST.

The former Black Panther leader kissed his wife goodby and boarded the jetliner accompanied by three FBI agents.

Cleaver was unnoticed in the crowd of American tourists.

He was flying to New York after seven years of exile, with charges of parole violation and a grand jury indictment awaiting him. As a fugitive, Cleaver is subject to arrest on arrival in the United States. He faces California charges of assault with intent to murder.

"I feel completely relaxed," he said. "It's all happening very naturally. Somebody must know I'm coming in the States - I got a telegram this morning from a guy who said, 'Stay away from my

Cleaver was smiling, but his wife, Kathleen, was more serious. She said: "Eldridge wanted to go back without going to prison. He sees that's not going to happen. He made up his mind that he'll go to prison. He feels that the situation in which he is returning is one in which he'll

He said his decision to return grew from his conclusion that the end of the Vietnam war, an improvement in the lot of the black man and increased political skepticism in the aftermath of Watergate has created a "really fantastic" climate in America.

"I think we're in a creative period of democracy in the United States," he said. "Recognizing that and thinking that, naturally my ideas have undergone changes."

Cleaver told newsmen Monday that he knew he faced possible arrest in the United States but, "I don't feel like a condemned man being led to prison or to slaughter."

## HINTS FROM HELOISE It's almost 'turkey time'

Dear Heloise:

I usually have the job of roasting our family's turkey and it has always bothered me that the skin would stick to the aluminum foil that I used to cover the turkey. The legs would almost weld themselves to the side of the big enamel pan while the turkey

was baking in the oven.

I found that if I put a slice of stale bread on top of the turkey and a half slice between the turkey's legs (or wing tips) and the pan - wherever they touch — before I cover it with foil, thit it would not stick, and the pan is much easier to clean up later.

The foil and bread can be removed few minutes before taking the turdey out of the oven to allow for more browning if desired.

# Fuel mixture poor

NEW YORK (AP) -The economic recovery is showing signs of sput-tering, a consequence of what a lot of business economists have been pointing out since it began, that the fuel

mixture is a poor one.

Buyer enthusiasm isn't high. The basic housing industry, though recovering somewhat, is still in a state of relative depression. Business spending is lagging. Inflation was never licked.

Astute observers comment that a strong recovery from recession is unlikely if not impossible if it is accompanied by rising prices, but that is the very thing that is happening. It is largely responsible for

lagging retail sales.
Those sales did rise in October, but not by as much as some government forecasters had hoped, considering that over the past year in-flation automatically subtracts 7.8 per cent from any advance.

James Pate, assistant commerce secretary, noted that in the past three months the rise in retail sales has slowed substantially from the rate of the previous five months. The leveling, he said, was more than anticipated.

Some business forecasters, and some in academe too, never got their hopes high about this recovery. Unlike many government officials, they never joined in the sense of euphoria that seemed to prevail during the sum-

Neither did consumers, although they did increase their spending from the deeply depressed level of a year ago. A survey by the First National City Bank was released today with the headline: "Consumer Has Hang Dog

"Americans are more pessimistic now over the state of the economic recovery than at any time this year," the survey's editors reported. Two out of three respondents said it would take at least a year for a definite im-provement in the

If that is really the mood of consumers, the hopes of forecasters for a coninued recovery may be dashed. Consumer spending is the prime mover of this economy; the economy can hardly expand steadily if the consumer isn't par-

ticipating. One factor that does little to lift consumer spirits is the high and rising rate of unemployment. After reaching a low for the year of 8.3 per cent in September, it rebounded to 8.6 per cent in October.

This increase comes in the midst of a disturbing

The trend is for disheartened workers who had withdrawn from the had withdrawn from the labor force, as officially defined by the government, to begin returning in volume. They are seeking jobs again, and that means they are again members of the labor force.

They always were, of course, but because of some bureaucratic illogic they were denied recognition as such. If they had stopped actively searching for a job they ceased to be counted as members of the labor force, and so they couldn't be counted as unemployed

This attempted erasure helped to keep down the jobless rate, high as it was. But now that some bit of hope has returned, these ''nonexistent'' people again are seeking jobs, demonstrating that hey are alive and that

they must be counted.

The news isn't all bad, of course. Tremendous corn crops are being reported, and these should tend to hold down food price increases. Interest rates are tending to fall. Incomes are rising.

