A railroad west from Lubbock is practically assured and with a continuation of such efforts toward building the road as have been exerted by J. A. Wilson and others during the past several weeks it will be but a short time now until the road is a reality.

A meeting was held at the Citizens National Bank Thursday afternoon by Mr. Wilson which was attended by W. L. Elwood, who owns the largest body of land to be traversed by the road, Arthur P. Duggan, of Littlefield, representing the Reid lands, and J. A. Bardwell of Post City, Texas representa-tive of the C. W. Post estate.

This meeting perhaps was the most important one ever held in interest of the road, and according to Wilson definite plans for pro ceeding with the work of actually securing the railroad were made. SAN FRANCISCO, July 11. (UN)-Raging 60 miles north of Los Angeles, a fire in the Santa Barbara National Forest was beyond all control early today.
