





Profils from poultry raising depend in large measure upon miximum egg production. And this, in turn, hinges upon the observance of four basic rules of flock upkeep, anyone of which if disregarded, will decrease the effi-ciency of the birds. The four rules, as outlined by Fred S. Reynolds, farm agent for Bailey county, are: 1. Proper feeding. 2. Providing a comfortable house with plenty of room for exercise. 3. Maintenance of healthy, vigorous birds. Chief among the features


