ROOSEVELT'S MESSAGE.

Deals on Money Panic in First Paragraph. Places Blame.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 3.-President Roosevelt's annual message was read in both the senate and house today, nearly all congressmen being present and the galleries crowded. The sessions began promptly at noon, and the reading of the message was taken

The message of President Roose problem in the very first paragraph and takes occasional shots at it throughout. The message begins "No nation has greater resources greater than ours, and I think it can be truthfully said that the citizens of no nation possess greater energy and industrial ability. In no nation are the fundamental business conditions sounder than in ours at this very moment; and it is foolish, when such is the case, for people to hoard money instead of keeping it in sound banks; for it is such hoarding that is the immediate cause of money stringency."

The message lays the blame for money stringency at the door of wicked corporations and urges more strict regulation of interstate commerce. "No small part of the trouble we have oomes from carrying to an extreme the nation al virtue of self relianhe, of independence in initiative and action. says the paragraph dealing with interstate commerce, and then goee on to urge a national corporation act or a national law licensing railways to engage in interstate business under certain conditions. He points out that such regulation would not deprive all state courts of their duties and The necessary committees have plenty to do in the regulation of