Investors also have reaffirmed their faith in nancial crisis in New

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

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




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

# Right wings reign

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) — Without an election, the right wing took over Australia's government from the left wing last week. It didn't happen by revolution; it was done within the framework of the

75-year-old constitution.
Out went Prime
Minister Gough Whitlam,
whose Labor party holds
a majority in the House
of Representatives after
winning two elections
since 1972. Whitlam still
had 18 months to go in his

In came Malcolm Fraser, a wealthy 45-year-old farmer who heads a coalition of the National Country and Liberal parties, which are the conservative groups here.

The conservatives hold a slim advantage in the Senate — and that is how it all happened.

The opposition claimed Whitlam's government was corrupt, inept and leading the nation to economic disaster — thus unfit to continue in office. Fraser cited Australia's 5 per cent unemployment, 2 per cent inflation and \$2.5-billion deficit.

His coalition then blocked the 1975-76 budget in the Senate, denying the government the funds with which to carry on its operations. It was the first time in Australia's history this

As a result, the government's money would have run out by the end of November and Whitlam would have been unable to pay the civil service.

Fraser claimed that since Whitlam was unable to carry on, he should resign and call new elections.

Whitlam refused to resign, however, and that's how matters stood last Tuesday when the chief of state, GovernorGeneral Sir John-Kerr, who was appointed by the Queen of England on Whitlam's recommendation in 1974, stepped in.

He ordered Whitlam removed from office and asked Fraser to form a new government on a caretaker basis until new elections for the Senate and the House of Representatives could be

Sir John said he fired Whitlam because he had not been able to get the 1975-76 budget through Parliament and therefore did not appear able to govern.

Fraser said when he took over the leadership of the coalition earlier this year that a government with a majority in the House of Representatives should see out its three-year term unless involved in repre hensible practices.

He claimed to have found these in the government's handling of the economy and what has been called the "great loan scandal." This involved constitutionally suspect efforts to secure \$4 billion in foreign loans to develop the country's vast mineral and energy resources.

Never fully explained by the government, the loan was believed to have included provisions for future purchase of equity in some of the country's largest mining com-Regular: 17 mg. In a subsequent investigation Minerals and Energy Minister Rex Connor was found to have misled Parliament on loan dealings. Whitlam, bowing to pressure, replaced him.

Fraser claimed this was the reprehensible circumstance he had been looking for and declared the budget would not pass until Whitlam called a general election, which public opinion polls indicated Labor would lose by a substantial margin.

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# Moore trial delay sought

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - The attorney for Sara Jane Moore says he will seek a delay of her Dec. 15 trial date on grounds there is insufficient time to prepare the ex-FBI informer's case on charges of trying to kill President Ford.

Public defender James Hewitt said. Monday he would seek the delay at a hearing this afternoon. He wants the period of psychiatric testing which Miss Moore underwent excluded from the 90-day deadline set by the new federal Speedy Trial Act.

U.S. District Court Judge Samuel Conti on Monday found Miss Moore classified as "a psychotic." mentally competent to stand trial on the basis of psychiatric reports and ruled there would be no delay in her Dec. 15 trial date.

However, psychiatrists who examined her made clear they were not judging whether she was competent at the time she allegedly took a shot at Ford outside the St. Francis Hotel on Sept. 21. They said she was

The interim provisions of the Speedy Trial Act now in effect make no provision for time consumed in psychiatric testing in determining the 90-day deadline for trial after arraignment. But the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeal last week ruled a trial judge has latitude in deciding whether to exclude the time used for psychiatric testing.

Conti, who has long advocated faster trial and appellate procedures, declared Monday that Miss Moore is "keenly aware" of the charge against her and he would tolerate no delays in her trial.

"Just so we have no misunderstandings, the trial is going to go on Dec. 15," he declared.

A few hours later, U.S. District Court Judge Oliver Carter, taking advantage of the appeals court option, decided that Patricia Hearst's trial on a federal bank robbery charge could be postponed from Dec. 15 until Jan. 26.

At Miss Moore's hearing, Dr. Walter Menninger of a Topeka, Kan. state hospital and Dr. Robert Jack Eardley of a federal medical facility in Springfield, Mo. testified that she was an aware, intelligent woman capable of aiding in her defense.

# Fromme attorney wants judge to drop charges

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) Fromme's attorney has asked that charges against her be dropped because prosecutors withheld evidence he says could prove she did not try to kill President Ford.

