

RECORDS SMASH IN 400 METER EVENT

COLOMBES STADIUM, PARIS, July 11.—The British team took command of the occasion in Friday's big event of the Olympic track and field program winning the final of the 400 meters with Eric Liddell's record breaking run.

Liddell had to romp along with the speed of a terrified ghost to set a new record for the old one had been shaved down one fifth of a second Thursday by Imbach, the Swiss, in a qualifying heat and Imbach's record was reduced by one-fifth of a second in a semi-final Friday morning, the honor going to Horatio Fitch of Chicago. Thus, when Liddell crossed the line in the newest time of 47 3-5 seconds, a third new record was established in two days of this event.

Imbach gave Liddell a terrific drive in the final but could not reduce a lead of several yards which the Englishman won at the start. Fitch was second and Butler of the English team took third place. Johnston, of Canada was fourth because Coard Taylor of the American team fell 20 yards from the end. Taylor got up, dashed and wobbled, and staggered over the line in sixth place. Imbach fell before Taylor did and failed to finish.

This was the only event on the day's program which was comparatively routine and drew only 20,000 people. In the semi-final heat of

the 400, Fitch leaped at the crack of the gun as though he had been shot at and missed and his lead was such a hard one to follow that Butler's strength left to give him an argument at the end. Fitch faltered about fifty yards from the finish and seemed about to fall but pulled himself up and barely made it. At that Butler was giving him a contest at the end.

England's point score took a brace and mounted to the very respectable total of 60 1-2 at the end of the day. The United States had 194, however, and it does not seem possible for the habitual champions to lose the title this year.

The Fins won first semi-final of the team race and the British were second, both teams thereby qualifying for the final. The United States beat France in the other semi-final. France was second and these two also will run for the championship in the big contest. Wide, of Sweden was the first individual finisher in the second semi-final of this event, but his team did not score enough points to qualify.

The Americans were booted by the crowd during the long run because a French runner stumbled and flopped while running in a pack of Americans. Joie Ray one of our greatest was spiked in the mix-up and pulled up for a moment, but resumed running and finished eleventh.

Cox, Kirby, and Tibbets, of the American team, were second, third, and fourth in their heat.

The Fins, with Willie Ritola and Paavo Nurmi available are almost certain to win the final.

Osborne of Michigan was regarded as the probable winner of the decathlon and he led with 1700 points after the 100 meters and the broad jump. But Osborne of our team was in the lead after two more events, the high jump and 400 meters of the decathlon had been disposed of. In any case America seems certain to take the title. The decathlon will be finished Saturday.

Italy probably will take the event of the 1,000 meters walk, as her champion, Frigerio, led the sixth qualifiers in the second heat and won it easily.

REBEL POSITION CLAIMED MORE DIFFICULT

RIO DE JANEIRO, July 11.—An official communique on the revolutionary movement in Sao Paulo states that "military operations against the revolutionists are following their normal course."

"The progress of the state troops continues satisfactorily while the situation of the revolutionists becomes more difficult every minute," the communique states.

It adds: "There are increasing desertions from rebel camps and that Carlos de Campos, governor of Sao Paulo, remains in his capital where he is in constant contact with Federal and military forces operating there."

The revolt, which at present, appeared to be of purely military nature, seems to have had political support, but official communique have made no mention of political personages saying only that the rebellion was staged by some of the state police aided by undisciplined army officers who forced their troops to join them in the mutiny.

There are many conjectures as to the cause of the movement, but most of them are so silly that they are not worth repeating.

Loyalty to the Federal government was manifested Friday by members of the senate and chamber of deputies here who passed resolutions placing their support to President Bernardes, the Sao

Paulo government and the loyalist forces.

The president of the naval reserve club has announced that he is authorized by the minister of marine to inform reservists that news stories that the reserves had been called out were without foundation.

Prisoners Arrive at Rio.
RIO DE JANEIRO, July 11.—A number of prisoners captured by the loyal forces, have arrived here from the fighting zone at Sao Paulo. They had been brought from Sao Paulo to Santos, and thence to this city.

