WASHINGTON, Jan. Influential members of the democratic party are bringing pres-sure on Chairman Cordell Hull of the democratic national committee, and certain minority leaders in congress, trying to stop them from attacking the Mellon tax plan so vigorously. This situation is fast developing into a row which will crop out at the BRITAIN meeting of the democratic national committee here next week although every effort will be made to prevent the fight from coming up in open meeting.

The pressure is being exerted thru telegrams and letters which are arriving by hundreds in the offices of democratic senators and congressmen, through calls by substantial busicountry, Bernard M. ENFORCEMENT PROHIBITION LAWS BEYOND CONTROL COUNTY OFFICERS

MARION, Ills., Jan. 8.—Om hundred and twenty five national guardsmen, the first troops to take the field in enforcement of American prohibition, marched through the streets of excited Marion late Tuesday night fol lowing their arrival here to prevent rioting in the mining camp bootleggers' war.

Military headquarters have been established in the "bloody Williamson county" courthouse and it appeared unlikely that the militia would go on guard until officers have completed a thorough investigation.

Martial law will not be declared until after the arrival of Adjutant General Carlos Black unless disor-

Sheriff George Galligan, whose call for help resulted in dispatch of the troops to Marion by Governor Len Small, informed Major W. P. Greaney, commander of the three companies, that he desired the troops to take complete charge of the county. The militiamen are heavily armed and equipped with field equipment in order to meet any emergency

which may arise. There was no disorder following their arrival. Silent men and women lined the streets, recalling a strike scene nineteen months ago when the troops came to quell rioters after the Herrin mine massacres, in which 25 persons were killed.

"It takes a pretty fair day and a half's driving to make El Paso-a distance of 430 miles by our speedometer. The roads are moderately fair practically all of the way with a strip of rotten road across the State University School Land this side of Pecos for about 45 miles. From Stanton to 20 miles west of Midland the roads are perfect and the last fifty to seventy rive miles into El Pase are paved."

"From El Paso thru Deming to reflect well upon the progressiveness Douglas is a good day's drive with 40 miles of about the worse road we found on the trip. From Douglas to Phoenix is all pavement and good gravel road but then the fun starts. Before you get to the desert and crossing you have a variety of every kind of road you ever heard of. If you happen to be a student of ge-ology I am sure that you could find every kind of stone, soil, formation and fossal in the world on the next two day's trip. Of course the Good Master has a purpose for everything He has ever created in the world but. He alone knows why He lets some folks live and why He built such a country as you see between Blythe

and Mecca. "In California you find pavement miles and miles of it—and vertiable wonder of wonders-not a speed cop in sight. We drove at a pace varying from 20 to 55 miles per hour—hour after hour thru moun-tains, across the plains, the valleys, along the seashore-and never a

speed cop did we see.
"We came back thru the valley and visited with a number of Chambers of Commerce and Co-Operative Associations and found general busi-ness good. They have enough raisins to feed the entire world it looks like and oragnes are moving in car loads. We ran thru a lettuce country and saw the farmers hauling lettuce to town in loads just like they do cotton during the fall months around Lubbock. Fifteen and twenty truck loads of green lettuce passed on the road within three or four miles of each of the shipping sheds along the railroad. It is a sight that makes you think

that makes you think.
"We found folks about the same everywhere we went. Secretaries, in California think Texas secre-taries have a snap. California farm-ers think Texas farmers have easy ers think Texas farmers have easy pickings. Those who live there want to move somewhere else—at least many of them—and folks who live somewhere else want to move there—and there you be. I ran into a Chamber of Commerce membership campaign at Riverside where they were trying to raise enough money to carry on their work in good shape. In another place they were organizing a district Fair and Fruit Show—Poultry Clubs are being organized, and so on—the same sort of folks, the same sort of problems, and the same laws of life prevailing—the hard-working, honest man is making a living, cussing his taxes, contributing to the church, civic work, and so on—the regular round of living. so on-the regular round of living.

"Everywhere we went we found folks who knew about Lubbock—about the South Plains country and the location of the Tech College.

Some of them will move to Lub-Some of them will move to Lubbock in the coming years, others would like to. But nowhere on the entire trip did we find the spirit of progress, growth, expansion so evident as in the South Plains section. Los Angeles is making a great growth and a heavy building program is under way of course but it is on a different type and kind from that

The statistical record of the year 1923 has been a remarkable one, and since it is only through dry, cold figures that some idea of the enormous expansion which has taken place in industry and business may be gained, some of these barometrics, to which the country's commercial leaders must look for future guidance, are recounted. The American people produced more, spent more, and saved more than ever before. Back clearings for the year 1923 have been approximately \$23,000,000,000 larger than those of 1922; railroad earnings for the year were approximately 5.10 per cent of the high valuation of the roads, or a gross of \$5,423,958,000 as compared with \$4,690,718,000 in the previous year; the farm crops were valued at \$8,222,695,000 as compared with \$7,499,804,000 in 1922; building permits for the first eleven months of the year aggregated \$2,434,262,000 as compared with \$1,907,766,000 in 1922. Commercial failures involved \$93,000,-800 less than in 1922. The output of pig iron, 43,000,000 tons, was double that of 1914. 




