



Put sugar and sait in a bread raiser and pour hot milk over them; when cool, add the flour and yeast cake, beat hard with a wooden spoon for five minutes cover the pan and set in a warm piace till the batter doubles its bulk. Beat it down, turn into greased bread pans, having each haff full. Let the batter rise nearly to the top, then bake.

2 quarts Graham flour, I yeast cake. 1½ teaspoonfuls salt. ½ cupful sugar. 1 quart milk. Scald the milk and pour it over the sugar and salt; when lukewarm, sit in the flour and the yeast, which has been dissolved in warm water. Beat hard and let it rise in the pan until spongy. This is a dough which is not stiff enough to knead; it simply requires a thorough stirring and beateng. Put it into greased pens, raise, and bake in an over which is hot at first, but cool during the later part of the baking process. This dough may be used to drop into greased gen pans and bake as muffins.




