

EXTENSION OF ORIENT RAILROAD CONSIDERED

Austin, Texas, Sept. 19 .- It be came known today at the office of the Railroad Commission that the Federal Government is considering the matter of extending the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient railroad from Alpine to the border, presumably for military purposes, as the chief engineer of the War Department is on the ground going over the propose line with Chief Engineer De Bernardi of the Orient.



There is now in process of organization in Ralls a company, to be known as the Continental Stamping & Manufacturing Co., which, should final organization be perfected, and this now seems certain, means more to our town than all the other enterprises we have yet secured.

This company proposes to do all kinds of sheet metal work on a large scale, the object being to cover all the Plains country, and probably all of Went Texas, supplying retailers with every conceivable thing needed in this line.

We understand that the main facbrick and concrete, and work will be

commenced on it as early in the spring as the weather will permit.

This building will house the shears and presses. There will be shears for square, oval, oblong, circle and curve work.
