





That amount may be raised by the county commissioners court, by an organization in the county, individuals, or by any other legitimate means, provided that the funds raised in the county are administered by the county. When the amount is raised, the county signs the statement that the funds are in the county treasury, and a like amount of state funds is then set for the conducting of that county's nursing service.
