HOME DEMONSTRATION DEPARTMENT

Does Poultry Pay in Lubbock County
The poultry industry is yet in its infancy. Yes, it is true that practically every family in Lubbock county keeps chickens and has always done so. In fact an industrial survey taken in every rural community in the county early in 1918 showed that, despite the prolonged drouth and the high price of feed, the average farm flock at that time was one hundred and forty fowls.

But closer investigation would probably reveal the fact that in the majority of these cases these chickens were being kept at an actual loss to the owner, that being the case on too many Texas farms today.

We are trying to change these conditions in Lubbock county and we believe that with our natural advantages here for raising poultry that it can be made one of the most profitable sidelines in the farm, and if one cared to take it up as a separate business I know of no place in Texas where it could be handled to a better advantage.

Of course, we believe, in fact know, that a flock of pure bred chickens will give better returns year by year than a flock of mongrel fowls. But any kind of flock will show improvement by observing the following points:

1. Cull flock closely, discarding old birds and all not showing good constitutional vigor.
2. Introduce new blood into the flock through pure bred males.
3. Provide sanitary surroundings and clean, comfortable, roosting places.

4. Feed, systematically, a balanced ration, consisting of grain and plenty of protein. Animal protein is necessary to egg production. In summer it is supplied in part by bugs, worms and other such food obtained by the hen on the range. In winter it can be supplied by feeding fresh meat, an inexpensive form being jack rabbits, sour milk, dried beef scrap, etc.

Some people object to feeding a balanced ration because it costs more to provide a flock with the protein and lime (oyster shell) than it does to feed "just anything," but you will see the difference in the re-

sults. If you have an egg laying strain of chickens and feed the proper rations you should get just about as many eggs in November as you get in May, and the difference in price will not only pay for the feed but give you a profit as well.

I am citing a few instances where poultry has paid in Lubbock in 1919, if you have a better report we want it at once:

Mrs. J. B. Potts, of the Canyon Community reports a profit of \$204 from a flock of 100 pure bred Rhode Island Reds.

Mrs. C. O. NesSmith reports a profit of \$379.65 on a flock of two hundred and fifty fowls, one hundred and fifty of them being pure bred White Leghorns.

Mrs. B. E. Needles, of Shallowater, reports a profit of \$326 from a flock of 100 White Leghorns. Besides selling and using more than eight hundred and fifty dozens of eggs Mrs. Needles preserved some fifty dozen in Water Glass for winter use that she might sell her fresh eggs when prices were such that a profit could be made. Mrs. Needles produces infertile eggs the year round. As infertile eggs always bring about five cents more on the dozen on the local market and up to ten cents a dozen more when shipped I often wonder why more people do not produce them, especially during the summer months.

Mrs. J. C. Stanford, of Slide, has sold one thousand and seventy-two dozen eggs, besides those used at home and has made a profit of nearly five hundred dollars on her flock of one hundred and seventy-five White Leghorns.

We gave a little report of what the Club members had done some time ago. Another year, we hope to get reports from all women in the county, covering number of eggs and stock bought and sold, price of same, amount and kind of feed used, etc.

CONSERVE FUEL

While the coal strike is settled, and miners are back at work, we must continue to conserve fuel. It is hoped that the situation will loosen up rapidly, but the miners have been out forty days or more and it will require several weeks to get the supply to rolling and points as far away from the mines as this, and with railroad conditions congested as they are, there is a likelihood of Lubbock being scarce of coal for some time yet, and relaxation of the present conservation plans might result in much suffering should real severe weather strike us before the arrival of sufficient coal to supply the demands.

We believe that within a reasonable length of time there will be plenty of fuel for all purposes, but this cannot be immediately, and as a safe guard against a probable further shortage at a time when the temperature is flirting with zero.