Attorney John Virga accused the U.S. attorney's office Monday of "willful suppression of evidence" and said U.S. District Court Judge Thomas MacBride must at least declare a mistrial if he refuses to drop charges. The issue is a statement one witness made to police that Miss Fromme declared, "it wasn't loaded

They were actually in contempt of court,' Virga said of U.S. Atty. Dwayne Keyes and his assistant, Donald Heller. "They were ordered to give this information to me and they didn't." MacBride recessed the trial until Wednesday

to give Virga time to interview witnesses. He said he would rule on the dismissal motion then. Virga said he should have been given a copy of statements by James Damir at the start of the trial instead of last Friday when the prosecution

rested its case. Damir, a Sacramento college student, was in Capitol Park on Sept. 5, the day the 27-year-old follower of convicted mass murderer Charles Manson allegedly tried to shoot Ford as he walked from his hotel to the state Capitol.

Secret Service agents say they took a .45caliber pistol away from Miss Fromme after she pointed it at Ford. A police officer says Damir later told him that he heard Miss Fromme say, "It wasn't loaded anyway," as she was being

Virga said Damir's statement constitutes exculpatory evidence — meaning it tends to prove innocence — and under a MacBride ruling should have been given to him before the prosecution began its case.

Damir testified before the grand jury that indicted Miss Fromme, but was not called as a prosecution witness during the trial. Heller denied that he had wilfully withheld

critical evidence, noting that Damir had told him he wasn't sure if Miss Fromme had made the statement He said Damir had told the FBI that Miss Fromme had said: "It didn't go off. What are you worried about?"

But Heller agreed when questioned by Mac-Bride that he would have wanted to have Damir's police statement if he was the defense



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
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

# U.S. refineries handling foreign oil at record rate

HOUSTON (AP) - Project Independence aside, domestic refineries are processing more foreign crude oil than ever before in

Fewer petroleum products are being imported than preembargo days, but, for the past 18 weeks, every third barrel of crude oil processed at a U.S. refinery has been imported. Just five years ago, the ratio was one out of every nine barrels.

For 18 consecutive weeks, domestic refiners have mixed more than four million barrels a day of imported crude with domestic crude. including a record 4,720,000 barrels a day for the week ending Sept. 18. Prior to the embargo, the four

million barrel barrier had been broken only once. During 1974, it was exceeded eight times but never for more than three consecutive weeks. During the embargo, crude im-

ports ranged from a record high of 3,774,000 barrels a day to a low of 2,118,000 a day. It took three months to push the level to another high of 3,877,000 a day after the embargo was lifted.

Crude imports are expected to average a record 4,131,000 barrels a day this year. A high of 4,852,000 has been projected for 1976. The 1970 average was 1,324,000 barrels a day. Industry sources say the re-

quirements for foreign crude will continue to climb despite the 55-mile speed limit, Project Independence -President Ford's plan to achieve energy independence and other conservation efforts.

Demand for petroleum products still is below that of the pre-embargo days but domestic production of crude oil is in its fifth consecutive year of decline and the end of the trend is not in sight.

Domestic output of crude peaked at 9,180,000 barrels a day in 1970. An anticipated 8,365,000 average this year is expected to dop to 8,141,000 in

Such trends would mean that, in just six years, domestic production will have declined 1,039,000 barrels a day or 11.3 per cent while crude imports will have increased by 3,528,000 barrels a day or 266.4 per There are some encouraging signs

WASHINGTON - Chile's military dictatorship, having outlawed the communists and socialists, now has set out to destroy the moderate Christian Democratic Party.

The junta secretly is scheming to develop a political system without politicians or parties. Among the generals, this is called the "Paraguayan Solution," because it was successfully imposed on Paraguay by dictator Alfredo Stroessner

We have discussed our evidence in detail with both Chile's Minister of Justice Miguel Schweitzer and Ambassador to Washington Manuel Trucco. Both vehemently denied that their government has any intention of eliminating the Christian Democratic Party and, thereby, extinguishing democracy forever in Chile.

Yet we have received convincing evidence to the contrary. It has cone from classified intelligence reports, discussions with American authorities and confidential documents smuggled to us from some of the most respected Christian

DINA agents in Europe receive instructions, according to high-level sources, from Madrid, which is the center of DINA activity in Europe. A contingent of Chilean intelligence agents operate out of the Spanish capital under the direction of Col. Pedro Ewing, a central figure in the coup which overthrew the late President Salvador Allende.

