END CAME PEACEFULLY AT SAN ANTONIO, BODY ENROUTE TO FORMER HOME FOR BURIAL

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Dec. 13.-Labor bowed it's head in tribute here tonight to Samuel Gompers, veteran president of the American Federation of Labor. He died here early to-day following a recurrence of heart trouble precipitated by over-exertion in the rarified climate during the recent trip to Mexico.

Death resulted from a recurrence of attacks of heart failure accompanied by urameia. The attack was brought on by exposure and activity beyond the limit of tolerance in the high altitudes of Mexico City, according to an official bulletin issued from Federa-

tion headquarters here late to-day. The end came peacefully at 4:05 o'clock this morning after the veteran labor chief had gradually slip-ped down during the night following a hurried trip across the American border. The body lay in a mortuary here during the day, while flags were at half most throubhout the city. WASHINGTON, Dec. 13 .- Into the dull discussion of figures on re-funding the French debt to America, there burst today the colorful and romantic words, Tapiti and Pa-

seas, which drew Stevenson, Gaugin and Melville to their shores, may yet float the Stars and Stripes.

With negotiations on the French debt slowed down and a settlement not in sight for several months, to-day the proposition was revived that France pay her war obligations in the Eastern Pacific, including the Society Islands.

But if such a deal is ever made.

But if such a deal is ever made, it is apt to be several years hence after the two nations have exhausted all means of possible financial set-tlement. Opposition to this country securing sovereignty over the island is strong in Japan, where American extension in the Pacific would be in-

extension in the Pacific would be in-terpreted as imperialistic intrusion into the far East, it is said. Support for the plan is far from unanimous among officials here, many take the attitude that the Philippine Islands have been a source of political trouble and financial loss. to this country without any gain, and that the Society Islands would

be even worse.

Great Britain, however, is said to favor the plan because she prefers the United States to France as a neighbor to Australia and New Zealand and would welcome additional Anglo Saxon strength in the eastern Pacific to balance oriental

powers.

The Society Islands are said to have potential value as a naval base and from a commercial standpoint are rich in phosphates. Tapiti and Moorea are the most important islands of the group; the former with an area of 600 square miles and 12,000 inhabitants and the latter of 50 square miles and 1500 people.

Consequently he is ignorant of the peculiar diseases that affect the Filipinos and may, during his practice, injure the health of the nembers of the community, so the legislators claim.

Another aim of the bill is to pro-tect from foreign competition Filipino doctors who are being turned out yearly by the local medical schools. Owing to present financial onditions in Europe, it is laimed, many European physicians are seeking other fields.

By making a proper selection of fruits it is possible to construct a dietary quite capable of sustaining life for an indefinite period. Such a diet would naturally include nuts. Contrary to the opinion formerly held by physicians, fruits and fruit juices are not only not injurious to persons suffering from gouty or rheumatic affections, and even in cases of acidosis, but are highly ben-

Apples and apple juice are of great dietic value. Taken freely they are a laxitive, especially when taken on an empty stomach.

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THE PASSING DAY

By WILL H. MAYES, Department of Journalism, University of Texas

The Texas State Board of Control has issued a statement that its recommendations for legislative appropriations for educational institu-tions in Texas will almost equal the combined cost of all the departments and other institutions. This is as it should be. It is generally conceded that in every country the cost of running courts, caring for prisoners, operating asylums and providing for the helpless, decreases in proportion to the increase in the literacy of the people. The more Texas spends for education, the less it will be required to spend for those things that indicate a low intellectual and moral standard. Education there-fore, whatever it costs, is the cheapest investment a state can make.

Miss Ruth Cross, the Texas girl who has suddenly attained marional fame as the author of "The Golden Cocoon", and who was an obscure girl struggling for a living until her book stamped her a success, in an address at the University of Texas, stated that it is easier to live a fail-ure than a successful life. She meant thereby that one who succeeds has so much more demands on his time this meeting Texas Agricultural and and on his talents than one who is content to remain a failure. It is very true that one has to pay for success both before and after it is attained. Any success that is not followed by continued effort is not success after all. Success carries with it a suggestion of increased usefulness, and the person who becomes useless relapses at once into failure.

Mathews, registrar of the University of Texas, who re-ecutly returned from a meeting of the Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools of the Southern States, held in Memphis, Tenn. Mr. Mathews and Dr. W. J. Battle, professor of classical languages, represented the University of Texas at the meeting. "Texas has more schools on the

list of the Southern Association than any other Southern State," Mr. Mathews said. "In 1923 there were 91 and at th elast meeting 27 were added, making a total of 117. One of the older schools was dropped for having failed to keep up the standard of the Southern Association, which is higher than that of the State. One of the requirements of the association is that the school must have

at least a \$500,000 endowment."

Of the three new schools added at Mechanical College was one. Many applications for membership are now pending.