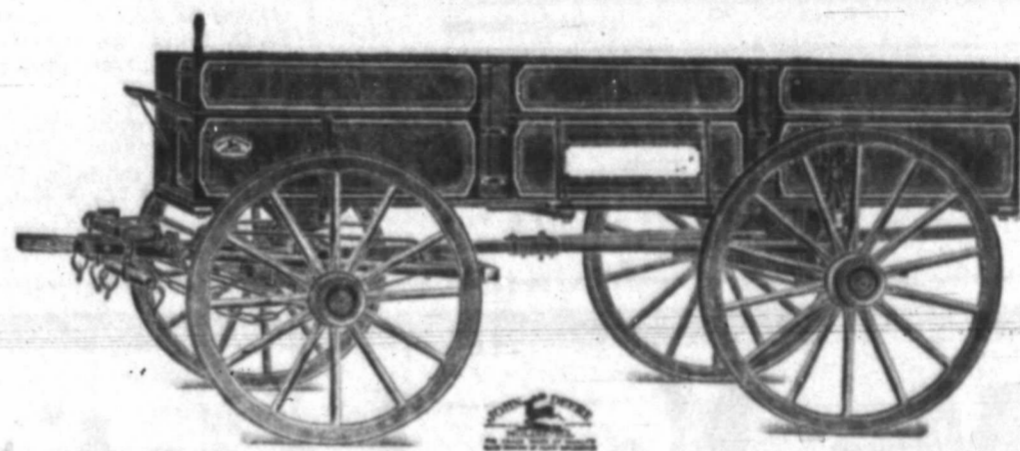

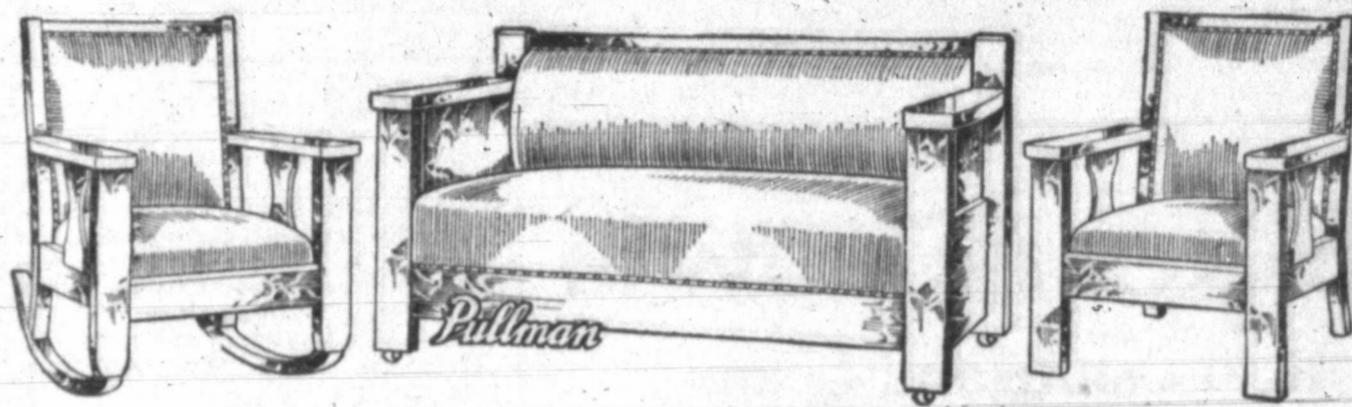

A Broad Field of Labor Open for Professional Nurses

A larger number of persons than at any other period in the history of the American people are showing an increased interest in our civilian hospitals. This great interest has secured for the hospitals many warm and permanent supporters, especially among the women of our country who have been serving as nurses in our various cantonments here and in base hospitals abroad. Of course all of this increased interest is traced directly to the war.

To assist in meeting conditions that have arisen during the war, a

large number of women volunteered their services to the Government, and under the direction of our Surgeon Generals and of various auxiliaries a short-time-practical-course in nursing was arranged for those who wished to engage in this service work. There is every reasonable expectation and indication that this service work will be either largely curtailed or eliminated, while those women who have entered the war hospitals without any extended course of study will be urged to associate themselves with a civilian hospital that maintains a well organized training school for nurses.

There is a large and unusual shortage of nurses at the present time, due to excess calls at home on account of the influenza, and also because so many registered nurses, under-graduates, and other women who might have entered training are still in service. There is also an increased support of the civilian hospital. Many persons have discovered during the past year that there is greater health benefit to be derived in a hospital than through treatment in their own homes. Furthermore, it is of greater advantage to a physician in that he is able to treat more persons in less time at a hospital than through being obliged to make numerous calls in various parts of the city, or in any related community where he may have patients.

It may not be necessary at this time to enumerate all of the sacrifices the civilian hospitals have made in the cause of patriotism. They did, without exception, contribute largely. Possibly there is not a single hospital of the 8,500 in this country which has not contributed surgeons, doctors, nurses, dieticians and their help, besides being required to pay more for their medical and surgical instruments, equipment and supplies, and even then often finding them difficult to obtain; while the help situation has been a most serious problem and one that had to be squarely faced almost daily.

During the period of the war, the civilian hospitals not only had a lesser number of nurses, both trained and student, but had fewer applica-

tions, so that today the large majority of the hospitals of our country are in need of student nurses. Their classes are depleted, and some institutions were obliged to entirely reorganize this important division of their work. It is therefore, the time for women, who can meet the requirements and conditions, to consider the opportunity offered them by almost every hospital in the country to engage in nursing.

The general plan—or the average one—is a three-year course including a three months' probationary period. The student and the hospital have time to decide if the student should continue the course. During the entire period of training the student is given her room, meals and laundry; but she is usually not paid anything for the first three months. Then, if it is mutually agreed that she is to continue, she receives her cap and is permitted other privileges, and receives also a sum ranging from \$8 to \$15 monthly. She is required to pay for her books used during the course, and for her uniforms. She will receive the degree of Registered Nurse at the end of her time of service if she passes a satisfactory examination, and will be permitted to put R. N. after her name. The compensation for registered nurses is from \$25 to \$35 weekly, with partial or complete maintenance while in private practice and from \$50 to \$125 monthly with complete maintenance if she becomes a hospital superintendent, or continues in service at her own hospital, or some other institution.

No woman should select the nursing profession merely on account of the compensation to be received. She should not attempt to engage in it unless she feels a special call for service. No one can anticipate continued success in this profession unless interested in the work and enthusiastic about it. She must possess certain native forces besides a good general education. It is not always a case of standing at attention in a white uniform surmounted by a white cap, but in many cases it is a matter of life and death. The service is one of great sacrifice which must be satisfactorily met.

