SUPREME COURT UPHOLDS WOMAN VOTE IN PRIMARY

Austin, Dec. 13 .- The constitutionality of the Texas woman primary suffrage act was upheld by the Third Court of Civil Appeals today when the decision of the lower court in the case of Tom M. Hamilton vs. Lee R. Davis, tax collector of McLennan County, was affirmed. The plaintiff has fifteen days in which to

file motion for new trial In addition to upholding the law the court held that Tom M. Hamilton was not entitled to bring suit for injunction to restrain the tax collector from issuing poll tax receipts to women, as he has a complete remedy by statute for contesting the pro-

posed election. In discussing the constitutionality of the law, the court cited the opinion of the Supreme court in the case of Waples vs. Derrast, in which that court ruled that a primary is not an election within the terms of the Constitution, but is simply an election held by members of a political party for the purpose of nominating can-

The court further held that qualifications of voters as fixed by the Constitution did not apply to or govern the qualification of voters in primaries, but that the Legislature Riley Duff & Co.



BE READY FOR THE CENSUS ENUMERATOR

On January 2 the work of taking census of the United States will start. Be ready for the enumerator when he comes by familiarizing your-self with the list of questions following which he will ask you:

The census is required every ten-years by the Constitution of the United States and by Act of Congress. The date named for beginning the 1920 census is January 2, but the "Census Day" is January 1.

In cities the population enumeration will be completed in two weeks. The enumeration of farms will be completed within thirty days.

The censuses of manufactures, mines and quarries, oil and gas wells, and forestry and forest products will, as a rule, be taken by special agents and by correspondence and not by enumerators.

The census is the means by which the Government ascertains the increase in the population, the statistics concerning agriculture, and the vital information concerning the resources of the Nation.

Census for Statistical Purposes Only The census inquiries are defined

by act of Congress. The information gathered is strictly confidential, made so by law. Census information can not under any circumstances be used as a basis for taxation, nor can it be used to harm any person or his property: It has nothing whatever to do with detection, arrest, prosecution, or punishment of any person for any violation of any law. Important Questions Asked of all

Persons. Age at last birthday. Each person ten years of age and over will be asked whether he is able to read or write.

Each person will be asked his birthtplace as well as the birthplace of father and mother.

4. If foreign born the date coming to the United States will be asked, and, if naturalized, the date of becoming a citizen, also mother tongue or native language.

Each head of a family will be asked whether his home is owned by him or rented. If owned, whether the home is mortgaged or free of debt. Each person will be asked his

occupation and whether he is an employer or employee or is working on his own account. The answers to the above ques-

tions give valuable and vital information to the Government concerning the health, welfare, and progress of

### MEXICANS KILL 551 AMERI-CANS IN PAST NINE YEARS

Washington, Dec. 13 .- The National Association for the Protection of American Rights in Mexico has sent out for publication tomorrow in newspapers throughout the country a map and statement showing that 551 Americans have been killed in Mexico since Nov. 20, 1910.

Of this number, the association states, 423 were civilians and 123 soldiers or sailors. One hundred and sixty-seven Americans were slain during the Madero and Huerta regimes, while 383 lost their lives since Carranza took control of the Mexican government, according to the state-

In the list accompanying the map a number is assigned to each Amer-ican killed and his or her name, date, place and manner of death and the source of information concerning the individual case are given. The manner of death ranges from "killed by stray bullet" to wanton murder, and includes instances of alleged tor-

ture and mutilation. The association gives as the sources of its information in preparing this map and statement three lists of Americans killed in Mexico or along the border, prepared by the state de-partment; casualty lists of the war department; a list of Americans killed in Mexico prepared by Thomas E.



More diversified farming in Texas Much Obliged for the State Agricultural Conference at Waco Thursday and Friday, D. E. that farms would be more profitable if the crops were more evenly bal-

DIVERSIFIED FARMING URGED in favor of a greater range of crop planting, and said that the 400 farmers who attended the conference

"The system of agriculture must be properly diversified," he said. "Only a balanced system of agriculture with the addition of large quantities of manure and other fertilizers can maintain soft fertility. No farmer has a moral right to live off the proceeds of soil and to pass his farm on to posterity depleted of the chemical elements stored therein through countless centuries by divine provi-

"Farmers are trustees who hold in their hands the future wealth and Nice Orders of the Past Lyday, president of the Texas Farmers' Union, who attended the convention, declared. It was advanced to realize the resting upon them, and to sacredly fulfill the obligation of this steward

"Texas is top heavy with cotton,"

An instructive program of progres-sive agriculture practice was formulated at the conference. Lyday said, and that the farmers of Texas were advised, as nearly as possible, to conform their farm practice to the principles suggested.

The Extension Department of A. & M. College perfected its organization of community and county councils of agriculture under the farm plan, which ocntemplates a local conductive organizer in every far community. The organizer will affiling with the National Federaof Farm Bureaus.

Many Subjects Discussed. The range of subjects discussed at the conference was wide," Lyday said, "and covered practically al phases of modern commercial prac-tice. The outlook is believed to be bright for a closer co-ordination and more harmonizing relations between various farm forces in Texas

"One of the good suggestions that was made was that farmers should increase their livestock, poultry and hog raising as this is more profitable and goes to make more balanced

The farm labor question was also discussed by a number of the speakers, although no clearer outlook was seen for more help on the farm. The labor question the past year has been one of the greatest hindrances in the path of better agriculture in Texas, it was pointed out, and a better situation for next year was voiced by all the speakers, who urged that the matter be given more atten-







Two well-known feeders in Wiscon sin finished a load of steers by Shorthorn bulls and sold them on the Chi cago market last summer and received \$18.35 per hundredweight. They had both size and quality. No such result would have been possible either in this or the several cases referred to above with bulls of an inferior standard.

Most Useful Movement. There is now spreading over this country a movement to place purebred sires on the farms in the place of the grade or scrub sires now in use. It is one of the most useful movements ever undertaken. Particularly in Wisconsin is the movement being actively pushed. The results so far are very assuring and with any considerable degree of success in the distribution of the pure-


UNIDENTIFIED BODY FOUND NEAR QUANAH, TEXAS

### NOW IS 11,030,000 BALES

Washington, Dec. 11.-Total cot-ton production in the United States for the 1919-20 season will amount 5,275,096,000 pounds, exclusive of linters, which is equivalent to 11,030,000 bales of 500 pounds gross weight, the department of the agriculture announced today in its final estimate of the year.

The department's last made on the condition of the crop September 25, was 10,696,000 bales while the first estimate of the season based on June 25 condition, was 10,-986,000 bales. Last year's crop was 12,040,532 bales, the average for the five years, 1913-17 was 12,847,108 bales and the record crop, \$16,134,-930 bales in 1914.

The average gross weight per running bales is estimated at 500.2 pounds gross, compared with 505.6 ounds last year and 506.3 pounds the average for the five years 1913

The estimated production by states follows: Virginia 22,000; North Carolina 1,475,000; Georgia 1,730,000; Florida 17,000; Alabama 715,000; Mississippi 946,000; Louisiana 300,-000; Texas 2,700,000; Arkansas 830,000; Tennessee 298,000; Missouri 60,000; Oklahoma 930,000; California 102,000; Arizona 75,000; All other states 7,000.
