FATALTIES MAY BE REPORTED FROM ISOLATED TOWNS

The Property Loss Will Be Tremendous as the Storm Track was Through Densely Populated Sections of the Three States and Much Property is Bound to Have Been Destroyed.

Topeka, Kan., April 2 .- In reply to a telegram from J. S. Wannamaker, chairman of the South Carolina Cotton Association, requesting a further statement on his position regarding the effort to reduce the acreage of cotton in the South, Governor Henry J. Allen, in a telegram tonight, told Mr. Wannamaker that he believed the proposal was in violation of Federal Trade Commission orders. The Governor stated that the question at issue "seems to rest upon the right of any group of men to form a commission for the restraint of production." He cited two practices which the Federal Trade Commission has condemned. One forbids the "entering into an agreement or understanding or pool by competitors to maintain prices or allot business." The other forbids "agreement among competitors to limit output."

"It strikes me," the Governor's telegram says "that you gentlemen must be rather sure of your immunity from prosecution in attempting to run so contrary to a declared public policy. Having read an entire set of circulars which the cotton reduction propaganda has "issued for the purpose of insuring a small acreage of cotton, I am constrained to believe that it is more a movement in the interest of those engaged in speculation of the product than in the growing thereof. 





For the past forty years he had made his home in Corsicana. Shortly after his conversion he joined with Rev. R. H. H. Burnett in evangelistic work and it was in connection with this great preacher that Abe Mulkey first became known in ministerial work.

The Mulkey Memorial Methodist Church at Fort Worth is a memorial to Rev. William Mulkey, the father of the Texas evangelist. It was built through the personal efforts of Abe Mulkey and his brothers.