An applicant must possess good health, and is either required to furnish a certificate to this effect from her own physician, or to undergo examination by a member of the medical staff at the hospital where she is to take up her work. Unless an applicant can produce a certificate stating that she has had one year of high school or its equivalent, she will not be eligible to the degree of registered nurse at the end of her course. Should such an applicant be unable to show any high school attendance, she may, if a grammar school graduate, be permitted by some hospitals to attend high school in the city where the hospital is located and thus secure her certificate. However, the time spent in high school will not be credited toward her regular training, but the probationary period may be waived by the hospital in such cases.

Each applicant is required to present credentials as to character and possibly show other reference regarding work or experience in previous activities. These requirements differ in various hospitals and it depends very largely on what is known respecting the prospective student and the line of work or activities in which she has been previously engaged. A student must consider the

expenses and determine if she can meet the financial obligations for clothing and books. She must also be relieved of all outside financial burdens until the time of her graduation. Probably few fields possess more attractive features than that of nursing, but it is essential that the hospital selected for the training be one in which the student will feel contented and happy. Some prefer a hospital in their own city or state, while others prefer a new environment. There is also the question of the large hospital or the small one. Many important points are to be considered, and women should not enter into training without giving the subject serious thought. For example, some are more at home in a small hospital with less organization and more responsibility to be assumed by the individual, while others prefer the hospital of large bed capacity, with organization and larger equipment where the course is largely one of routine without the necessity of being frequently called upon to meet the unexpected crisis.

There are few inefficient hospitals as concerns their treatment, care and course of instruction, although almost everyone of them could improve their general methods and policies. This need for betterment has brought about new plans for the operating of hospitals, that have been introduced during the past few years. Those who are desirous of becoming members of the nurses' training school should apply for further information to the hospitals in their

own town or to the institution of their choice in other towns.

Everyone should stop and consider and take the time to appreciate what would have been the situation in America if we had not been able to call on short notice upon a large army of competent and trained workers to meet the exigencies that have arisen through the war. It is time for everyone to say "thank you" to the hospitals of this kind and in a hearty and sincere manner, for they extended their policy of sacrifice when they voluntarily gave of what they had in caring for and in the treatment of our men. Now let us not only consider the nursing need, but also our duty and our obligation to our hospitals.

Women seek lucrative employment. There is none other that offers so large and attractive returns as nursing and that affords also maintenance during the study period. It is therefore possible to show that the profession offers an attractive and lucrative location for young women who are fitted to undertake its sacrifices and arduous duties.

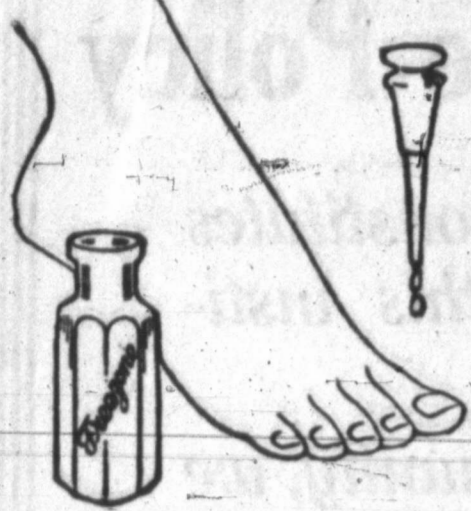

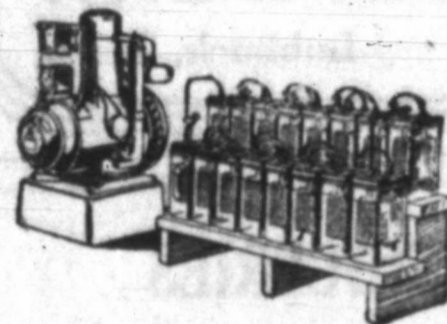

PLANT TEXAS-GROWN COTTON SEED IN 1920

The supply of really first-class cotton seed for planting the 1920 crop in Texas is somewhat limited. More limited this year than normal because of weather conditions in the Eastern half of the State which cut the 1919 crop for many of the producers of the best seed. The boll weevil has been bad, boll rot has been prevalent and a great deal of cotton has been left in the fields until the seeds have become damaged and often rotten. Weather conditions have made it difficult also to store cotton seed in large bins without damage from heating. These facts have caused apprehension on the part of many people. Many inquiries are being received as to the source of planting seed. It is the main purpose of this letter to advise Texas planters to look for Texas grown seed and to warn them against the indiscriminate purchase of cotton seed from states east of Texas. Most of such seed is inferior to standard Texas varieties for planting under Texas conditions. The staple will be shorter, it will be less storm resistant, and the yield will usually be less. If this Eastern seed is planted, Triumph Rowden, Lone Star, Truitt and other varieties produced from them by selection, such as Mebane, Kasch, Belton, Bennett, etc., represent early, large boll, high yielding varieties that should be largely grown. And under some conditions Acala, Snowflake, Foster and Meade, representing varieties with better staple, but usually smaller bolls.

There are two sources of Texas grown seed of the better varieties. One source is to buy the best seed in the cotton breeding sections in var-

PRESIDENT WILSON'S CENSUS PROCLAMATION

Whereas, by the Act of Congress approved March 3, 1919, the Fourteenth Decennial Census of the United States is to be taken beginning on the second day of January, 1920; and

Whereas, a correct enumeration of the population every ten years is required by the Constitution of the United States for the purpose of determining the representation of the several States in the House of Representatives; and

Whereas, it is of the utmost importance to the interests of all the people of the United States that this Census should be a complete and accurate report of the population and resources of the Nation;

Now, therefore, I, Woodrow Wilson, President of the United States of America, do hereby declare and make known that, under the law aforesaid, it is the duty of every person to answer all questions on the census schedules applying to him and the family to which he belongs, and to the farm occupied by him or his family, and that any person refusing to do so is subject to penalty.

