Giuseppe Ser-afini, Frank Gambino, Leo Davis, Mike Valentino and Ciro Negrei were behind bars and warrants were out for Salvini Arena, Antonio Carrera, Morris Lesser and Sam Béhan. Behan is reported to be in Sing Sing prison at present, but was alleged to have been one of the original conspirators in the local robbery which was conceived more than six months ago and rehearsed diligently for weeks. , Of the seven arrested men, all but Negrei are under sentence to hang on Oct. 24. Negrei secured immunity by turning "king's evidence." A re-markably brilliant array of legal talent was mustered for the bandits. It took the 12 men just 11 minutes to render a verdict of murder in the first degree. All of the men sentenced to death wilted, with the exception of Morel. Morel, of physical perfection, when usked if he had anything to say, stood straight as an arrow and admitted his guilt, even recited the section of the criminal code under which those conspiring in any crime that leads to murder-whether actively participat-ing or not-are guilty of murder and blamed "nobody but myself."
