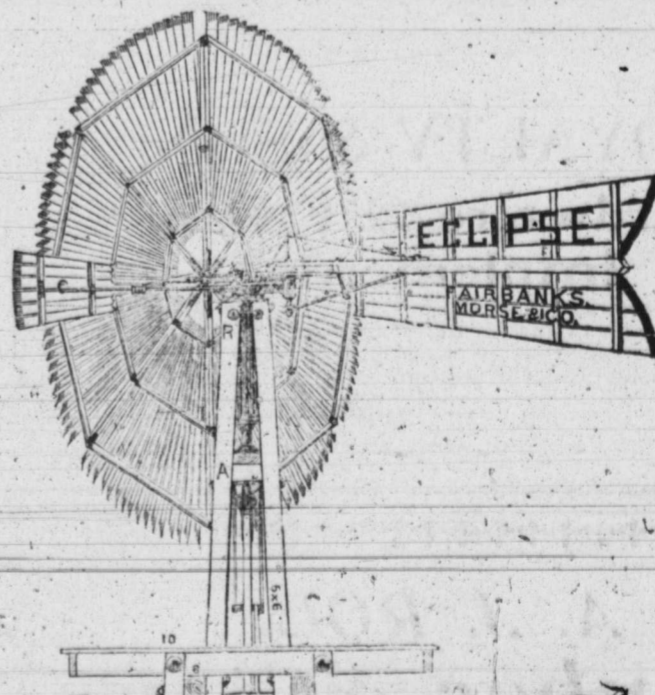

trees and rivers. All rushed to get a view but owing to the obscure light, very little could be seen at any distance. The Discoverer settled down close to a small river near where it emptied into the sea. As the ship touched the earth the men could not restrain their impatience and several threw themselves over the rail onto the ground below without waiting for the adjustable steps to be lowered. Each stood in speechless amazement looking at the earth which instead of being carpeted with rich green grass was covered with a thick running growth of white sea weed looking stuff; soft and moist, clinging and sickly looking. The voyagers looked at it with distrust. This was evidently the kind of grass that grew in this place where the sun's rays never penetrated. The very serious question of water was now brought up. Dr. Bloneberg tested some from the stream and pronounced it good, thus settling this very important question. A clump of trees some distance from the ship attracted the attention and three men went to examine them. The trees proved to be more like gigantic weeds, of a pale greenish white color with gray hair like leaves that hung hung straight down from the stem like fringe. The branches were soft and pulpy, when bent emitted a transparent juice. "If people live here they don't burn this sort of wood" said Edmond Adrian as he threw down a branch in disgust. The explorers were now called aboard the ship, for dinner and further explorations were postponed until later. There being no day or night, the intervals between rest and meals was governed by the chronometer and bells were struck as on a marine vessel.