The sole purpose of the Census is to secure general statistical information regarding the population and resources of the country and replies are required from individuals only to permit the compilation of such general statistics. No person can be harmed in any way by furnishing the information required. The Census has nothing to do with taxation, with military or jury service, with the compulsion of school attendance, with the regulation of immigration or with the enforcement of any national, state or local law or ordinance. There need be no fear that any disclosure will be made regarding any individual person or his affairs. For the due protection of the rights and interests of the persons furnishing information every employee of the Census Bureau is prohibited, under heavy penalty, from disclosing any

information which may thus come to his knowledge.

I therefore earnestly urge upon all persons to answer promptly, completely and accurately all inquiries addressed to them by the enumerators or other employees of the Census Bureau and thereby to contribute their share toward making this great and necessary public undertaking a success.

In Witness Whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

Done in the District of Columbia this tenth day of November, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and nineteen, and of the independence of the United States the one hundred and forty-fourth.

Fallen leaves should be raked off the lawn and piled in some out-of-the-way place and allowed to decay. They are useful in the garden when well decayed. They can be worked thru the compost heap to advantage, or may be used in protecting tender plants from the cold. Altho leaves have little value in terms of fertilizer elements, they are too valuable to be burned.

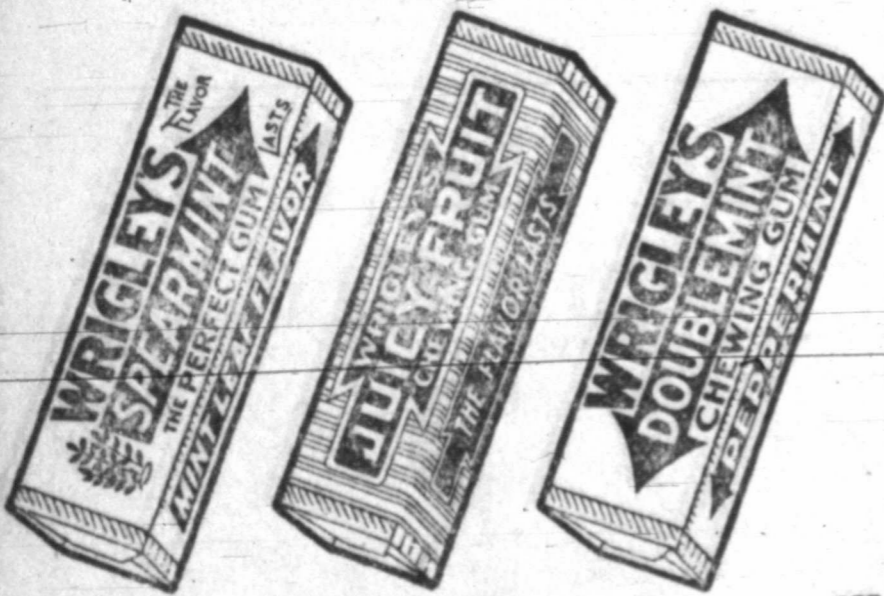

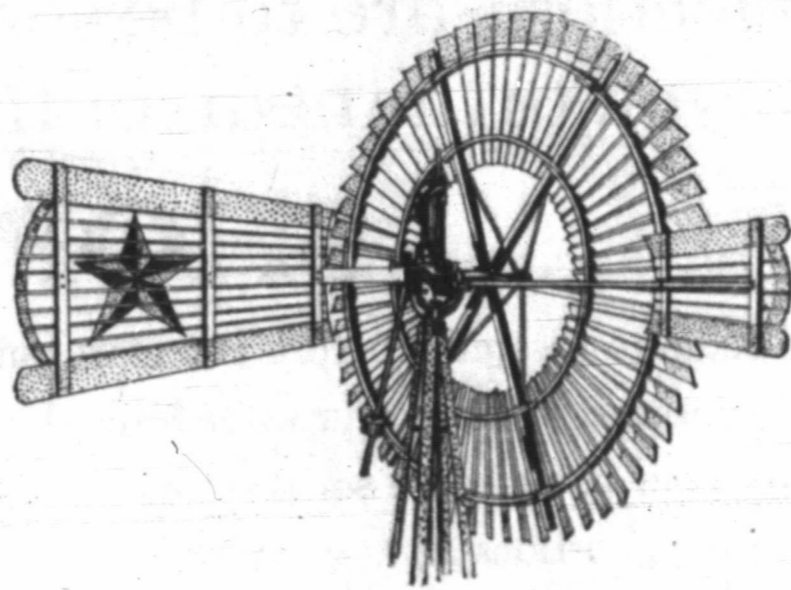

MAKE MOTHER'S WORK EASY BY PROPER ARRANGEMENT

Women have some big problems to solve. A little arithmetic, for example, has shown that one woman took 256,000 needless steps every year, all because of the inconvenient arrangement of her kitchen appliances. Probably the rest of her house was as poorly arranged as her kitchen, giving her at least an additional 256,000 needless steps. This meant 512,000 steps, or approximately 200 miles tramped off annually in the daily round. Perhaps this was an exceptional case, but proper arrangement is one of the big problems to be solved in each individual home.