Ostensibly, they handle security matters for Chile's European embassies. But their undercover mission, say our sources, is to keep watch on Chilean exiles.

Here in the United States, two prominent Christian Democratic exiles have been marked for murder. Gabriel Valdes, a former foreign minister, and Rodomiro Tomic, who ran against Allende for the presidency in 1970, were warned of the assassination danger by reliable

Not the least of these was the U.S. embassy in Santiago. The FBI considered the threats so credible that special details were ordered to protect Valdes and Tomic.

As added evidence of the campaign to wipe out the . Christian Democrats. a string of ominous events has occurred in Chile. Here are a few of the stories that have been smuggled to

- A former Christian Democratic congressman, Pedro Araya Ortiz, was arrested in September and tortured at the infamous Tres Alamos military prison.

- DINA conducted a raid on the home of Jaime Castillo Valasco on August 22. He was a former minister of Justice under Christian Democratic President Eduardo Frei. More recently, Castillo has been defending political prisoners of the military regime.

- Last August, 50 professors and students were arrested at the eastern branch of the University of Chile de Santiago. Many were members of the Christian Democratic Party.

- Six professors of political science were arbitrarily dismissed at Catholic University of Chile for organizing a seminar on the future of democracy in the world.

- At Northern University in Copiago, three officials and 17 professors were arrested last March. They were released in July and rearrested as they left the prison.

- Labor leaders at some of Chile's largest copper mines, including Potrerillos, El Salvador, Llantas and Barquitos, have been arrested. Many were members of the Christian Democratic Party. According to documents smuggled to us, many were beated and tortured.





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Shrine honors dead American

TEXAS CITY, Tex. (AP) - Louise Hines goes to Curio, Switzerland, next spring where Alps villagers have erected a monument to her dead brother.

The brother, Charles R. Callaway, cured no epidemics there and he didn't establish any missionary schools. He gave his life for Curio. The only time Callaway saw Curio

was when it passed in the dead of night beneath the winds of his disabled World War II bomber. Moments later the B25 Mitchell

aircraft was a ball of fire exploding against a mountainside a short distance from the village. "I guess the one dream I've always had was that I would get to

go to Switzerland and see my brother's monument," Mrs. Hines, 56, mother of seven, told Texas City Sun reporter Pat Martinez.

Such a trip had remained only a dream until now, however, because "I live on Social Security and that just doesn't provide enough money for a plane ticket to Curio.

Swissair Transport Co. offered to fly Mrs. Hines to Curio free of charge when it learned the story of Army Air Forces Lt. Callaway.

Callaway was a pilot stationed with the 321st Bombardment Group, 12th Air Force, in Sicily.

His ship was returning March 21, 1945-Mrs. Hines' birthday- from a night bombing mission over Lavis, Italy, when the twin-engine plane was hit by Italian antiaircraft fire. The bomber lurched and lost

power, fire and oil streaming across the big white star on its wing. Three crewmen bailed out. They were shot to death on the ground by Italian soldiers.

The pilot bailed out and made his ay to safety in Switzerland. Copilot Callaway stayed with the plane. The problem was what to do with he bomber. Should Callaway bail the flying inferno would strike the heart of Curio, killing innocent

Callaway navigated over the twinkling lights below, cut all the switches, then dropped silently through the nose hatch. But his parachute never opened.

The plane crashed harmlessly into the mountain.

Mayor Pietro Avanzini, who witnessed the crash, successfully led an effort to erect a monument to Lt. Callaway on the crash site. The gesture spawned years of friendship through letters between Mrs. Hines' now-dead parents and the Avanzini

Callaway's body was returned to the United States in 1948 and was buried at Montgomery, Ala.

Although Mayor Avanzini died last year, Mrs. Hines will meet with his widow, Annitta, and visit the small park surrounding the shrine to her

Callaway received the Purple Heart, Air Medal and four other military decorations posthumously.

But his sister said it is the words inscribed upon a slab of marble in Switzerland which mean the most to her: "One year ago at this hour, the American officer, Charles R. Callaway, died on this spot in the final instant of performing his duty. The people of the Central Malcontone region wanted to erect this stone in memory of the young American officer and, with him, the countless American soldiers who died in the name of sacrifice and honor. We Swiss, who by some imponderable and fortunate destiny emerged unscathed from the six years of this inhuman conflagration, must bow our heads in grateful memory to the American dead. Even better than in the myth of Icarus, the wings given to America by the Wright brothers, grown powerful in the Liberator, were used to win

### Shooting death ruled accidental

BEAUMONT, Tex. (AP) - The shooting death last week of Vidor Police Chief Walter Billingsley has been ruled accidental by a Beaumont justice of the peace.

