





## STOCKS OF PLATFORM MATERIAL IS BEING READILY ASSEMBLED AT DEMOCRATIC WORK SHOP TODAY

NEW YORK, June 22.—A deluge of platform material covering a wide range of American domestic and foreign issues has descended suddenly upon the hosts gathered here for the democratic national convention.

Senator Caraway of Arkansas, member of the Daugherty investigating committee and Senator David I. Walsh, of Massachusetts, have a complete platform of principles for presentation to the resolutions committee featuring democratic charges of dishonesty in the republican administration.

W. J. Bryan, still the dramatic political crusader, has arrived in New York bringing with him a plank which calls on the democrats to organize for international peace and to outlaw war.

Former Justice John Clarke, of the United States Supreme Court, has prepared a plank urging American membership in the League of Nations. Heading a delegation from the League of Nations non-partisan association, Clarke will go before the resolutions committee on Tuesday or Wednesday to plead for adoption of his league proposal.

After consulting with anti-klan leaders, Ed Moore of Ohio, who managed the campaign for James M. Cox in 1920, drafted a plank specifically denouncing the hooded order by name. The offering prepared by Senators Caraway and Walsh represent the first complete platform that has appeared in New York. In a preamble, the two senators declare that the American people "are profoundly shocked and deeply grieved at the utter lack of public decency and respect for law as has been manifested by this republican administration. Their statement reflects significantly the campaign material which the democrats hope to make of the oil scandals.

sentiment in favor of such action. Bryan's proposal to outlaw war, does not rest upon the league. Declaring for the world court, for world disarmament and for a referendum on war, it reads:

"The democratic party pledges all its energies to the outlawing of war. We refuse to believe that the wholesale slaughter of human beings on the battlefield is any more necessary to man's highest development than is the killing by individuals.

"We invite the cooperation of all parties in a determined effort to devise such complete machinery for peace as shall insure the settlement of all international controversies by reason instead of force. To this end, we favor participation with other nations in a court of international justice for the adjustment of justifiable questions, arbitration for arbitral disputes and arbitration before resort to war and all differences which cannot be settled by courts or boards of arbitration, reserving at all times and under all circumstances the right to control our destinies and to determine whether or not and when our nation shall declare war.

"The moral influence of the United States and the confidence of other nations in our disinterested attitude compel us to assume leadership in the world movement for universal peace. Our government should therefore endeavor to secure a joint agreement with all the leading nations for world disarmament and also for a referendum of war, except in case of threatened invasion."

Bryan will also ask for a plank to control campaign contributions which he predicted would be one of the big issues of the campaign. After cautious handling of the klan issue, as if it were so much dynamite, by numerous political leaders, a plank definitely condemning it was evolved by Ed Moore of Ohio. Moore conferred with anti-klan leaders before completing his draft, which is understood to meet the approval of those democrats who have been urging an outspoken attack upon the klan. Moore's suggested draft reads:

ferred with free political action or due process of law."

Bryan refused to comment on the klan, nor is any specific mention of this ticklish question included in the Caraway-Walsh platform. Following are among the principles enunciated in the latter document:

1. Honesty in public office.
2. Destruction of government "by the spy and the blackmailer."
3. Respect of liberty, free speech, a free press, the right to peaceably assemble, to be secure from unreasonable search and seizure and to worship God according to dictates of conscience.
4. Prevent "Newberryism" by the enactment of stringent laws against corrupt practices and unrestricted expenditure for campaign purposes.
5. Convene congress immediately after the biennial national election, so as to prevent defeated members from participating in its sessions; allow direct vote by the people on proposed amendments to the federal constitution.
6. Revise the rules of congress so as to expedite legislation.
7. Adjustment of all foreign war loans.
8. Reduction of taxation by economy, by refunding war debts, repealing unnecessary direct taxes and revising the tariff, repeal pullman surtaxes and other nuisance taxes.
9. Conservation of national resources.
10. Government regulation of the coal industry and all other private monopolies controlling the necessities of life where public welfare has been subordinated to private interests.
11. Generous appropriations and honest management in care of war veterans.
12. Adequate salaries for postal and other government employees.
13. Re-habilitation of American merchant marine and development of lake and sea ports.
14. Reduction of transportation costs, creation of marketing systems and other measures to help farmers.
15. American membership in the world court "or such other world association as may be most helpful in promoting peace," international reduction of land and sea armaments.
16. Readjustment of our obligations in the Philippines, so independence may be granted in ten years.

The Caraway-Walsh platform labels the republican party as "devoid of leadership or a sense of moral rectitude" declared it is "boss-ridden, its candidates picked by predatory interests."

HIGHER RATE ON PARCEL POST PROBABLE

By H. K. REYNOLDS International News Service Staff Correspondent WASHINGTON, June 22.—Increases in postage rates—especially on parcel post—appear inevitable in view of the principle laid down by President Coolidge that the users of the mail should "approximately pay the cost of the service."

