

> The amendment of a constitution is the making of constitutional law, just as much as was the making of the original. And it is conceded by all: That the supreme power of adopting a constitution for federal or State government is retained by the tutional law, that only the power that of adopts, can alter or amend. The Supreme Court has held: "A constitution is the form of government, delineated by the mighty hand of the people, in which certain first princides of fundamental laws are estabished. It is the basis of legislative authority, and lies at the foundation of all law." Vanhorne vs. Dorrone 2, Dall 304.

The power given Congress and State legislatures to amend-makeconstitutional laws, conflicts with Art. 5, Federal constitution, which provides that proposed amendments be submitted to conventions of the States. Also with Art. 7, which provides that the constitution be submitted to conventions of the States for adoption, and in the main the decisions of the Supreme Court. When laws conflict, and one mode is shadowy and unsubstantial, and the other mode substantial, the latter must prevail. 16, Pat. 539. Precedents, as a rule and custom, is an excuse for further actions along the same line, but when judicially tested, and is found to conflict with law, the law prevails.

The exact point-issue-Has Congress and State legislatures the power to make and alter constitutional laws-has nevere been presented to the Supreme Court for judicial ac-This court has many conflicting decisions, as to whether the government was formed by the people of the States, or the whole people, regardless of the States. But that the government and its constitution was created by the people and not their representatives. There is no conflict in these decisions, as to amendments of federal constitution; the great error is, that the courts and people acquiesce in the precedent laid in the early days of our government.

I came from North Texas to this county and I can average more off all farm products here one year with another than I could in Fannin County. see a future to this South Plains: country that no other country has or ever will have. While the eastern land is rising in value it is also wear-ing out. This country will prove to be one of the best cotton producing counties in the South Plains country but we should be conservative and take care not to overcrop ourselves. 75 to 100 acres diversified will produce far more than 100 planted as usual. We plant too much maize and kaffir and not enough other grain. Maize, at say \$20 per ton is very cheap, considering the value of it as a feed, and over production of maize sis always going to place it below the cost of producing it. Now, if cotton could always bring 35c to 40c per lb. we farmers could afford to raise it. Now, some one may say the farmer is coming into his own, it's true he receives more for his products, but he also pays more for what he buys. So there it goes, the income is not equal to the outgo. It costs from \$1000 to \$1500 for a farmer to begin farming. For that reason there will be no one to begin unless things change. Therefore it is up to the farming class to keep production be-hind demand, and that will keep prices up. A warehouse at Lubbock for storage of grain and cotton would be a great thing for farmers who wish to hold their grain. Insurance, rent, would be very little to them, as they come. 



Austin, Texas, Oct. 6.—Assistant *
Attorney General Townsend has forwarded to the County Attorney of Fayette County a copy of an opinion written by B. F. Looney, when Attorney General, holding that the law levying a poll tax on women is rectory and not mandatory.

The effect of the answer is not on ly to say that women may pay the poll tax if they so desire, but that they may pay their property tax without paying the poll tax.

Add this and the water it was cooked in to the potatoes with the green pepper cut up. Put all in baking dish and add three cups milk lightly thickened. Do not stir; bake 20 minutes, fill in cans hot. Cap, tip and process same as

Hungarian Goulash-2 Ibs. beef, pork, veal or heart; 2 ozs. butter or peanut oil, 2 onions medium size chopped fine, 1 carrot sliced, 1 stalk celery chapped fine, 1 1-2 pint tomatoes, 1-2 bay leaf, 6 cloves, 6 or more small red peppers, 1 piece mace, dash thyme, 1 teaspoon chopped parsley, salt, black pepper, curry powder, paprika, chili, tobasco sauce to taste. Small quantity flour. Cut meat into small squares and sprinkle with flour. Melt fat and add onions, carrots, celery, brown and then add meat and stir with spoon. When all is brown empty into stew pan, add other spices tied up in cloth or loose as desired; also tomatoes. Cover with water or if to be obtained use soup stock, if not, 1 or 2 teaspoons beef extract. Simmer 45 minutes, season to taste. Add Worcester sauce if desired. Fill into cans hot. Cap, tip and process as above.

Oxtail Soup-1 oxtail, 1-2 cup of ground oats, 2 1-2 teaspoons salt, 2 tablespoons fat, 2 cups tomatoes, 4 cups water, bay leaf, 1 onion, 1 green pepper, 1-2 cup carret, 1-4 cup onion, 1-4 cup turnip, 1 teaspoon table sauce, I teaspoon celery salt, I teaspoon beef extract, pinch chili, dash tobasco, little barley and rice. Fry tail after being cut into pieces in fat until browned. Add tomatoes and water and cook 15 minutes add balance and cook 10 minutes. Pack hot into cans, cap, tip and process as

Pork Sausage-This recipe been used in the writer's family for more than 100 years. 4 lbs. lean pork, 2 lbs fat pork, 3 teaspoons salt, 2 teaspoons black pepper, 2 teaspoons chili, 1 teaspoon cayenne, 2 large onions, 1 or more cloves garlic, 1 spring bay leaves, 3 sprigs sage, 1 spring thyme, pinch maee, 1-2 teaspoon allspice. 


