THE GOLF DANCE.

A Social Diversion Which Is Now Thi Season The golf dance is certainly new on this side of the Atlantic, and bids fair to become very popular. A good bane of music is the chief requisite; next comes a good dancing floor, and if this is not forthcoming a fair "putting green" is the alternative. One does not require elaborate refreshment often serves to wind up the season, as it were, and it is usually given by the governors of the course. The Scotch (and, therefore the proper) method of keeping golf links in order is to have a flock of sheep grazing over them. This saves the expense of mowing, except at the "putting greens," where the services of a lawn mower are necessary. 
