PATENT OFFICE NOW **CATCHING UP WITH** IT'S WORK, SAID

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9-The pat-ent office is gradually catching up on the amount of work awaiting official action, it was shown in its annual report to the Secretary of the

Interior made public here today. There are now on hand 12,000 fewer patent cases than there were a year ago, 2,468 fewer design cases and 1,850 fewer trade-mark cases, showing a decrease on hand of over 16,000 cases for the year, the report stated. Applications were also acted upon more promptly it was 'said. Total receipts of the patent of

fice amounted to \$3,042,276 for the past fiscal year, the largest ever re-ceived for any single year. This in-

crease was made no ithstanding a slight decrease in the number of applications for patents, designs, and trade marks from 100,724 for the preceding year to 99,503 for the last iscal year.

The Public Buildings Commission has placed at the disposal of the patent office about 70 rooms in the Old Land Office Building across the street from the patent office and is. ew of this the patent office is undergoing thorough reorganization which will make for greater ef-ficiency, the report said.

The committee which is to study the patent office procedure is to be composed of representatives nominated by the American Bar Associa-tion, the United States Chamber of Commerce, National Association of Patent Lawyers, and the Patent Law Associations in Chicago, Cleveland, Detroit, Pittsburgh and New York,