Problems of this kind will be discussed Farmers' Week at the University of Missouri College of Agriculture January 19 to 23. Other household problem discussions will have to do with cooking, the nutritive value of foods, lighting and ventilating, general care of the house, clothing, health and sanitation. In fact, the course offered for women during the week will partake of the nature of a home-making congress at which women will have opportunity to exchange views under competent leaders. Mothers and daughters should plan to be in Columbia for Farmers' Week.

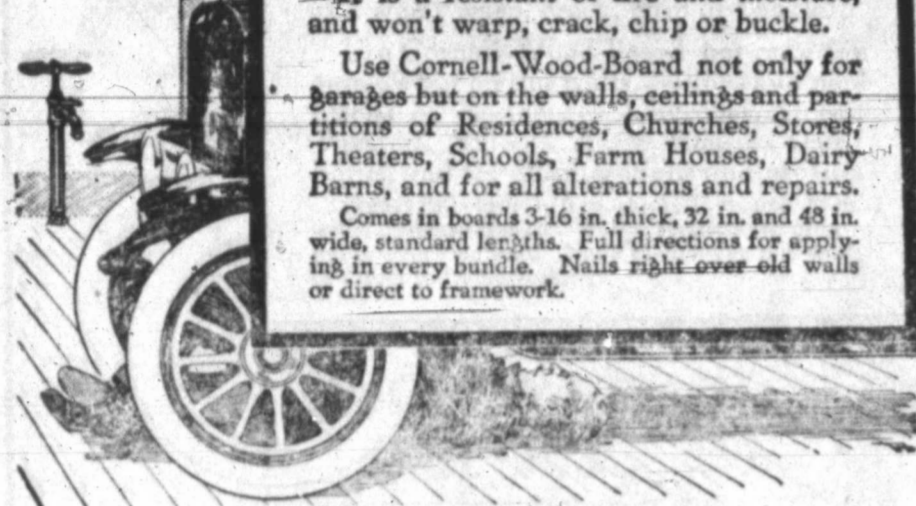

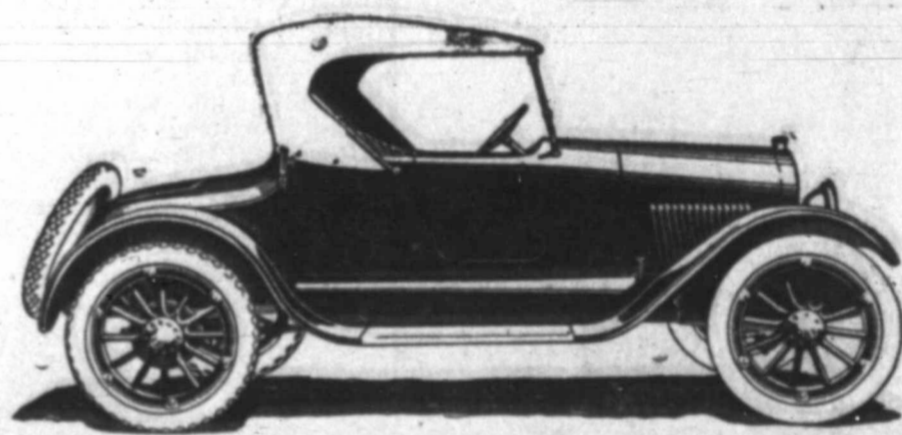

RESTRICTIONS ON COAL TO REMAIN INDEFINITE PERIOD

Washington, Dec. 10.—Expressions by government officials of relief at the settlement of the nationwide strike of bituminous coal miners were coupled tonight with warnings to the American people that early relaxation of the drastic restrictions on the consumption of coal must not be expected.

Fuel administration leader Garfield on receipt of word that the miners in Indianapolis had agreed to accept President Wilson's proposal, declared that immediate removal of regulations on soft coal consumption was not to be considered. Director General Hines, in a formal statement, asserted that the dislocation created by the strike could not be remedied instantly. The public, Mr. Hines said, will be expected to continue conserving fuel until normal conditions are restored, but just as soon as practical restrictions would be rescinded or modified.

"As a preliminary to bringing back normal conditions," the director said, "coal will be allowed to run as order, except the tide water and Export embargo will continue; orders placed for coal to western regions from Pocahontas and Allegheny regions will be cancelled, but coal billed on these orders prior to the cancellation will be permitted to go and be expedited so that those cars can be promptly released for mines."

The railroad administration, Director General Hines announced would aid in meeting the needs of other consumers by reduction of its supply to a ten day margin. The administration has been maintaining a fifteen days supply.

While those two government agencies directly concerned with distribution of the available supply of bituminous coal—which, it is estimated, has been cut 36,000,000 tons by the forty day strike—were issuing their warning, White House officials indicated that steps would be taken immediately to carry out the provisions of the president's proposal relating to investigation of wages and working conditions in the bituminous fields by a commission of three. In fact, it was intimated that the president already had practically decided on the appointments to the commission and was awaiting only the return of Attorney General Palmer from Indianapolis before announcing the names of the three members.

Operators from all of the larger bituminous fields of the country who have been here awaiting developments from the miners' meeting in Indianapolis, issued a statement tonight in which they said:

"We are pleased that the miners have voted to return to work and that the public can be promptly supplied. Realizing the imperative need of coal in large quantities, the operators stand ready now, as in the past, to bend all their energies toward a maximum production, beginning at once."

