DALLAS, Texas, Aug. 4.—The death of Harding weakens the chance of the Republicans in the 1924 presidential election, according to Lewis T. Carpenter, member of the Texas legislature from Dallas county and a probable candidate for governor in 1924. Mr. Carpenter declared today that 'President Harding was unquestionably the strongest man the Republicans could have chosen," and that in his belief the death of Mr. Harding at this time has greatly weakened his party's chances in the coming presidential campaign. "A fight of any kind in the Republican ranks will greatly strengthen the democrats in their campaign, said Mr. Carpenter and their bickering and quarrelling has always ended in this result, and to my mind it would be more pronounced than ever in the incoming campaign.

THE DEVELOPMENT OF PURPOSE.

A young person's achievement in life depends largely on his purposes. What is he driving at? What are his life aims? In many cases, the only aim you can discover is a vague desire for fun and amusement; to have a good time. Now if there is any way for the schools to wake up such young people, to put into their heads a determination to win their way, their attainment will be tremenduously increased. A boy who is interested in study will cover twice or three times as much ground, and know every point in each lesson better, than the mere fun loving pupil who dislikes work. The arousing ambition is one of the chief tasks of school life. The teacher must work every day to make success and accomplishment seem worth while. In these times when our country is torn by faction and controversy, the children need to acquire certain habits of fair mindedness. Every child needs to be taught that in seeking his own rights, he must never infringe on the rights of others. The teacher may have a better chance to teach fundamental ideals of justice in regulating the quarrels of the playground, than she could ever do in a formal talk on right conduct. The world is always full of dishonesty and children need instruction in morals. They will fall to dreaming if a teacher sermonizes on the subject. But great moral truths can be put into fascinating story form, leading them to despise yellow conduct, and admire uprightness and straight living.

They need lessons of good citizenship. They need to discover that they are to be partners in the joint business of conducting civil government, and that they will suffer if they fail to zens. They need to get in the habit from an early age of takco-operate with their fellow citiing a share in community projects. In such ways the merely selfish boy or girl can be helped to form the habit of team work and playing the game of life in a high minded way.

ACQUAINTANCE

The problem of extending trade is solved by three lines of effort: First, various forms of advertising; second, personal effort and acquaintance; third, superior service.

Also his clerks are trained to learn people's names, particularly those from the outlying country, and try to build up personal relations with them. It's a wonderful help in extending trade.

From 1900 to 1917 the general death rate in the United States registration area dropped from 17.6 to 12.9 per thousand. In ten years industrial accidents have been reduced eighty per cent while marked improvement has been made in working and living conditions.

An example of the way that life iffsurance companies work to prolong life is found in their activities in the case of locomotive engineers and miners. The companies discovered that the average life of locomotive engineers was five years less than the general average, while the average of workers in underground metal mines was nine years less. This information was given to the ailroads and mining companies, which at once adopted various devices to improve conditions in order to remove unnecessary hazards. 




