Conditions on the Plains.
A. B. Robertson has returned from a trip to his ranch on the Yellow House, having been absent nearly three weeks. A part of this time, he says, was spent in riding over the range in Crosby, Lubbock, Lynn and Garza counties. The recent rains, he statad, were heavier in that section of the country than here, and that conditions out there were never better.

All the people with whom I talked," said Mr. Robertson, "were exceeding hopeful and in good spirits and seemed to be making big preparations for the future, but the one thing lacking in that country is railroad facilities. The country adjacent to Lubbock is so far irom any railroad that development will necessarially be slow until the whistle of the "iron horse" can be heard by the people of that progressive little city. That they will get a railroad in the near future is generally conceded, but one is needed now and needed badly to enable those people to ship out their fat cattle and get in supplies and to create a better market for the products of the soil."
Mr. Robertson said the land tributary to Lubbock is very productive and all kinds of agricultural crops he found to be growing prolifically and that the price of land in that section is comparatively reasonable. He said Lubbock derives a good trade from the country and would get more if the wagon roads were put in a more passable condi-tion.-Colorado News.