PLAINVIEW CITY CHARTER DECLARED UNCONSTITUTIONAL

The new city charter of Plainview was declared to be unconstitutional and invalid by the court of civil appeals in Amarillo Wednesday, by a unanimous opinion of the three members of the court. The court holds that the charter is unconstitutional in that the legislature had no right to enact such local legislation, as the constitution provides for home rule for cities of more than five thousand people and is explicit in just how city charters shall be initiated, drafted and adopted by a vote of the people of the city. The court held exactly in line with what the News last January said was unquestionably the law on the matter, as a layman understands it. The new city charter was prepared without a voice from the people, sent to Austin and enacted by the legislature in March 1917, without a voice of the people, then not referred to the people for their approval or rejection all of which, so the court declares, makes it void. The case is reversed and remanded. It is not known whether the city will appeal the case to the state supreme court or not. One of the attorneys stated to the editor of the News this morning it had not been decided what further action would be taken. An attorney on the other side said that many property owners have said they would not pay any further city taxes until the case is fully settled, in case it is appealed. This would greatly curtail the finances of the city. Under the old charter the city taxes were about 60c on the \$100; under the new charter they are \$1.50 on the \$100.—Plainview News.

LAST ITEMS FROM LYNN COUNTY NEWS

His daughter, Miss Maude, of El Paso, was sent for and arrived here yesterday to attend his bedside. Mr. Nevels is suffering from kidney disease, and together with his old age, makes his condition more serious.

A marriage ceremony was performed by County Judge Cain, at the Court House last Saturday, the contracting parties being Mr. Mark Marsh and Miss Letha Margaret Willis, both parties residing on the A. V. Robertson Ranch, in Crosby county. The happy couple left immediately for their home in that county.

Mr. Manley Lewis and Miss Nannie Bullock, of Grassland community, were quietly married in that community, Sunday, Nov. 23. The young couple have a host of friends, who wish them a bonny voyage over life's matrimonial sea.

Lee Moberly, a prominent citizen of the Grassland community, died at his home in that community last Sunday night. Congestion of the bowels is given as the cause of his death. Mr. Moberly took sick at the Grassland gin Tuesday of last week, and was carried home in a serious condition, death relieving him of his suffering Sunday night. Deceased leaves a wife and several children to mourn his loss. The deepest sympathy goes out to the sorrowing ones from the people of Lynn County. Interment was had in the Grassland cemetery.

The quail season in the State of Texas opened December 1, and many hunters are already out after the birds. The season will continue until Jan. 31, 1920.

Quite a number of Lynn county farmers have posted their places on account of carelessness on the part of those who hunt. It is said some hunters tramp down the crops, shoot into cotton pickers or live stock, leave gates open, and disrespect entirely the rights of land owners.

Lynn County has experienced some severe cold, wet weather this week. Beginning Tuesday a fine mist began falling and with the cold north-east wind caused a coat of ice to cover the ground and produce icicles on the housetops and trees. It has been a trying week on the farmers of this section. Not over sixty per cent of the cotton crop has been gathered, and the wet weather has hindered any work along that line this week. About five or thirty wagons were up waiting their turn to get a jag. 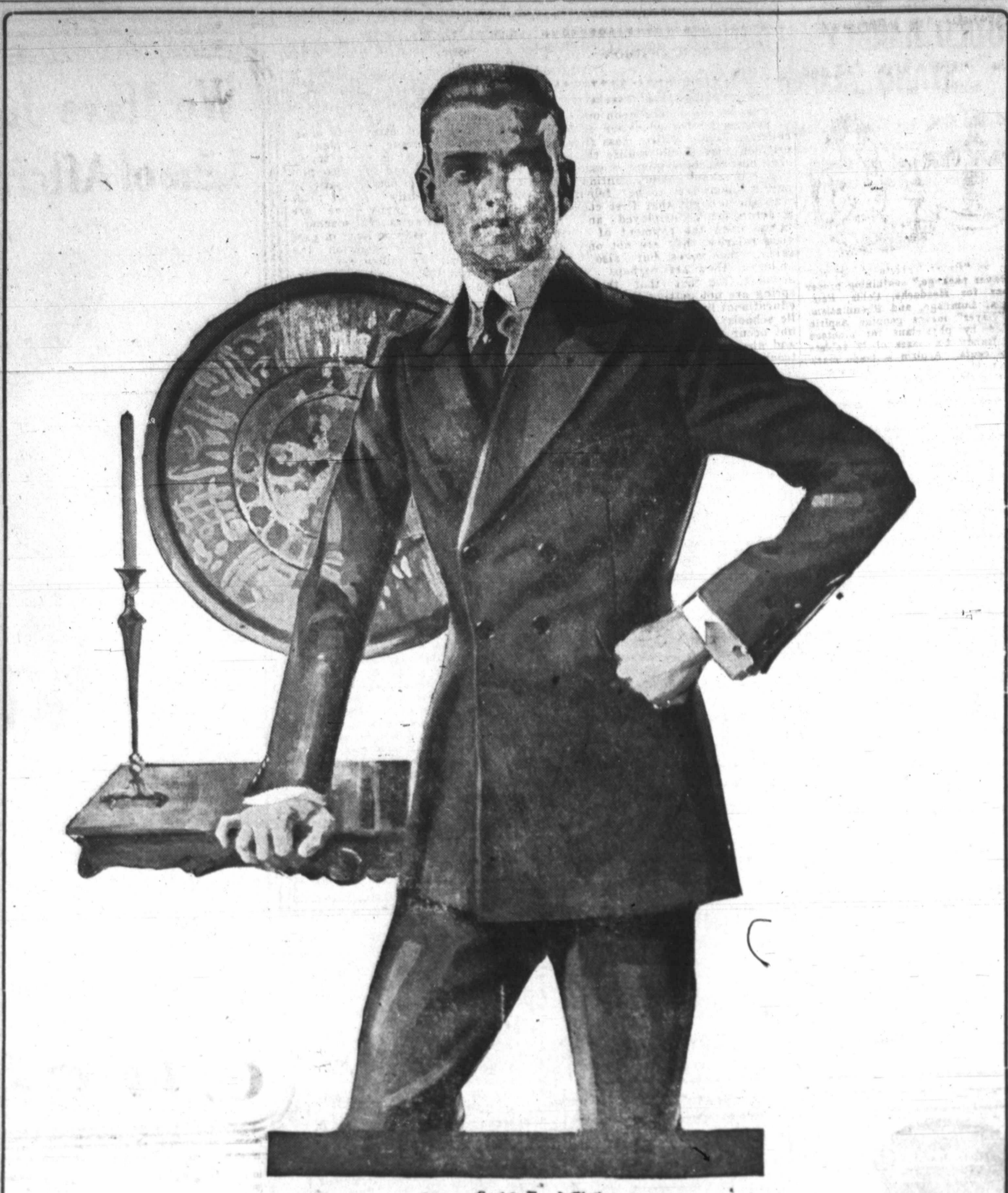