Billingsley died last Wednesday after being shot in the chest at his home in Vidor.

Justice of the Peace Wallace Mc-Casland said Monday an investigation by police and the Orange County Sheriff's Department ruled out the possibility of homicide in the shooting

"To my knowledge, this is the first massive recylcing of an old airport terminal in the country," said Pierce Allman, a LLove spokesman.

The Love Field terminal was opened in 1957. Its demise was confirmed in 1969 when Dallas and Fort Worth city officials agreed to build a joint airport between the two cities.

# Texas cities' bonds better investments

By STUART LONG Austin Bureau

AUSTIN-People who invest in municipal bonds, and taxpayers who pay off the municipal bonds, are naturally concerned by the fiscal problems of New York City, and the dire warnings that they could affect every taxpayer in America.

But a couple of municipal money experts have looked into the situation. as regards bonds issued by Texas cities, and have concluded that they are a better investment than ever before.

W. E. Tinsley, executive director of the Municipal Advisory Council of Texas, and M8onty Nitcholas, Austin's finance director, made the survey and drew the conclusions. Their foremost finding was: 'While the amount of debt has in-

creased 128 per cent since 1960, the tax base supporting it has grown 176 per cent. Debt ratio reflects a corresponding improvement as it shrinks from 5.74 per cent in 1960 to 4.75 per cent in 1974.'

The two analysts surveyed the 26 cities with more than 50,000 population, whose general obligation (tax-supported) debt makes up 80 per cent of all such debt in Texas. The conclusion was:

"Texas cities are getting along just fine; as a matter of fact, their general obligation bond picture looks better today

than it did five, 10 or 15 years ago." Tinsley says that same thing applies to the other so-called "municipal bonds", those issued by counties and school districts, because they are all backed up by the same growing property tax values.

What is more, there has been a growth of "unused taxing power" in that less new debt has been created than there has been growth in property values to support debt on a reasonable basis.

In part, this is due to the creation of the muncipal taxes tax in 1968, which now provides new income equal to 38 per cent of the property tax income of the cities. In fact, Texas cities are now getting more money from their 1 per cent sales tax than they got in property taxes in 1960. It shows that property taxes are comparatively ight, no matter how heavy they look when the tax bills arrive about this time of year.

Also, the federal revenue-sharing program, which brought Texas cities \$94 million in 1974, has financed some of the work which otherwise might have been done with bond money. While this is nothing to be considered in analyzing the investmentworthiness of the Texas

municipal bond, because the program may disapear any year now, it has helped reduce the size of bonded debt of the cities from what it would have been otherwise. The figures which back up these

conclusions in the 26 cities are these: 1-The assessed value of property, which was \$10.3 billion in 1960, rose to \$12.6 billion in 1964, \$18.9 billion in 1970 and \$28.4 billion in 1974, a 176 per cent

increase in the 15 years. 2-The general obligation debt of the 26 cities rose from \$591.5 million in 1960 to \$1 billion in 1970 and \$1.31 billion in 1974, a rise of 128 per cent.

3-The ratio of debt to assessed values has declined by 17 per cent. The weighted average tax rate needed to meet payments on the debt has declined from \$1.64 to \$1.54 per \$100, a drop of 6 per cent. 4-The population of those cities

ross by more than 900,000 from 1960 to 1970, while the property balue per capita rose from \$2.275 to \$3,483, and the tax debt per capita rose from \$131

to \$195 per person. But while other cities in the U.S., including New York, may have been getting into financial trouble, the national bond experts who give ratings to the municipal bonds think Texas has been doing pretty well.

In 1960, no Texas city had an AAA rating on its tax bonds. In 1974, three had them. Sixteen were rated A, and by 1970, only six were that low, the others having rised to AA or A-1, which had 8 and 6 cities. None of the 26 cities had lower than a BAA rating in

The New York situation has hurt in interest rates on recent sales of Texas bonds, Tinsley said. Texas bonds generally sell at interest rates from one half to 11/2 per cent below those of cities in other states, in part because of the constitutional ceiling and in part because of close supervision and information-providing to the investment firms. And, Tinsley thinks, they are still very safe investments.


