Born in Germany 82 Years Age-He Has Witnessed The Development of United States

Lamesa, Texas, March 3.-Captain Geogre Billow who was Captain in the Civil War, and who is now a wealthy and respected citizen of Akon, Ohio, gave several Lamesa citizens some interesting reminiscences of his life and of the Civil War. He s here looking into the quality and value of some real estate, and, incideutally, gave a sketch of his life and his impressions of the South Plain's country.

Being drawn out to tell of his early ife and history, he said:

"I was born in Germany, in 1832, and salled for America at the age of 11 years, I was confirmed in the Episcopalian church of Germany, which is the state church of that country, and am now a member of the same church in America.

"I landed in New York and went direct to Ohio, which was at that time a wilderness, with many Indians there. My father purchased a 60-acre tract of woodland in Ohio, within three miles of an Indian camp. I went into the woods many a day, with my ax to cut down the great beech, white ash and black maple trees. Very little of the former wilierness remains in that state now.

'Nothing was known then of the present methods of harvesting. We did not even have the scythe, but which to cut our grain. I consider that very few lives have seen so