The postal revenues last year were \$32,000,000 less than the cost of operating the Post Office Department. A deficit resulted, which was made up out of the other revenues in the Treasury. President Coolidge is opposed to this kind of business method in the Government. He wants to pay as he goes, and therefore believes that the logical thing to do is to make everyone buy more stamps.

Under the law, the postmaster general has the authority with the approval of the Interstate Commerce Commission, to increase the parcel post rates. The commission fixes the express rates and has the same power over the parcel post rates. Cost of Operation Sought The Post Office Department is now engaged, as the President pointed out in his message to Congress, in an investigation to ascertain the cost of operating the postal service.

This inquiry has been prosecuted with diligence, the President said. "Whether the results are available they will form the basis for an intelligent consideration by the Postmaster General and by Congress of all questions relating to the adequacy or inadequacy of the postage rates. They will afford a property basis for consideration of the relation of the cost of the postal service and the revenues derived therefrom. The time has arrived to consider putting the postal service on a sound business basis so far as expenditure and revenues are concerned."

It is expected that when the revision of postal rates comes up in Congress the question of adjusting the salaries of postal employees—assistant postmasters, inspectors, railroad mail clerks, etc.—will be considered at the same time. This is in accord with the desire of the President, who does not believe that the rates should be increased solely for the purpose of raising the salaries of Government employees.

Brother Of Franks Say's Noose For Murderers

BY HORACE WADE The Boy Reporter (Written for The International News Service) CHICAGO, June 22.—"The two boys who so brutally struck down my brother must hang."

With nerves taut, dark eyes flashing, mobile, sensitive lips drawn like a red bow across his handsome face, Jack Franks, 16, brother of the slain Robert Franks, delivered this view in his first interview since that tragic day when Robert was struck down in the fairy bloom of boyhood.

"The State must be contented with nothing less than hanging," Jack said. "Capital punishment is the logical culmination of this murder, and the courts should not be swayed by the millions of dollars the Leob and Leopold families have hoarded in their coffers."

"Will every cent possible be brought to bear to keep Dick and Nathan from a drear and dismal fate on the gallows? Yes—at least that is my impression. The announcement made by the two families just recently that a limited sum would be paid out for the defense is only a clever play—a last attempt to sway the public to the boys' side."

"Righteous Fate of Slayers" Thus did this quick, mentally alert boy, with discerning, wondering eyes, couch his own lucid opinions as to the righteous fate of the murderers of Robert Franks—the little, raven-haired fellow who so boyishly, so confidently clambered into the auto on that fateful May afternoon, passing in a few minutes from the open vistas of youth into the hazy beyond.

"Life imprisonment," Jack continued in answer to a question. "Why, life imprisonment might be all right if it really meant life—but usually there is some way to bring influence to bear and the full term is not served."

And I also asked Jack about their debate at the Harvard School on the subject, "Resolved, That Capital Punishment Is Wrong."

"Strengthened My Conviction" "Robert always was opposed to capital punishment," said this youngster, "and he pleaded his case with all the facility of an old-time lawyer as he put forth every one of his arguments. My side was beaten mainly because of Robert, but I still believe in capital punishment and

FAMILY ALMOST EXTINCT IN A BIG FAMILY ROW BISMARCK, Mo., June 22.—With three members of a family dead, a fourth dying and two others in a serious condition, authorities Sunday plunged deeper into their

Investigation of the turbulent domestic life of George Pressley, 35, a farmer, which led to the tragedy.

Angered when his mother-in-law, Mrs. W. L. McHutchesson, came to his tiny farm house in the thinly settled hill section west of here to induce his wife to leave him, Pressley shot his daughter through the body and then blew off the top of his head, an investigation by Mayor C. P. Lucy disclosed.

When officers arrived at the house they found the dead and dying strewn over the blood-spattered floor. Aid was summoned immediately and McCutcheson and his wife were brought here for treatment, while the wounded girl was given first aid attention at a neighbor's farm house and then brought to a hospital. She is not expected to live.

"The verdict at the inquest was that Pressley and his wife and child met death by shooting, but the cause is unknown," Mayor Lucy told the United News Tuesday night. "The case has aroused considerable feeling and naturally we will go to the bottom of it." Pressley has been having family trouble, we have learned, and believe this was the cause but our final report will not be made for several days."

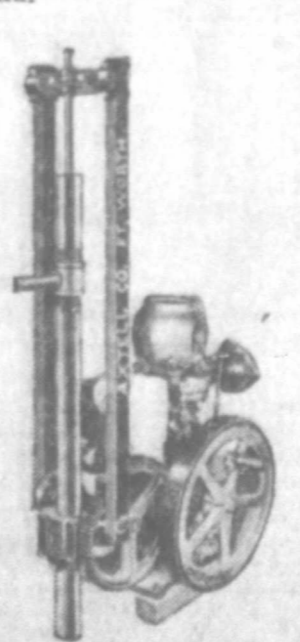
