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

### Insulation of Curtains

Insulation of Curtains to Keep Out ley Winds All that can be done to the farm politry house in the way of insula-tion or storm curtains or hanking around the outside, will tend to keep out the ley winds and hold in the bird heat to make the pullets more confortable. But ventilation must not be reduced to a point their makes the house damp. A damp pultry house always seems colder than a dry rentflated house at the same tempera-ture. Dampaess seems to be a cause of colds and low sitality and both conditions may ecuse roup or at least a low percent of egg production.

### Helps Avoid Worms

Heips Avoid Worms One authority has stated that worms have very little chance of ob-taining a foothold in chickens that have a gizard well diled with in-soluble grit. This authority chans that all eggs and cysts of the worms are ground and damaged so nuch by a gizard dull of grinding material that so worm instation results. At any rate, it wouldn't have to see that the young growing stock is given pleaty of coarse, insoluble grit and pure, fresh water.