PUBLIC OPINION

Our Public School Teachers.

If those who depend upon our public schools for the education of their children, expect a first class finished product, they should realize that the very best teaching talent is essential.

But if school patrons continue to permit themselves to be felicitated with the thought that first class instructors can be employed and retained upon the payment of fourth class salaries, they are not only deceiving themselves, but also their children; they are perhaps unconscious to the fact that their offspring are not getting the best along educational lines as afforded by public schools; and furthermore, it may not occur to them that the quantity and also the quality of available teaching talent is gradually diminishing.

If the patrons persist in looking upon and thinking of our school teachers as a class of intellectuals who are so bound to their work as to be unable to procure more lucrative employment; they are grossly mistaken.

Professional teachers will not resort to the strike—loyalty, dignity, tradition and a high average of intelligence combine to prevent such action. But a gradual, subtle withdrawal from their field of endeavor is now apparent, and this will continue as a mute protest to salary conditions now no longer tolerable or necessary.

There is something almost tragic in this state of affairs; that these

valuable workers can be forced out of a profession, the study and application of which they have come to look upon as a useful honorable calling entitled to a just wage. They are expected to maintain a social and an intellectual status of a high order—to be clothed better than shabbily by gentles—to pursue in a pleasing manner a work that is nerve trying to a high degree; and are also presumed by many to possess patience and tact until infinity. All of these good qualities and many more are looked for in the successful teacher.

In order to remedy at least in part this deplorable salary condition the writer suggests the following:

The citizens of Amarillo by guaranteed subscription of monthly payments in sufficient amount apportioned among the various schools which will give an increase to each teacher of not less than twenty-five per cent over present salary.

Let this be done now; so as to take effect with the beginning of the New Year.

As citizens we have given aid to many nations during the past; so why not put that part of our own house in order which so closely pertains to saving our country from the pall of ignorance in future generations. Anarchy and Bolshevism are cultivated and bred in ignorance; why have to seek a remedy in misery to cure when preventative measures are readily at hand?—Claude Wolcott, in Amarillo Daily News.

ONLY ONE TRAIN DAILY SWEETWATER TO AMARILLO

Effective Monday of this week, the Santa Fe Railroad will run only one train daily between the towns of Amarillo and Sweetwater instead of the two trains run in the past. This discard of extra train service between these two points is necessary in order that a saving of fuel be made, and is in order with the railroad administration's plans of fuel saving during the great strike.

The only train operating between Lubbock and Sweetwater will arrive in Lubbock at 10:15 a. m., daily leaving about 10:20. The only train from Sweetwater to Amarillo daily arrives here at 6:30 a. m.

It is supposed now that the extra service accorded to the Sagraves branch will be taken off during the fuel famine. As soon as conditions are adjusted to a normal state the same service of the past will be resumed and possibly more additional.

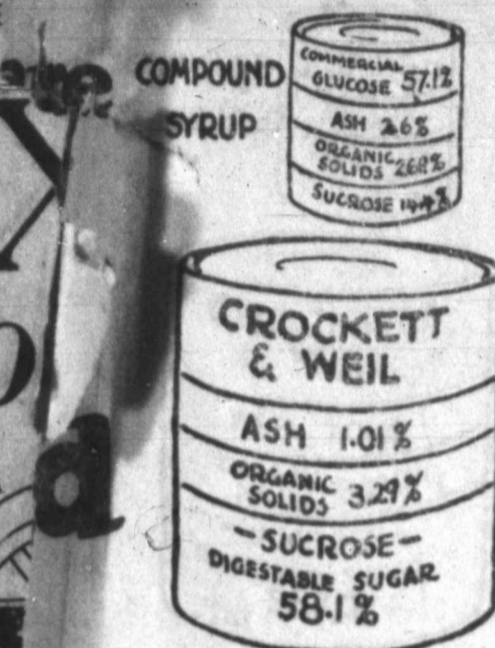

THE BIG COAL STRIKE ENDED WEDNESDAY

Indianapolis, Dec. 10.—The coal miner's strike is ended. With only one dissenting vote, the general committee of the United Mine Workers of America, in session here today, voted to accept President Wilson's proposal for immediate return to work pending final settlement of their wage controversy with operators by a commission to be appointed by him.