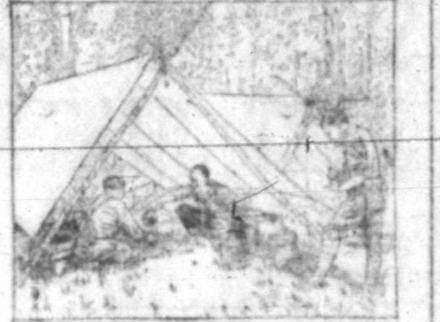

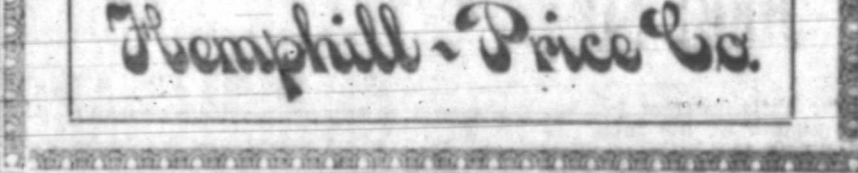

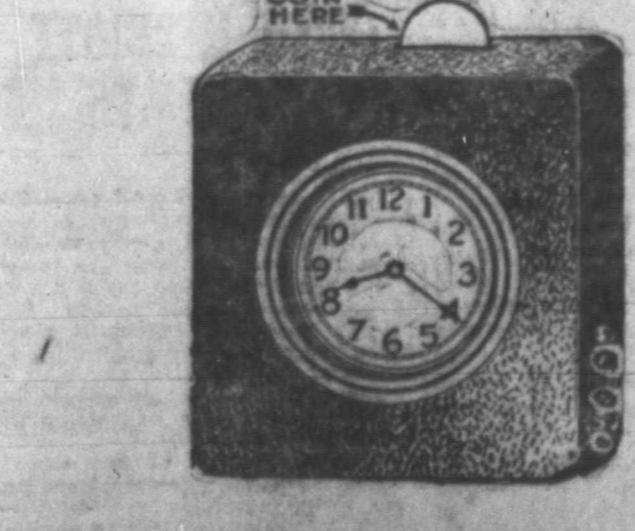

LIDDELL SETS NEW WORLD RECORD ON QUARTER

COLOMBES STADIUM PARIS, July 11.—It was a good thing for the British Olympic team that Eric Liddell is a religious young man with conscientious scruples against contesting on Sunday. For that reason he refrained from running in the 100 meters race last Sunday which his team mates, Abraham was good enough to win from our best sprinters. And for the same reason he was fresh and vigorous when he was called to the track in the killing quarter mile journey, final race Friday afternoon. And he won it in the new world record time of 47 3-5 seconds the third time the record has been improved in two days.

His victory in the quarter was similar to Abraham's great conquest over our men in the hundred. He was just too fast for the rest of the world. I wish I might see a race between Ted Meredith in his prime and this hurrying Briton Liddell.

Eric is a magnificent runner. He sprinted every step of the way although he was only going 100 yards.

Not once did he pull in his stride. When he reached the stretch we knew he was going to make still another record. He was the new record this, Horatio Fitch, of our team had made in his semi-final heat.

The triple smashing of the record in two days running demonstrates that this track is the fastest now in use. I believe Allen Woodring, of our team, might have had a chance to beat Liddell if he had run as the going was all his style. We were disappointed at the losing of a victory as we thought Taylor or Fitch could take it.

In the 3000 our team was great but we will not do better than third in the final as the Finns are unbeatable. Our runners showed fine team work in the 3,000 trial, but Nurm of Finland had to turn in his stride several times and command his comrades to close up on the opposition. Laine, Ray of Chicago was going great behind Wide of Sweden, who finished first in our half of the 3,000 semi-final when some other runner stepped on his heel and pulled off one of his shoes. Every one thought Laine had been spiked but as a matter of fact he really had to stop and replace and tie his shoe. Even then he resumed the running and pulled up from twentieth place to finish eleventh.

The athletes are complaining about the ropes along lanes which have tripped two runners thus far.

While it has been the policy of our government to refuse recognition to the Bolsheviks, it should be remembered that millions of American money was poured into Russia during the war for the express purpose of promoting a socialist revolution.

Bryan, who had previously served a term as mayor of Lincoln, Neb., was elected Governor in 1922.

Last May, Governor Bryan presented to the Nebraska State Democratic convention a platform of state and national issues together with the following as his views on current questions:

schedules on income taxes, repeal of the McNary-Haugen bill; conscientious law enforcement policy, municipal state and national, for the prohibition law; taking over and operating by the national government of the coal and gasoline industries, indorsement of any league or association of nations that would restore and perpetuate peace...
