MORE IMPROVED FARMS NEEDED

One of the drawbacks of every new community is the land that is just bought for investment—some one who has more money than he has immediate use for, will put it in to land and then let it le idle, ac-cumulating in value through the improvements of the farms sur-rounding him. The Journal has always advocated there should be a law requiring every land owner to improve his land in accordance with its increased valuation.

Its increased valuation. In the vicinity of Muleshoe there has already been consid land bought from this standpoint. Some of it has already been idle for several years, the owner apparently just waiting for his bor to a certain point when he will turn loose at considerable That man is of no value whatever to the community in which th is located.

Any of the land surrounding Muleshoe is capable of producing, y after year, from 20 to 30 bushels of wheat to the acre, from a half three-quarters or more of a bale of cotton, and from two to five tons feed stuff per acre, and it would be a much better investment if put cultivation than if left idle.

cultivation than if left idle. The demand for rented farms in this vicinity is increasing daily. Never a day goes by now but there are from two to a half dozen or more farmers here looking for land to rent. Many of them are not able to buy now, others wish to farm for a year or two on fented land and then buy. Several instances are already on record where renters have become so favorably impressed with the land thay rented that the own-er has been able to sell it to them the next year at a good profit on his investment.

investment. During the next year there will be probably 600 or more farmers coming to this section of the country looking for land to rent. Five hun-dred more families would mean considerable addition to the trade ter-ritory of this town; it would also mean considerable increase in farm values. Every land owner who will put his land in cultivation, this ac-comodating some of these renter farmers, is also helping to increase the value of land, besides receiving a good rental from the crops that are raised on it, which will pay the taxes, interest on the investment, and still leave a handsome margin for the owner. If this matter could be taken up with each individual land owner of this section it would no doubt be productive of results that would be of mutual good.