Telegrams were sent out tonight to the four thousand locals of the Union by international officers of the miners instructing the men to return to work immediately. Full instructions with regard to the agreement will be sent out tomorrow morning. Operators tonight predicted full resumption of operations Friday and shipment of coal from the mines beginning Monday morning.

Miners, operators and government officials alike were highly gratified over the settlement tonight, and all sides appeared confident of a final satisfactory settlement of the fight by the commission. The action today ends a tie-up of the coal industry of more than five weeks duration, and which was more far reaching in its effect than any other in the history of the country. As a result of the strike the country was fast approaching a shut down of industry and widespread suffering among its 100,000,000 inhabitants.

Decision Reached Late.
 The decision of the miners came after many hours of debate, in which the radical element in the general country made incendiary speeches against operators and others interested in settlement of the strike, and for a time threatened to defeat efforts to settle the strike at this time. The conservatives led by acting President John L. Lewis and Secretary Treasurer William Green gained control of the situation this morning and succeeded in putting down practically all opposition by the time the question came to a vote.

One concession was made to the radicals. The convention agreed to the calling of a general convention of the miners. At a future date, at which time the action of and reasons for the general committee will be fully explained. The opponents of acceptance of the president's plan made their fight principally on the theory that only a general convention of the mine workers had power to call off the strike.

Members of the general committee tonight steadfastly refused to make public the name of the delegate who cast the one dissenting vote.

Miners' Statement.
 Indianapolis, Dec. 10.—The miners statement follows:
 "The United Mine Workers of America today agreed to the president's proposal as a basis of settlement of the coal strike. They did so because it provides a definite, concrete and practical method by which adequate consideration and a proper adjustment of their claim for an increase in wages and improved conditions of employment may be

brought about. The United Mine Workers have full confidence in the president of the United States and a profound regard for his will and judgment.

"The president's proposal differs from many proposals heretofore proposed, in that it leaves nothing in doubt so far as a plan of adjustment of the locals thereof are concerned.

"The president's plan further provides that upon a general resumption of operations, the status quo will be maintained, that is that all mine workers will return to work with an increase in wages amounting to 14 per cent, upon the same basis which obtained on October 31, 1919. Neither operators nor miners will be allowed to change the basis and no discrimination by the coal operators will be permitted.

"It was these specific features of the president's proposals that are acceptable to the international officials of the United Mine Workers when submitted to them through Attorney General Palmer and Secretary Taft in Washington, December 6.

"We are accepting the president at his word, feeling confident that he will appoint a tribunal composed of fair minded men who will give full and complete recognition to the justice of the mine workers' claims. Besides, it is said to assume that the public will not only insist that full justice be accorded the mine workers but also will accept the findings of the tribunal appointed by the President of the United States as a fair and equitable determination of all the issues involved."

BIG RECEIPTS OF CATTLE CAUSES WEAK MARKET
Following last week's uncertainty in the fuel situation, today's receipts of cattle were much larger than expected, and the market was weak to 15 cents lower for beef grades and unevenly lower for stockers and feeders. Hogs opened 25 to 50 cents lower, became active with the loss about regained before the close. Sheep and lambs were 25 to 50 cents higher than the low close last week.
Today's Receipts.
Today's receipts were 29,000 cattle, 20,000 hogs, and 8000 sheep, compared with 10,000 cattle, 4000 hogs, and 2000 sheep a week ago, and 33,300 cattle, 28,654 hogs, and 5200 sheep a year ago.
Beef Cattle.
In proportion to total receipts of cattle, killing grades were relatively scarce, with quality plain. The best and plainest grades sold at steady prices, and the plain to fair grades were 10 to 15 cents lower. About the same price change was reported in cows. Weather conditions were rather severe, and trade moved slowly. No choice to prime grain fat grades were offered and good cows were scarce. A good many Colorado cat-

tle arrived from a Western market. Veal calves were steady.
Stockers and Feeders.
Trade in stock and feeding cattle was dull, owing to weather conditions. Prices in most cases were off 25 cents. A good many Panhandle New Mexico, and Colorado stockers were offered. Stock cows and heifers were 25 cents lower.
Hogs.
With hog receipts here 20,000, and 56,000 in Chicago, the market opened 25 to 50 cents lower, with an early top of \$13.25. Active demand by local packers brought about a rally later, and closing quotations were nearly steady with Saturday. The final top was \$13.50, and the bulk of the hogs sold at \$12.75 to \$13.35. Average prices here remained higher than elsewhere.
Sheep and Lambs.
Active demand prevailed for fat sheep and lambs and the market was quoted 25 to 50 cents higher than last Friday. Killers bought freely and the offerings were cleaned up by noon. Fat lambs sold mostly at \$15.25 to \$15.65 and fat ewes \$8.50 to \$8.75. Very few stock and feeding sheep or lambs were offered.
